

Lokayukta Raids Eight Karnataka Govt Officers Over Disproportionate Assets

Raids conducted across seven districts

Lavish assets, cash, and documents seized

The Karnataka Lokayukta conducted simultaneous raids on the premises of eight government officers on Thursday, targeting officials suspected of accumulating assets disproportionate to their known sources of income. The coordinated operation spanned Bengaluru, Kolar, Tumakuru, Kalaburagi, Vijayapura, Davangere, and Bagalkote districts.

Investigators are now scrutinizing property documents, financial statements, and investment records seized during the searches to assess the scale of unaccounted assets linked to these officers. The Lokayukta has reiterated its commitment to rooting out corruption and ensuring that public servants are held accountable for illegitimate wealth accumulation.

Further legal action will be initiated based on the evidence collected during these raids.

Karnataka High Court Rules Public Sector Guidelines Do Not **Apply to Banks**

In a significant ruling, the Karnataka High Court has clarified that public sector guidelines issued by the Ministry of Heavy Industries and Public Enterprises do not apply to public sector banks, as banks are neither government departments nor public sector enterprises.

A division bench comprising Chief Justice N V Anjaria and Justice K V Aravind passed this order while setting aside an earlier order by a single judge, which had directed Vijaya Bank to refund an indemnity bond amount of Rs 3 lakh to an employee.

The case involved Abhimanyu Kumar, a chartered accountant who joined Vijaya Bank as Probationary Manager (Generalist) on November 2, 2011. Under Clause 11(k) of his selection letter, he was required to serve the bank for at least three years or pay an indemnity bond amount of Rs 3 lakh if he resigned before completing the service period. In 2012, Kumar secured a job with

Steel Authority of India Ltd (SAIL), resigned from the bank, and paid Rs 3 lakh, as per the bond conditions. Later, he approached the Karnataka High Court, claiming the bond was unfair and citing guidelines issued by the Department of Public Enterprises. The single judge allowed his plea in April 2023 and directed the bank to refund the amount. However, the division bench ruled that public sector banks, being nationalised banks, are governed by the Department of Financial Services under the Ministry of Finance, not the Ministry of Heavy Industries and Public Enterprises.

The bench noted that public sector enterprise guidelines apply only to government-owned corporations with distinct service conditions and lateral mobility options, and not to banks. This judgment reinforces the

distinction between public sector enterprises and nationalised banks, offering clarity on the applicable employment rules for bank em-

The Karnataka Cabinet, chaired by Chief Minister Siddaramaiah, has approved a Rs 1,323 crore sewage treatment project to benefit 110 villages that were merged into the BBMP limits nearly 20 years ago. This project will be implemented under the Karnataka Water Security and Disaster Resilience Programme, with assistance from the World Bank, to provide sustainable sewage solutions to localities lacking proper sanitation infrastructure.



The Cabinet also gave the green light for a Rs 475 crore project aimed at treating leachate stored in old landfills, a long-standing solid waste management challenge for Bengaluru.

In a significant cultural and political move, the Cabinet approved Rs 52.7 lakh for the construction of a grand statue of Dr B R Ambedkar in front of Krishna Rajendra Town Hall in Tumakuru, enhancing the Congress government's outreach to Dalit communities.

The healthcare sector received a boost with the approval of Rs 14 crore for a 200-seater auditorium at Sanjay Gandhi Trauma and Orthopaedic Institute in Jayanagar. Additionally, Rs 63 crore was sanctioned for the construction of a super-specialty hospital on the premises of Hassan Institute of Medical Sciences, strengthening advanced medical services in Hassan.

To address sea erosion, the government allocated Rs 13.4 crore for protection works at 25 vulnerable locations across Uttara Kannada district, which frequently experiences heavy rains and cyclones. In a high-profile legal matter, the Cabinet also decided to conditionally deposit Rs 3,400 crore in Transferable Development Rights (TDR) with the Supreme Court, related to the acquisition of Bangalore Palace Grounds for the widening of Ballari and Jayamahal Roads. This follows the Supreme Court's directive, ordering the state to deposit the amount within a week, based on a plea from the heirs of the Mysore royal family. The funds will remain inaccessible to the landowners until the final verdict.

The Cabinet also approved an amendment to the Professional Tax Act, increasing the professional tax from Rs 200 to Rs 300 per month, aimed at boosting state revenue.

Pending Bills of ₹8,925 Crore Will Be Cleared in **Phases: Minister Satish Jarkiholi**

₹8,925 crore pending from 2021-22 works

Public Works Minister Satish Jarkiholi assured in the Legislative Council on Wednesday that pending bills amounting to ₹8,925 crore owed to contractors will be cleared in a phased manner, following consultations with Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar.

MLC T.A. Saravana, Jarkiholi acknowledged that contractors, who have been awaiting payments for over two years, have already met with both the CM and



DyCM to seek immediate resolution of their financial woes. The minister admitted that these unpaid bills, primarily from works executed during 2021 and 2022, have caused severe financial distress among contractors.

The minister provided a detailed account of the current year's PWD budget, stating that ₹10,023 crore was allocated for the department, out of which ₹8,392 crore has already been released for ongoing works. Responding to a question raised by JDS The remaining ₹1,400 crore will be released by March-end.

However, the larger issue concerns the ₹8,925 crore in outstanding payments, which relate to previous govern-

ment-sanctioned works for which no budgetary provision was made. Jarkiholi explained that the PWD has already held discussions with the Finance Department to resolve this issue, adding that the government is committed to prioritizing the clearance of these long-pending dues.

Highlighting the contractors' plight, MLC T.A. Saravana expressed serious concern over the financial instability faced by the contractors, stating that some contractors have reached a point of desperation, with a few even threatening to commit suicide due to severe financial strain caused by non-payment.

The minister assured the Council that the government understands the gravity of the situation and is working to ensure payments are released in a phased and structured manner, balancing current fiscal constraints while addressing long-pending dues.

Jarkiholi further reiterated that the government would not delay payments unnecessarily, and efforts are being made to restore confidence among contractors to ensure continued infrastructure development across the state.

The Karnataka High Court has issued notices to the Registrar General, state government, and central government under rules framed using Article after hearing a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) challenging provisions of the Karnataka High Court Rules, 1959, which allow the destruction of court records after five years.

