Telangana Opposes Almatti Dam Height Increase: Uttam Kumar Reddy

Telangana Food and Civil Supplies Minister Uttam Ku-mar Reddy has made it clear that the State Government strongly opposes the proposed increase in the height of the Almatti Dam in Karnataka. Speaking to reporters, the Minister stated that the matter is currently under consideration in the Supreme Court of India, and Telangana will put forth its objections with full force. He announced that he would personally go to Delhi to present the State's case and argue against the proposal.

yderabad, Sept 21:

"The Telangana Government will not allow any injustice to be done to the people of the State. We are opposed to the Almatti Dam height increase and will fight legally to protect our rightful share of Krishna waters," Uttam Kumar Reddy asserted.

The Almatti Dam, lo-

cated across the Krishna River in Karnataka, has been a point of contention among riparian states for decades. Telangana fears that any further increase in its storage capacity would adversely affect the inflows into its projects and reduce its share of water, especially in times of drought.

Minister Uttam Kumar Reddy also addressed the ongoing inquiry into the Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation Project. He said that the government is committed to a transparent investigation, and appropriate legal action will be taken against those found guilty of irregularities, regardless of their political or administrative standing. "No one is above the law. If there are violations, action will be initiated strictly in accordance with the law," he stressed.

yderabad, Sept 21: A powerful thunderstorm accompanied by heavy rains lashed Hyderabad on Sunday evening, bringing significant rainfall to several parts of the city. The eastern zones, including Hayathnagar, Uppal, and LB Nagar, were among the worst affected as the storm unleashed intense spells of rain, disrupting normal life and waterlogging several

According to rainfall data recorded by the Telangana State Development Planning Society (TGDPS) at 8 p.m., Defence Colony in Hayathnagar witnessed the highest rainfall, with 85 mm recorded in just a few hours. Other parts of Hayathnagar registered

51.5 mm, while the GHMC zonal office in Uppal reported 25 mm. Vanasthalipuram's NGOs Colony received 22.8 mm.

The downpour, which began in the eastern localities, soon spread across the city, hitting Malkajgiri, Kapra, Boduppal, Nacharam, Mallapur, and Kothapet colonies. Later, heavy rain was also reported in Jeedimetla, Balanagar, Dammaiguda, Nagaram, Nizampet, and nearby industrial areas, showing the wide impact of the storm.

The thunderstorm, accompanied by strong winds and lightning, left commuters stranded during peak evening hours. Several low-lying areas witnessed water stagnation, while traffic moved at a snail's pace in parts of LB Nagar, Uppal Ring Road, and Vanasthalipuram. Residents of affected localities shared visuals on social media showing flooded roads, overflowing drains, and heavy lightning strikes illumi-

nating the skies. Independent weather trackers from Hyderabad had earlier issued an alert, forecasting possible thunderstorms between 8:15 p.m. and midnight on Sunday. The prediction turned out accurate, as the city experienced intense rainfall within that time frame.

Meteorological experts attributed the sudden storm to the prevailing monsoon conditions, coupled with localized weather activity. "Moisture inflows and convergence over Hyderabad triggered the thunderstorms. Such sudden but intense spells are common during the retreating monsoon season,' said a weather official.

While the heavy rains

brought relief from humid conditions during the day, they also caused disruptions. Several residents in low-lying colonies faced power cuts lasting for more than an hour. Waterlogging in interior roads also forced motorists to take longer routes. In industrial areas such as Jeedimetla and Balanagar, workers reported difficulties in returning home as heavy water stagnation slowed down vehicular

movement. Authorities of the Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) stated that emergency teams were pressed into service to clear clogged drains and respond to complaints of flooding. Disaster Resonnel were also deployed in sensitive areas. "Our teams are monitoring the situation. Citizens are advised to avoid waterlogged stretches and take precautions

against lightning,

GHMC officials said.

With more rain expected over the next few days, weather trackers have urged residents to remain alert and avoid venturing out unnecessarily during thunderstorm activity. The latest storm has once again highlighted Hyderabad's vulnerability to intense short-duration rains, particularly in areas with poor drainage

infrastructure. As the city braces for more wet days, Sunday's thunderstorm has left residents reminded of the unpredictable nature of monsoon rains in

Writing on Facebook, Nalini expressed deep anguish over her prolonged illness and linked her suffering to the physical and mental scars left by the Telangana statehood movement

Nalini, who had actively participated in various struggles during the Telangana agitation, stated that she has been carrying injuries and pain ever since. "The Telangana cated herself to relimovement left me with



scars all over my life. I endured that pain and lived in anonymity for 12 long years," she wrote, recalling her ordeal

She further mentioned that it was only through the grace of Maharshi Dayananda that she found solace in spirituality. Nalini claimed to have dedigious service by estab-

lishing the Veda Yagna Protection Committee, through which she engaged in preserving and promoting Vedic traditions.