A division bench comprising Chief Justice N V Anjaria and Justice M I Arun issued the notices while hearing the petition filed by advocate N P Am-

Advocate Vilas Ranganath Datar, appearing on behalf of the petitioner, argued that the Karnataka High Court, as a court of record under Article 215 of the Constitution, should follow practices similar to the Supreme Court, which preserves records permanently



He contended that the provisions under Rule 3 of Chapter XX, which permits the destruction of records after 5 years, are not only inconsistent with the court's status as a court of record, but also undermine the purpose of judicial documentation and archival in-

The petition further highlighted that Rule 2 permits destruction after 30 years, while Rule 3 allows destruction after 5 years. The petitioner claimed this contradicts the necessity of retaining records permanently for the larger interest of justice, especially in cases where proceedings get delayed for various reasons.

ter required a comprehensive review, combining legal, administrative, and archival considerations. The court directed the Registrar General to submit a detailed report on the feasibility of preserving court records permanently. The case has been adjourned to March 19, when the court will consider the Registrar General's response along with inputs from the state and central governments.

The petition has brought renewed focus on court record management practices, particularly in high courts across the country, and could set a precedent for preserving judicial records in the future.

Karnataka Govt to Hike Milk Price Soon, ₹650 Crore Dues to Dairy Farmers to be Cleared

The Karnataka government has decided to increase milk prices to support dairy farmers while balancing consumer interests, Animal Husbandry Minister K Venkatesh informed the Legislative Council on Wednesday. The price revision is aimed at addressing farmers' demands and ensuring the sustainability of the dairy sector. Responding to a question by MLC Umashree, Venkatesh acknowledged that dairy farmers have been demanding an increase of Rs 10 per litre. He confirmed that the state government will soon announce a revised price structure, ensuring that both farmers' welfare and consumers' affordability are considered.

Venkatesh also highlighted that multiple consultations have been held to evaluate includes five months' pending dues for the impact of the proposed hike on the Karnataka Cooperative Milk Producers' Federation (KMF) and the overall dairy ecosystem. A final decision will be taken after further discussions with stakehold-



ers, including farmers' representatives and cooperative officials.

The minister provided data on incentive payments, revealing that 9,04,547 dairy farmers are awaiting payments. This 8.17 lakh general category farmers, two months' dues for 52,467 Scheduled Caste farmers, and four months' dues for 35,006 Scheduled Tribe farmers.

The total outstanding amount owed to

KMF and its affiliated farmers stands at approximately Rs 650 crore. Venkatesh assured that the Finance Department has already received a proposal for fund release, and the pending payments will be cleared soon to relieve farmers' financial distress. Additionally, Yathindra Siddaramaiah urged the government to release funds for purchasing 10 sheep per farmer under a National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC) scheme and to reintroduce the Pashu Bhagya programme, which offers subsidies for purchasing livestock for commercial purposes. Venkatesh said these requests have been forwarded to the Chief Minister, and efforts are being made to incorporate them into the upcoming budget.

The government reiterated its commitment to supporting dairy farmers, recognizing their critical role in rural economy and food security, while ensuring that consumers are not unduly burdened by price hikes.

Forest Minister Khandre Orders Recovery of 444 Acres from Indian Air Force in Bengaluru





Karnataka Forest Minister Eshwar B Khandre has directed the Forest Department to initiate the recovery of 444.12 acres of forest land currently in the possession of the Indian Air Force (IAF) at Jarakabande Kaval Reserve Forest and Peenya Plantations in Bengaluru.

This move comes shortly after the Forest Department served a similar notice to HMT to reclaim forest land in Peenya. According to official records, the land allotted to the IAF in 1987 was partially cancelled in 2017, when the repeatedly asked to restate government revoked the allotment of 452 acres. Despite this, the IAF continues to occupy the land, which remains classified as forest land.

Khandre has advised the IAF to apply for forest clearance and change of land use through the Parivesh Portal, governed by the Union Ministry of Environment, Forest, and Climate Change.

Man Kills 18-Year-Old Girl Over Rejected Marriage Proposal

A tragic incident unfolded in Belagavi city on Monday evening, where a 29-year-old man killed his 18-year-old girlfriend and then died by suicide after his marriage proposal was rejected. The accused, Prashant Kundekar, a painter from Yellur near Belagavi, had been in a relationship with Aishwarya Mahesh Lohar for over a year. However, Lohar's mother repeatedly insisted that Kundekar secure his financial stability before the family could agree to the marriage.

According to Belagavi Police Commissioner Iada Marbaniang, Kundekar was desperate to marry Lohar and frequently tried to convince her despite her mother's concerns. The couple met on Monday at the house

Bengaluru's Water Crisis Worsens as Enforcement on Treated Water Usage Lags

Bengaluru's water crisis continues to deepen despite Chief Minister Siddaramaiah's push for private apartments to adopt treated water usage to reduce the city's water demand. However, enforcement remains weak, resulting in limited compliance and worsening water scarcity.

While newly-constructed apartments have started using treated water, existing apartment complexes and commercial buildings have largely ignored the directive due to the lack of strict enforcement by the Karnataka State Pollution Control Board (KSPCB) and Bangalore Water Supply and Sewerage Board (BWSSB). This inaction has not only fueled rising demand for fresh water but also contributed to contamination of water bodies and groundwater pollution across the city. KSPCB officials admitted that while certain measures have been introduced, including a single-window clearance system for faster approvals, progress remains slow due to the challenges of integrating multiple agencies under one platform.

Additionally, Bengaluru's Vrishabhavathi Valley, which carries most of the city's sewage, continues to be severely polluted. Real-time water quality monitoring stations and environmental laboratories are being planned, but experts warn these efforts are delayed, and the existing water quality remains poor and unfit for consumption or



irrigation.

The crisis extends to environmental management, where the forest and environment department faces increasing human-wildlife conflicts due to encroachments, infrastructure projects, and weak enforcement around forest buffer zones. Projects like the Honnikeri Reserve and Blackbuck Sanctuary in Bidar remain stalled.

While the creation of an elephant and leop-

ard task force has been welcomed, forest officials are seeking increased funding for conflict mitigation, habitat improvement, and faster compensation payments for affected families and farmers.

Experts stress that without stronger enforcement on treated water use and comprehensive environmental protection measures, Bengaluru's water and ecological crises will only worsen in the coming years.

Never Faced a Black Mark in My Career: Karnataka DGP Shocked Over Stepdaughter Ranya Rao's Arrest in Gold Smuggling Case

Senior IPS officer Dr. K Ramachandra Rao, Director-General of Police (Karnataka State Police Housing Corporation), has expressed shock and disbelief following the arrest of his stepdaughter, Kannada actress Ranya Rao, in a high-profile gold smuggling case.

Ranya was taken into custody at Kempegowda International Airport in Bengaluru on Tuesday night by Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) officials after 14.8 kilograms of gold was allegedly found in her possession upon arrival from Dubai. Speaking to Media, Dr. Rao distanced himself from the controversy, asserting that his professional record remains spotless. "The law will do its job. There is no black mark on my career," he stated, adding that he learned about the incident only through media reports. He clarified that Ranya, the daughter of his second wife from her previous marriage, has been living separately with her husband. "She does not live with us. There might be some family issues," he added. On March 4, Ranya was produced before a special court for financial offences, where she was re-



manded to judicial custody until March the gold seized at the airport, the total 18. She underwent a medical examination at Bowring Hospital before being transferred to judicial custody.

Ranya claimed her Dubai visit was for business, but DRI officials allege she intended to smuggle the gold into India. Acting on a tip-off, DRI officials intercepted her just before she could clear airport security.

Following her arrest, the DRI raided her Lavelle Road residence and seized jewellery worth Rs 2.06 crore and cash amounting to Rs 2.67 crore. Including assets in the case are valued at Rs 17.29

Karnataka Home Minister Dr. G Parameshwara confirmed the DRI is leading the investigation, stating the state police would not conduct a parallel probe but would review any misuse of protocol if needed.

Congress MLA and Legal Advisor to the CM, AS Ponnanna, emphasized that Ranya would be treated like any other accused, regardless of her family back-

Mixed Reactions on Day 1 of BIFFes as Cinephiles Praise Pass Process but Slam Film Scheduling

The 16th edition of the Bengaluru International Film Festival (BIFFes) kicked off on Sunday, attracting thousands of cinephiles to Orion Mall, where they collected their delegate passes to attend the much-anticipated event. With 200 films from 60 countries lined up for screening across eight days, excitement ran high among film enthusiasts.

Attendees appreciated the smoother pass issuance process compared to previous years, with many praising the organisers for reducing delays and confusion. However, scheduling issues dampened the enthusiasm for some, as several must-watch films were slotted simultaneously across different screens.

Vivekananda Kodandaraman, a long-time BIFFes attendee, noted that while films



were starting on time — an improvement from past editions — the scheduling made it difficult to catch all the important films. On the first day, films from Spain, Greece, Brazil, and Uruguay were showcased, including Don't You Let Me Go, Kyuka: Before Summer's End, and Manas. Despite Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar's comments about the limited participation of the film fraternity, over 10,000 people registered, including 3,500 delegates and 6,500 film industry professionals and media personnel.

Actor and BIFFes ambassador Kishore Kumar G stressed the need to cultivate cinema awareness among viewers to elevate Kannada cinema's global appeal. Meanwhile, some cinephiles expressed frustration over the delayed release of the screening schedule, which was only made public late Saturday evening.

Suggestions like better signboards for firsttime attendees and adopting best practices from festivals like the International Film Festival of Kerala (IFFK) were raised. Many attendees hoped future editions would balance logistics and content to enhance the overall festival experience.





Yatnal Sparks Controversy by Calling Former Minister MP Renukacharya a Pig

In a fresh round of verbal attacks within Karnataka BJP, MLA Basavanagouda Patil Yatnal courted controversy on Thursday by referring to former minister MP Renukacharya as a "pig". This comes amid an ongoing tussle for the Chief Ministerial post and growing demands for a change in the BJP state leadership.

The war of words began after Renukacharya criticised Yatnal for his outspoken stance against BJP's internal family politics, especially targeting BS Yediyurappa and state BJP president BY Vijayendra. Renukacharya had accused Yatnal of being delirious and suggested he should be admitted to a hospital.

When reporters asked Yatnal to respond to Renukacharya's remarks, Yatnal fired back, saying, "I don't talk about pigs." Refusing to engage further, Yatnal reiterated that he would not waste his time responding to Renukacharya's tions.

The friction within the party has escalated, with Renukacharya accusing Yatnal of colluding with the Congress and supporting Chief Minister Siddaramaiah. Renukacharya alleged that Yatnal deliberately avoided participating in the BJP's Muda Padayatra, undermining the party's campaign efforts. The former minister further warned that any remarks against Yediyurappa would not be tolerated, and society would respond if Yatnal continued his attacks on the senior leader. Meanwhile, Yatnal also took a swipe at Vijayendra, reminding him that those accusing others of caste politics should remember Yediyurappa himself rose to prominence by positioning himself as a Lingayat leader. The escalating internal rift highlights the growing divide within Karnataka BJP, with leaders openly trading insults, leaving the party leadership to manage rising tensions ahead of future elec-



21 Km Link Road to Connect Satellite Town Ring Road with Bangalore-Chennai **Expressway**

The 21 km stretch of the Satellite Town Ring Road (STTR), being developed on Bengaluru's outskirts, is expected to be opened for traffic by the end of March. This link road will provide direct access to the Bangalore-Chennai Expressway, and motorists are urging authorities to complete the work

The STTR project, designed to connect Dabaspet to Hoskote, serves as a crucial bypass road for vehicles heading towards Tamil Nadu via Hoskote. This particular 21 km segment will act as a key link to the Bengaluru-Chennai Expressway, allowing commercial vehicles to access the expressway without entering the city center.

The 288 km long STTR project by 2027, with this initial link road nearing final construction stages. Officials expect the new corridor to significant-

TPN Correspondent | **Bengal-** ly reduce commercial vehicle traffic within Bengaluru, creating a seamless bypass option and speeding up travel towards Chennai.

The National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) is executing the STTR project at an estimated cost of ₹4,479 crore, divided into five sections. The first 21 km section is almost ready, while tenders for the remaining 144.25 km of road work are expected to be issued soon. The Bangalore-Chennai Expressway, which crosses through Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, and Tamil Nadu, is already operational in Karnataka. Once fully integrated with the STTR, it is expected to cut travel time between Bengaluru and Chennai and improve connectivity to other cities like Mangaluru. With features such as 6 lanes, is slated for full completion 11 underpasses, and provisions for high-speed travel up to 120 kmph, the project promises to ease urban congestion and boost regional connectivity.

financial crisis. He said that boards and corporations responsible for SC/ST welfare have been left without funds, further weakening social welfare initiatives.

Meanwhile, Leader of Opposition in the Legislative Council Chalavadi Narayanaswamy announced that the BJP will intensify protests across the state, mobilizing Dalit organizations and community leaders to oppose the alleged misuse of SC/ST welfare funds.

The BJP leaders reiterated that schemes intended to uplift marginalised communities should not be sacrificed to fulfil political promises, warning that the party will take the fight to every district if neces-

The protest is expected to continue on Friday, with BJP leaders vowing to hold the government accountable.

BJP's Sunil Kumar Demands Release of Caste Census, Questions CM's Commitment to OBCs

Senior BJP leader V Sunil Kumar on Wednesday demanded that the Congress government immediately table the Socio-Economic and Educational Census, popularly known as the caste census, in the Assembly for debate before the Budget session ends on March 21.

Speaking in reply to the Governor's address, Sunil Kumar challenged Chief Minister Siddaramaiah to make the long-pending report public if he truly cared about the welfare of OBCs. "Over Rs 165 crore was spent on this caste census. If you have genuine concern for OBCs, why are you hiding the report? Are you waiting to use it only when your position is

TPN Correspondent | Bengaluru under threat?" he asked, hinting at internal rifts within the Congress cabinet over the matter. He further questioned why Siddaramaiah, who claims to represent the Backward Classes, has been silent on the report despite his swift action in securing the Lokayukta probe report on the MUDA case within three months.

> Sunil Kumar also criticised the Congress government for selectively implementing the recommendations of the Bhaktavatsala Commission. He pointed out that while the government accepted recommendations on political reservation for OBCs, it rejected proposals for sub-classification of OBC quotas into four categories to ensure equita-



ble benefit distribution among all castes.

Adding to the political heat, Sunil Kumar claimed there is widespread administrative collapse in Karnataka due to ongoing speculation about leadership change. "There's uncertainty about who will be the next Chief Minister after the Budget session. Some say Deputy CM DK Shivakumar's camp would prefer Home Minister G Parameshwara shifting to Delhi, clearing the way for Shivakumar," he said, fueling speculation over growing infighting in the Congress ranks.

Actress Ramya Reacts to DK Shivakumar's Controversial 'Nut-Bolt' Comment

A comment made by Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar during the inauguration of the Bangalore International Film Festival (BIFFes) has triggered strong reactions from artists and opposition parties alike. Amid the ongoing controversy, actress and former MP Ramya has come forward to offer a balanced view on the statement.

Reacting to the uproar, Ramya said, "What DCM DK Shivakumar said was wrong in terms of wording, but his intention was not to hurt the film industry. I feel he may have used the wrong expression, but his intention was to stress the importance of participation by



artists in public causes." Ramya, who has previously commented on the relationship between cinema and politics, reiterated that artists have a responsibility to support movements concerning land,



water, and language. She also pointed out that the mutual support once seen between cinema and politics is now missing, and that rekindling such a connection is essential.

DK Shivakumar expressed his frustration over the low participation of film artists in the Mekedatu Padayatra, remarking that he knew how to tighten the nuts and bolts of those who ignored public causes after seeking political help when needed.

While Ramya defended the intent behind the statement, she acknowledged the poor choice of words, which led to backlash not only from the film fraternity but also from opposition parties, who accused DK Shivakumar of threatening artists.

The incident has now become a hot topic, with political and film circles closely watching how both DK Shivakumar and the state government will ad-The controversy erupted after dress the growing dissent.

Congress Worker Arrested for Writing PUC Exam on Behalf of Student in Kalaburagi

A shocking case of exam malpractice surfaced in Kalaburagi during the ongoing second PUC examinations, leading to the arrest of a Congress worker. On Wednesday, March 5, police apprehended Sampurna Patil, a Congress worker, for impersonating a student and writing the Political Science exam in her place.

The incident occurred at Milind College, which is associated with the family of AICC President Mallikarjun Kharge. Patil was caught writing the exam

raising serious questions about exam integrity.

The irregularity was exposed when Dalit Sena activists, acting on a tip-off, visited the college and confronted those involved. Upon questioning, the impersonation was confirmed, leading to the college principal filing a formal complaint with local police. Sampurna Patil was subsequently arrested.

NHRC Takes Action Over Ostracism of 30 People in Tamil Nadu Village

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has initiated suo motu cognisance of a case involving the ostracisation of 30 individuals from eight families by a village chief in Sambavarvadakarai, Tenkasi district, Tamil Nadu. The incident, which stems from a land dispute, has raised serious human rights concerns, leading the NHRC to intervene.

Reports suggest that the ostracised families were prohibited from accessing essential services, such as local stores, and were barred from communicating with other residents of the village. The discriminatory actions of the village chief led the affected families to protest in front of the office of the District Collector, demanding action. However, rather than taking strict measures against the village chief, the Revenue Divisional Officer reportedly attempted to resolve the issue by organizing a peace talk with the chief to have his instructions revoked. In response to the re-

Correspondent | Tamil ports, the NHRC has issued a notice to the District Collector of Tenkasi, Tamil Nadu, seeking a detailed report on the matter within two weeks. The Commission's intervention underscores the gravity of the situation and its commitment to upholding human rights, particularly in cases involving social ostracism and discrimination.

> The NHRC's action highlights the need for swift and effective measures to address instances of human rights violations, especially in rural areas where such practices often go unnoticed or unchecked. The Commission has urged the authorities to take appropriate legal action against those responsible for the ostracisation and to ensure that the affected families' rights to access public services and communicate freely are restored.

> As investigations continue, the NHRC's involvement is expected to bring greater attention to this case and encourage the enforcement of stronger protections against social exclusion in rural communities.

Heat Wave Hits Coastal Karnataka, Temperatures Soar Beyond 40°C

Coastal Karnataka is experiencing a significant heat wave, with temperatures soaring above 40°C across various locations. According to the State Natural Disaster Monitoring Centre (KSNDMC), the highest temperature recorded in the state was 40.1°C in Sullia Hobli between February 28 and March 1, marking an intense heat spike in the region. Other areas in Dakshina Kannada and Uttara Kannada districts also recorded extreme temperatures, with Panemangalore (Bantwal) reaching 39.1°C, Uppinangady at 39.5°C, and Kadaba recording 39°C. In Uttara Kannada, Savantvada peaked at 39.9°C, Mavinakurve (Honnavar) at 39.5°C, and Ghadasaya (Karwar) at 39.8°C. Despite these high tempera-

tures, the overall state temperatures have remained within the normal range, fluctuating between -1.5°C to 1.5°C. However, the intense heat has raised concerns about the discomfort levels due to high humidity, ranging between 40-50%. With maximum air temperatures between 37-38°C, the perceived temperature for the human body has been reported to feel like 40-50°C, leading to increased discomfort for residents in the region.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has issued a heatwave warning for Coastal Karnataka, particularly for March 1 and 2, and the hot and humid conditions are expected to persist on March 3. The IMD also forecasts no significant changes in the maximum and minimum temperatures for South Interior Karnataka in the coming days. In North Interior Karnataka, temperatures are expected to remain stable for the next three days before gradually decreasing.

With such extreme temperatures, the public is advised to take precautions, including staying hydrated and avoiding direct exposure to the sun during peak heat hours.

Kannada Actress Ranya Rao Arrested for Gold Smuggling

Straps Bars to Thighs to Evade Detection

- Ranya Rao arrested for smuggling 14.2 kg gold
- Gold worth ₹12.86 crore hidden with tape and bandages
- DRI investigates possible links to a smuggling syndicate

Kannada film actress Ranya Rao was arrested at Bengaluru International Airport on March 3 for attempting to smuggle 14.2 kg of gold, valued at ₹12.86 crore, into the country. According to sources, the 33-year-old actress had concealed the gold bars by strapping them to her thighs with tape and bandages in a bid to avoid detection by Customs officials.

Rao, who is the stepdaughter of a senior DGP-rank IPS officer in Karnataka, was detained by officials from the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) after they received intelligence about her arrival at the airport with the gold contraband. The authorities acted swiftly and intercepted her as she attempted to pass through customs.

The gold bars, which were cleverly hidden, were found in her possession as she tried to board a flight from Dubai to Bengaluru. The smuggling operation was part of a larger investigation by the DRI, which has been closely monitoring attempts



to smuggle precious metals through various international airports in India. Ranya Rao, who has worked in several Kannada films, has now been taken into custody, and investigations are ongoing. The actress' connections to a high-ranking police official have added a layer of complexity to the case, prompting further scrutiny of her activities.

The arrest has sparked considerable media attention, with many questioning how someone with such connections could have been involved in such a high-profile smuggling operation. The DRI is continuing its investigation into the matter to uncover whether Rao was acting alone or was part of a larger smuggling syndicate.

This incident highlights the growing issue of gold smuggling in India, with officials ramping up efforts to track and stop such illegal activities. Rao's arrest has sent shockwaves through the film industry, which now finds itself grappling with the involvement of a well-known figure in a criminal

Karnataka Cabinet Deposits Rs 3,400 Crore TDR for Bangalore **Palace**

On Wednesday, the Karnataka Cabinet made a significant decision to deposit Transferable Development Rights (TDR) worth Rs 3,400 crore with the Supreme Court as compensation for the land surrounding the Bangalore Palace, which is needed for the widening of Ballari and Jayamahal roads. The deposit will be conditional, as the state government plans to petition the court against allowing the erstwhile Mysuru royal family, the Wadiyars, to use the TDR until a resolution is reached regarding the ownership of the palace land.

The Supreme Court had recently instructed the state government to deposit the TDR within a week following a plea by the Wadiyars, the former royal family of Mysuru. The controversy stems from the proposed land acquisition for the widening of the two roads, which would require land near the Bangalore Palace. In response to the court's direction in December last year, the state government had initially decided to issue the TDR to the Wadiyars for the land acquisition, but later passed an ordinance suspending the acquisition of around 15 acres and 39 guntas of land.

This move is part of ongoing negotiations regarding the ownership of the palace land, which has been a point of



contention for several years. The state government's decision to deposit the TDR with the court aims to comply with the legal directive while also addressing concerns about the ownership dispute over the land.

As part of the petition, the Karnataka government has raised objections about the use of the TDR by the Wadiyars, arguing that the issue of ownership must be settled first. The case is expected to have far-reaching implications on the balance between heritage preservation, urban development, and the rights of the royal family over the Bangalore Palace land.

Sri Lanka Requests India to Curb Fishermen's Illegal Activity in Its Waters

The Sri Lankan government has called on India to take action against its fishermen who are allegedly entering Sri Lankan waters illegally to fish, a practice that has caused significant concerns in the northern parts of the island nation. Minister of Transport, Highways, Ports, and Civil Aviation Bimal Rathnayaka emphasized that such a move by India would be deeply appreciated by the people in northern Sri Lanka, especially in regions like Jaffna, where fishing is the primary source of livelihood.

Rathnayaka's remarks were made ahead of a possible visit by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Sri Lanka next month. He underscored that while India has been a valuable partner in aiding Sri Lanka in various areas, curbing illegal fishing by Indian trawlers in Sri Lankan waters would be an immense gesture of goodwill for the people of Jaffna and surrounding regions. The minister pointed out that the local communities in places like Mannar and Thalaimannar rely solely on fishing to



support their families and any disruption to their livelihood caused by illegal fishing activities poses a grave concern for them.

Rathnayaka also recalled India's significant contributions during Sri Lanka's internal conflict with the LTTE, particularly in offering protection to the people of northern Sri Lanka. He acknowledged the support India provided during those challenging times and expressed the nation's gratitude. The call to curb illegal fishing activities comes as part of broader efforts to maintain peaceful and cooperative relations between India and Sri Lanka, especially as Prime Minister Modi's visit to the island nation approaches.

The request highlights ongoing issues over maritime boundaries and the need for better management of fishing resources in the region. It also signals the importance of diplomatic and collaborative measures to resolve such issues while ensuring the livelihoods of local communities are protected.



DMK rejects Bharat's Hindi and embraces British English

- DMK maintains strong opposition to Hindi as a national language.
- Party selectively rejects Sanskrit while embracing Western influences.
- Critics accuse DMK of fostering regional divisions through linguistic policies.
- Party's stance on Brahminism often conflates it with Hinduism itself.
- Ideological contradictions emerge in DMK's cultural preferences.

The Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) has long been known for its ideological stance against the imposition of Hindi, positioning itself as a defender of Tamil linguistic identity. However, its selective approach to cultural influences has sparked debates on whether the party's rejection of Hindi and Sanskrit aligns with genuine regional pride or a broader ideological bias.

One of the most significant aspects of DMK's policies is its firm opposition to Hindi as a national language. While the party argues that promoting Hindi threatens Tamil heritage, critics point out that Hindi serves as a common medium for millions across India, communication and national integration. The DMK's rigid stance, instead of encouraging inclusivity, risks deepening linguistic and regional divides within the

consistently shown skepticism towards Sanskrit, a language deeply embedded in India's historical and religious traditions. While the party often frames its opposition as resistance to Brahminical dominance, it raises concerns about whether this rejection is driven by a call for social justice or a broader disregard for elements associated with



Hindu culture. Sanskrit is not merely a religious language; it forms the foundation of many Indian languages and classical literature. Dismissing it entirely could be seen as a rejection of India's civilizational heritage.

The party's stance on Brahminism has also drawn criticism over the years. While caste-based inequalities are Adding to this, the DMK has a reality that require social reform, DMK's rhetoric often portrays Brahmins as symbols of oppression, sometimes equating Brahminism with Hinduism itself. This approach, rather than fostering meaningful discussions on caste reform, risks alienating certain sections of society. Critics argue that instead of working towards inclusive social progress, the DMK's narrative contributes to divisions within Hindu society.


A striking contradiction in the party's ideological stance is its approach to foreign influences. While DMK strongly opposes Hindi and Sanskrit, it has been notably open to Western cultural elements. The adoption of names like 'Stalin' within the party and its emphasis on English raises questions about its selective embrace of external influences. While globalization has made English an important medium, the outright rejection of indigenous linguistic and cultural elements while readily accepting foreign ones presents an ideological paradox. This inconsistency fuels criticism that DMK's opposition to Hindi and Sanskrit is less about protecting Tamil culture

and more about an ideological aversion to India's indigenous heritage.

Furthermore, the DMK's resistance to Hindi and Sanskrit often overlooks the multicultural fabric of India. The nation thrives on its diverse linguistic and cultural identities, and rather than opposing certain languages, political leadership could focus on creating a more inclusive framework where regional languages coexist with national communication needs. Striking a balance between linguistic pride and national integration would serve the country's broader interests rather than deepening regional fault lines. While the DMK's advocacy for Tamil identity and social justice is significant, an overly rigid stance on linguistic and cultural issues may limit its national appeal. A more balanced approach one that acknowledges Tamil heritage while respecting India's linguistic diversity would contribute to unity rather than division. True progress does not come from rejecting certain traditions outright but through an inclusive evolution that embraces all aspects of India's rich cultural identity.



The Debate Over Delimitation: Balancing Demography and Democracy in India's "Second Republic

As India approaches the dawn of its "Second Republic," the proposed delimitation exercise has reignited the debate over the long-standing paradox between demography and democracy. Central to th democratic principle of political equality, delimitation aims to ensure fair and proportional representation in Parliament by adjusting constituency boundaries to reflect population changes. However, this process has become increasingly contentious, as large republics like India struggle to balance competing territorial, demographic, ethnic, and factional considerations.

Delimitation in India has historically been an important tool to ensure that the distribution of parliamentary seats accurately reflects shifts in population. Yet, since 1976, this process has been frozen, largely to prevent penalizing states that have effectively controlled their population growth, particularly those in the southern part of the country. As a result, states like Uttar Pradesh and Bihar, with significantly larger populations, remain underrepresented in comparison to southern states such as Tamil Nadu and Kerala, which have smaller populations but proportionately more parliamentary seats. This imbalance, known as malapportionment, has fostered political tensions, especially as the country grapples with evolving demographic realities.


The current system, where southern states with lower population growth retain higher representation, has led to growing dissatisfaction in states like Uttar Pradesh and Bihar. These northern states, with rapidly increasing populations, argue that they are disproportionately disadvantaged in terms of political power. Meanwhile, southern states continue to hold a relatively higher number of seats, despite their slowing population growth. The proposed delimitation exercise in 2029 is poised to address this imbalance, but it raises concerns that it could further shift political power toward the more populous northern states, exacerbating tensions and potentially upsetting the political equilibrium.

India Prepares for a Scorching Summer: Heat Waves and Water Shortages Expected

India is bracing itself for an unusually hot summer, with temperatures forecast to exceed normal levels, and heatwaves threatening to disrupt daily life in many regions. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has already warned of a searing summer ahead, and the forecast is backed by recent data. February of this year marked the warmest February since 1901, with both the minimum and maximum temperatures across the country significantly surpassing normal levels. This intense heat is expected to continue, with temperatures remaining above normal across most parts of India in the coming weeks.

The forecast for the summer holds particular significance as it will have far-reaching impacts on the country's economy and various sectors that affect people's lives. The early onset of the summer season means it heat-related illnesses. could be a longer and more prolonged peritemperatures, the IMD predicts an increase in the number of heatwave events, which are expected to surpass the climatological normal. These heatwaves pose a serious health risk, potentially leading to heat-related illnesses and even fatalities. They can also disrupt work, productivity, and daily routines, making it imperative for governments to prepare adequately.

Although there are existing heatwave action plans and protocols, effective implementation remains a challenge. Governments must issue timely public advisories to alert citizens about the heatwave risks and encourage them to take appropriate precautions. Ensuring efficient water management and bolstering healthcare services will be crucial in mitigating the impacts of extreme heat. Public health campaigns should emphasize the importance of staying hydrated, avoiding direct exposure to the sun during peak hours, and taking preventive measures to reduce the risk of


Managing AI Governance: A Fight Against Entropy

As the global AI ecosystem rapidly evolves, the lack of consistent governance has led to a state of increasing disorder, a phenomenon akin to entropy in thermodynamics. Entropy refers to the natural progression of systems towards disorder without external intervention or energy input. This principle provides a valuable lens through which we can understand the challenges in AI governance today. Without intentional and structured interventions, the AI landscape will inevitably drift toward chaos, as demonstrated by recent controversies and missteps in the in-

AI systems, much like any complex system, tend toward disorder when left unregulated. Examples of this are evident in issues like unregulated data harvesting, model releases without safety checks, and the growing gap between open and closed systems. These patterns reflect the natural tendency of complex systems to devolve into chaotic states when not actively managed. For instance, Google's Gemini Advanced model faced a public backlash after generating historically inaccurate and offensive images, highlighting how the lack of proper safeguards can lead to significant consequences. Similarly, OpenAI's temporary removal of election-related content policies, followed by a swift reinstatement, revealed the disorder that can arise from inconsistent gover-

Further demonstrating this principle, DeepSeek's release of open-source models without adequate safety mechanisms disrupted the AI ecosystem, creating new opportunities for misuse. This scenario reinforces the need for proactive governance to maintain order and prevent harmful outcomes. However, not all interventions are equal. Poorly designed regulations can inadvertently create new forms of disorder, such as bureaucratic inefficiencies or stifled innovation.

The European Union's AI Act, for example, is a structured attempt to impose order on the AI landscape, classifying AI applications by risk levels and mandating transparency and human oversight for high-risk systems. Similarly, Chi-



na has implemented stringent measures like real-name verification for generative AI users and content filtering, aiming to reduce disorder within its ecosystem. While these efforts face criticism, they illustrate the need for governance frameworks that provide structure and mitigate

Going forward, effective AI governance requires continuous, adaptive energy input. One-time regulations are not enough; systems must be flexible and responsive to evolving technological dynamics. AI governance should focus on establishing boundary conditions that maintain safety, transparency, and accountability, allowing for flexibility within these parameters. Multi-stakeholder collaborations, like the Frontier Model Forum, show the importance of shared responsibility in managing AI's complex systems.

Ultimately, as AI continues to shape our future, we must recognize that governance is the energy we invest to fight the entropy that threatens to consume it. Effective intervention, sustained through thoughtful collaboration and transparency, is essential to guide the technology toward beneficial outcomes for society.

Assessment of reciprocal tariff hinges on India-US trade talks: **FM Sitaraman**

J&K economy expected to grow at 7.06 % in 2024-25: CMOmar Abdullah

India has forecasted a 7.06% growth for Jammu and Kashmir's economy in real terms for the year 2024-25. The survey also expects the nominal Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) of J&K to rise by 11.19% during this period.

Chief Minister Omar Abdullah presented the Economic Survey Report in the J&K Legislative Assembly on Thursday. Ukrainian law still prevents Zelenskyy-Putin peace talks, says Kremlin

- Kremlin cites Ukrainian decree as obstacle to peace talks

A Ukrainian decree from 2022, which forbids negotiations with Russian President Vladimir Putin, continues to pose a significant challenge to potential peace talks between Russia and Ukraine, Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov stated on Wednesday. According to Peskov, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy remains legally prohibited from engaging in negotiations with Russia, a situation that complicates any efforts to bring an end to the ongoing war.

Peskov acknowledged that it was a positive sign that Zelenskyy had expressed a willingness to negotiate peace with Russia, however, he clarified that "the details have not changed yet," referring to the existing le-



gal restrictions imposed by the Ukrainian decree. This decree, which was issued in 2022, explicitly prevents direct negotiations with the Russian leadership, effectively barring the Ukrainian president from engaging in any peace talks unless the decree is amended or lifted.

The Kremlin spokesperson's remarks underline the significant diplomatic and legal hurdles that must be overcome to facilitate negotiations. Despite Zelenskyy's stated openness to peace talks, the 2022 decree appears to restrict the Ukrainian government's ability to take concrete steps toward negotiations.

This situation has raised questions about how peace talks might proceed, and who, if anyone, could serve as a representative from Ukraine in any future dialogue. With both sides continuing to maintain firm positions, the conflict, which began nearly three years ago, shows no signs of abating without some form of negotiation. As international efforts to mediate peace intensify, Peskov's comments highlight the ongoing complexities surrounding the war in Ukraine. The Kremlin's stance indicates that for any meaningful peace talks to take place, significant political and legal adjustments may be required, both within Ukraine and on the international stage.

India Condemns Security Breach During Jaishankar's UK Visit Amid Khalistan Protests

The Indian government strongly condemned a security breach during External Affairs Minister (EAM) S. Jaishankar's visit to the United Kingdom, following a protest by pro-Khalistan separatists outside Chatham House in London. The protest, which took place while Jaishankar was engaged in a diplomatic discussion inside, saw a group of demonstrators waving flags and shouting slogans.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) expressed its disapproval of the "provocative activities" of the separatist group, calling it a misuse of democratic freedoms. "We have seen the footage of a breach of security during the visit of EAM to the UK. We condemn the provocative activities of this small group of separatists and extremists. We deplore the misuse of democratic freedoms by such elements. We expect the host government in such cases to fully live up to their diplomatic obligations," the MEA stated.

Despite the protest, EAM Jaishankar continued with his planned diplomatic engagements, including meetings with UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer, Foreign Secretary David Lammy, and other senior leaders. On Tuesday, Jaishankar also met with UK Home Secretary Yvette Cooper, where they discussed various issues, including talent flow, people-to-people exchanges, and joint efforts to combat trafficking and extremism. He later posted on social media about the meeting, emphasizing the productive dialogue.

This protest is not the first instance of Khalistani groups demonstrating in the UK. In January, pro-Khalistan extremists staged a protest outside the Indian High Commission in London, and in another incident, they disrupted the screening of the film *Emergency* at a cinema in Harrow, London.

In response to such actions, MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal reiterated India's concerns about the violent protests and intimidation tactics used by "anti-India" groups. "Freedom of speech and expression cannot be applied selectively, and those obstructing it must be held accountable," he stated.

Jaishankar's visit also included talks on the India-UK Free Trade Agreement (FTA) and bilateral economic cooperation, along with discussions on global issues like the Ukraine conflict

Donald Trump Offers One-Month Relief For Automakers, Pauses Tariffs

Bangladesh's interim government Chief Adviser, Muhammad Yunus, has revealed that Dhaka sent formal letters to India requesting the extradition of former Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, but received no official response from New Delhi. Yunus, in an interview with UKbased Sky News, asserted that Hasina would face trial for "crimes against humanity" in Bangladesh, with the state-run BSS news agency reporting his statements.

Hasina, 77, fled Bangladesh on August 5 last year amid a massive student-led protest that led to the collapse of her 16-year rule under the Awami League. Following her departure, the Bangladesh International Crimes Tribunal (ICT) issued arrest warrants for Hasina and several of her close associates, including former ministers, military officers, and civil officials, accusing them of crimes against humanity and genocide.a

Yunus emphasized that Hasina, along with her family and associates, would face trial either in person or in absentia, even if she remains in India. Despite Bangladesh's formal communication to India, Yunus confirmed that the Indian government had not responded officially to the extradition request. Last year, India acknowledged receiving a "note verbale" from the Bangladesh High Commission but refrained from commenting on the matter.

The accusations against Hasina involve her use of security forces and police to orchestrate the abduction, torture, and murder of hundreds



of activists. However, Hasina denies the allegations, claiming political persecution. Yunus also criticized the "House of Mirrors," a secret jail where detainees were allegedly tortured and murdered, calling it "the ugliest thing" he had ever seen.

Hasina's departure, along with many of her aides and those linked to a network of secret jails, has left Bangladesh struggling to address the scope of the alleged crimes. The violent crackdown on protesters in July and August, which resulted in the deaths of up to 1,400 people according to the UN, further escalated tensions. Yunus added that over 1,500 people, including students and workers, were killed during the protests against Hasina's govern-

Ukraine Seeks Talks with US After Intelligence Sharing Suspended Amid Rising Tensions



Ukraine announced plans to initiate fresh talks with the United States after Washington suspended its intelligence-sharing with Kyiv, marking a significant setback for Ukraine as it continues its battle against Russia's invasion. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, who has been trying to manage the fallout from a tense meeting with former US President Donald Trump last week, stated that Ukrainian and American teams have started working on the upcoming discussions, although no specifics regarding the timing or location were provided.

This development follows the US's recent decision to halt military aid to Ukraine, further intensifying fears in Kyiv and across Europe that Ukraine may be forced into a peace agreement that favors Russia. Zelensky emphasized that the ultimate goal is a lasting peace, not a temporary ceasefire, and expressed hope that coordinated efforts, particularly with US leadership, could bring an end to the war.

In a parallel development, French President Emmanuel Macron suggested that European military forces could be deployed to Ukraine once a peace deal is reached, ensuring that Russia does not invade again. Macron's statement adds another layer of complexity to the ongoing international dialogue surrounding Ukraine's future and the need for robust security guarantees.

Meanwhile, Trump has made ending the war a priority in his foreign policy. In a speech to



the US Congress, he read a letter from Zelensky expressing willingness for peace talks, though Trump has not yet outlined a clear plan for such discussions. Zelensky has been vocal about seeking security guarantees from the US to prevent future Russian aggression.

On the battlefield, Russia continues its territorial gains, capturing another small village in Ukraine's eastern Donetsk region. The slowdowns in Russia's advance, as reported by the Institute for the Study of War, reflect a mixed battlefield picture as both sides regroup amidst the shifting diplomatic landscape.

As Zelensky prepares for an upcoming Brussels summit, his efforts to maintain Western support and secure a lasting peace remain at the forefront of Ukraine's strategy.

India's engineering exports to US touch USD 1.62 billion in Jan



India's engineering goods exports have es, including nationalistic trade policies, shown impressive growth in January 2025, continuing their upward trajectory despite challenges in the global market. The country's engineering goods exports to the United States, its top destination, grew by 18 percent year-on-year, reaching \$1.62 billion. Overall, engineering exports in January totaled \$9.42 billion, marking a 7.44 percent growth compared to \$8.77 billion during the same period last year, according to the Engineering Exports Promotion Council (EEPC) data.

This growth is particularly notable as it comes amid geopolitical tensions and rising global trade protectionism. are putting significant pressure on businesses. Chadha stressed the importance of continuous government support, particularly in export credit and technology, to maintain India's competitiveness in global markets.

Among India's major engineering export destinations, countries such as Germany, Mexico, Turkey, South Africa, France, Japan, Nepal, and Bangladesh experienced positive growth in January. However, exports to the UK, Saudi Arabia, Malaysia, China, Italy, and Spain recorded a decline.

January's growth was mainly driven by exports in sectors like aircraft, spacecraft and parts, electrical machinery and equipment, automobiles and auto components, industrial machinery, iron and steel products, and medical and scientific instruments.

Chadha emphasized the resilience of the Cumulatively, India's engineering exports reached \$96.75 billion in the April-January period of FY25, reflecting a 9.82 percent increase from the previous year. Engineering goods accounted for 25.86 percent of India's total merchandise exports in January, underlining the sector's crucial role in India's economy.

India's GDP Growth Projected at 6.5% for FY2026 Amid Geopolitical and Trade Challenges

India's real GDP growth is expected to remain steady at 6.5% in fiscal year 2026, despite challenges arising from geopolitical uncertainties and trade-related issues, including the US tariff actions, according to a report by Crisil Intelligence released on Thursday.

Crisil's forecast for India's economy relies on two primary factors: the continuation of normal monsoons and the expectation that commodity prices will stay soft, helping to stabilize food prices. The report also highlights that lower borrowing costs, cooling food inflation, and tax benefits announced in the Union Budget 2025-2026 are likely to boost discretionary consump-

Crisil Intelligence noted that India's growth is returning to pre-pandemic levels as fiscal impulse normalizes and the high-base effect fades. Despite this, high-frequency Purchasing Managers Index (PMI)



data shows India's economic resilience, with the country continuing to lead among major economies.

Amish Mehta, Managing Director and CEO of Crisil Ltd., emphasized that India's resilience is being tested, but the country has built safeguards over the past few years against external shocks, such as strong economic growth, a low current account deficit, manageable external public debt, and adequate foreign exchange reserves. These factors provide India with ample policy flexibility. Mehta also pointed out that consumption-driven

rural and urban demand will be crucial for short-term growth.

In the medium term, continued investments and efficiency improvements are expected to drive growth. Crisil forecasts that the manufacturing sector will grow at an average rate of 9% annually from fiscal 2025 to fiscal 2031, up from 6% in the pre-pandemic decade. The services sector, while growing at a slower pace, will remain a major driver of overall economic growth. Consequently, the share of manufacturing in GDP is projected to rise to 20% by fiscal 2025, up from 17%.

Looking ahead, Crisil predicts continued easing of food inflation, which will help moderate overall inflation. In fiscal 2025, inflation decreased mainly due to lower non-food inflation, although food inflation saw an uptick. The agency also anticipates another 50-75 basis point reduction in rates in the coming fiscal year.

Reliance Industries Faces \$2.81 Billion Demand in Natural Gas Dispute After Delhi HC Ruling

Reliance Industries Limited (RIL) is ONGC's block KG-DWN-98/2, which facing a \$2.81 billion demand from the government following a favorable ruling from the Delhi High Court in a longstanding natural gas migration dispute.

The company, along with its partner BP, is accused of selling gas that allegedly migrated from the adjoining block of state-owned Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC).

The dispute dates back to 2016 when the government raised an initial claim of \$1.55 billion against RIL and its partners. The government had argued that part of the gas sold from RIL's KG-D6 block in the Bay of Bengal had, in fact, migrated from is adjacent to RIL's operations.

On February 14, 2025, the Delhi High Court issued a significant ruling, overturning an international arbitration tribunal's decision that had cleared RIL and BP of any liability. The tribunal had earlier ruled that RIL and BP were not responsible for any compensation to the government for the sale of the gas. However, the court's decision has now paved the way for the government to raise a new demand of \$2.81 billion, which RIL has contested.

In response to the ruling, RIL issued a statement on Tuesday, asserting that it had received legal advice stating that both the judgment from the Delhi High Court and the provisional demand by the Petroleum Ministry were "unsustainable." The company emphasized that it is taking legal steps to challenge the judgment and has no expectation of any liability arising from the demand notice.

The dispute centers around the extraction and sale of gas from RIL's KG-D6 block, with the government claiming that part of the gas originated from the ONGC block, which is located adjacent to RIL's territory. The case has been a contentious one for several years, and this new development marks another chapter in the ongoing legal battle between the company and the government.



Despite various requests over the years, there has been no push to build one, meaning that critically ill individuals or expectant mothers must travel to nearby Rome for medical treatment. The lack of a hospital is not due to a lack of resources but is a result of Vatican City's limited size – it spans just 118 acres – and the presence of high-quality healthcare facilities in

This lack of medical infrastructure also explains why no births have occurred in the country since its establishment. Vatican City, with a population of around 800-900 people, is primarily home to senior Roman Catholic clergy. The absence of a maternity ward in the country means that any childbirth must take place outside its borders.

Despite its small size, Vatican City experiences a surprisingly high crime rate compared to other nations. This is mainly due to the millions of tourists who visit the area, often becoming targets for petty crimes like pickpocketing, purse snatching, and shoplifting.

Interestingly, Vatican City is also home to the world's smallest railway station, Citta Vaticano. Originally built during the reign of Pope Pius XI, this station is designated for cargo transportation and is not used for passenger trains.

Apart from Vatican City, the Pitcairn Islands, a British overseas territory, and Antarctica - a research-focused continent - also have rare occurrences of births, making Vatican City's 96-year record a truly unique one.