In her post, the former police officer also recalled an assurance she received from Telangana Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy. According to her, the Chief Minister had promised to help her,

but her petition allegedly did not receive proper attention. "After six months, I found out that my petition was thrown into the dustbin. Later, I re-scanned my office copy and submitted it again. But so far, there has been no response," Nalini wrote visible with disappointment.

She used the post to make a heartfelt appeal to the media and the public regarding her legacy. "After my death, please do not write that I was a suspended officer. I resigned from service. Call me a poetess, a Yajna Brahma, and the founder of the Veda Yagna Protection Committee," she urged, highlighting her wish to be remembered for

Big Setback for KA Paul as FIR Registered Against Him

yderabad, Sept 21: Praja Shanthi Party founder and president KA Paul has landed in legal trouble after a case of sexual harassment was registered against him in Hyderabad. The FIR was filed at the Panjagutta Police Station following a complaint lodged by a young woman who had been working in his office.

According to police sources, the woman approached the She Teams of Hyderabad Police alleging that she was being sexually harassed by Paul. She reportedly provided the authorities with evidence to support her claims. Acting on her complaint, She Teams conducted a preliminary

inquiry and subsequently transferred the case to Panjagutta Police Station for further investigation.

The police have confirmed that an FIR has been registered against KA Paul under relevant sections pertaining to sexual harassment. They also stated that a formal investigation has been launched, and necessary procedures, including verification of the submitted evidence and questioning of those involved, will be carried

The allegations have come as a major blow to KA Paul, a controversial evangelist-turned-politician known for his flamboyant style, dramatic statements, and frequent claims of international influence. Over the

Telangana Congress Bets on BC Quota Push, Delays Local Body Elections

yderabad, Sept 21: The Congress gov-ernment in Telangana is walking a political tightrope as it stares at growing discontent in rural areas, particularly among farmers, while also grappling with court deadlines on conducting local body elections. With anger mounting over the shortage of urea and

welfare schemes faltering on the ground, the government has signaled that it will delay the elections beyond the September 30 deadline set by the High Court. In a bold, if risky, political gambit, the ruling party is preparing to raise reservations for Backward Classes (BCs) in local body elections to 42 percent

Government Order (GO) enhancing BC quotas will be issued next week. The move, however, directly challenges the Supreme Court's ceiling of 50 percent on total reservations. Anticipating legal complications, the State has already mobilized its legal teams to defend the policy before the High Court.



could dent the government's credibility. Still, leaders argue that the political payoff from attempting the move outweighs the risks. "Conditions are not favourable, so the party wants to buy time. If all goes well, the local body elections will likely be held in January," a senior Congress functionary admitted The urgency behind

the strategy stems from deepening rural dissatisfaction. Farmers across Telangana have been expressing frustration over the prolonged shortage of urea, which crop sowing. At the same time, flagship welfare programs such as Rythu Bharosa and free fine rice distribution have not delivered the expected results, leading to resentment against the ruling party. Party strategists fear that if local body elections are held under these conditions, the opposition could capitalize on grassroots anger to inflict serious political damage. To offset this, the gov-

ernment is keen to showcase major development projects in the months ahead. Chief

Reddy has instructed officials to fast-track the foundation laying of high-profile ventures such as the ambitious Bharat Future City and the Gateway of Hyderabad project on the Outer Ring Road. Both events are expected in December and are intended to project Telangana as a hub of economic growth and urban transformation.

Other initiatives being readied for public attention include the Musi Riverfront rejuvenation project, a revival of the long-pending SLBC tunnel works, and

lization efforts at the Medigadda barrage. By putting progress on infrastructure and irrigation back on the public agenda, the government hopes to rebuild confidence and blunt criticism from the farming community.

Political analysts believe the Congress's current strategy combines delay, diversion, and delivery. The delay comes in the form of postponing elections; the diversion is represented by the politically sensitive BC quota move; and the delivery is expected through the launch of

projects. Whether this tri-pronged approach can effectively shield the government from growing unrest remains uncertain.

For now, the Congress appears determined to bet big on the reservation gambit—not merely as a legal defense in the courts, but as a political shield in the villages. As the deadline for local body polls looms, the ruling party's moves will be closely watched, both in the courtroom and in the countryside, where its future political fortunes may well be decided.



Driving Enforcement Traffic Police conducted a major drunk driving enforcement drive over the past weekend, apprehending a total of 490 individuals for driving under the influence of alcohol. This special operation was a concentrated effort to curb impaired driving

A detailed breakdown of the cases by vehicle type revealed that two-wheelers accounted for the majority of the offenses, with 384 riders being caught. This was followed by four-wheelers, with 79 cases, three-wheelers with 20, and heavy vehicles with 7. The police department is taking a serious stance against all forms of drunk driving, regardless of the vehicle type.

The Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) levels of the offenders varied, with most falling into the lower

Cyberabad range.1 Specifically, 432 individuals had a BAC level between 35 mg/100 ml and 200 mg/100 ml. A smaller but still concerning group of 42 offenders had BAC levels ranging from 201 mg/100 ml to 300 mg/100 ml. Furthermore, 16 individuals were caught with exceptionally high BAC levels, ranging from 301 mg/100 ml to 550 mg/100 ml, highlighting a severe disre-

gard for public safety. All of the apprehended offenders will be presented before the Honorable Court for legal proceedings. The Cyberabad Police has issued a stern warning that drunk driving is a grave offense and will be dealt with severely.2 The statement reiterated that if an individual is found to be driving while intoxicated and causes a fatal accident, they will be charged under Section

105 of the Bharatiya

Nyaya Sanhita, 2023.3

This law addresses

"Culpable Homicide Not Amounting to Murder" and can result in a punishment of up to 10 years of imprisonment in addition to a fine.4

In a review of the

previous week's cases (from September 15 to September 20), a total of 199 drunk driving cases were resolved in the courts. Of these, 187 individuals were issued fines, while 12 were sentenced to jail. The jail terms varied, with four persons receiving a one-day sentence and five persons receiving a two-day sentence. Additionally, 17 individuals were assigned social service as part of their penalty, demonstrating the courts' use of alternative punishments to rehabilitate offenders and make them aware of their civic responsibilities. This multifaceted approach by the police and judiciary aims to create a strong deterrent against driving under the influence of alcohol.

The Imperative of Rainwater Harvesting in Hyderabad

yderabad's rapid ter and increase urbanization has created a paradoxical situation where the city, despite receiving significant rainfall, faces a serious water scarcity issue. As more residential and commercial spaces are covered with concrete, rainwater is unable to permeate the ground, leading to a critical drop in groundwater levels. This depletion has resulted in a surge in demand for water tankers, which supply water for daily needs.1 In response, Hyderabad Incharge Minister Ponnam Prabhakar has called for a city-wide effort, urging everyone to work together like an

"army" to conserve wa-

groundwater. The central tenet of

this strategy is the widespread construction of recharge pits, known locally as inkudu gunthas. This method not only replenishes the groundwater but also serves as a critical measure to prevent urban flooding during heavy rains. To ensure its implementation, the Hyderabad Metro Water Works has made it mandatory to install these pits for all new and existing drain connections. The Water Board is also offering technical support from qualified geologists to ensure these structures are built scientifically for maximum effectiveness. Government regulations already require inkudu guntha construction for houses built on plots larger than 300 square meters. The minister has also urged officials to identify properties that have neglected this requirement. In addition to individual houses, the plan includes constructing public recharge pits in common areas of colonies, government schools, and near dry borewells.2 The Hyderabad Metro Water Works, in collaboration with GHMC and HMDA, has set an ambitious target of creating approximately 16,000 such structures this year.3 This comprehensive approach aims to create a sustainable water future for the metropolis.

Hyderabad Police Vehicles Receive New 'TG' Identity

ernment has officially changed the state's identity to 'TG' from the previous 'TS'. Following this directive, Hyderabad Police Commissioner C.V. Anand issued a mandate for all police vehicles within the city commissionerate to undergo a complete re-branding. This extensive process involves removing the old 'Telangana State Police' stickers and replacing them with new 'Telangana Police' decals.1

The Central Armed Reserve (C.A.R.) Headquarters officials have spearheaded this massive operation.2 They have already overseen the re-stickering of 188 government vehicles. The project, which incurred an approximate cost of ₹1.6 crore, encompassed a comprehensive vehicle makeover. Beyond just the new stickers, the work included machine polishing, denting, and painting on bumpers, doors, and various panels to ensure each vehicle was in pristine condition.3

On Sunday, as per the Commissioner's instructions, C.A.R. officials officially put 134 patrol vehicles back into service. These vehicles, now

BJP's Punjab Strategy Tested Amid Floods and Rising Alienation


ter Narendra Modi returned from Tianjin on September 1, he tweeted his condolences over the devastating earthquake in Afghanistan. The tweet drew an immediate response from Giani Harpreet Singh, former head priest of the Akal Takht and Takht Sri Damdama Sahib, who positioned himself as a leader in the fractured Sikh political landscape. Giani Ji, leading the Nawan Akali Dal, stressed that Punjab has been severely affected by floods, with nearly 1.500 villages and 300.000 people impacted since August 17, and expressed disappointment at the Prime Minister's

While Modi immediately spoke to Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann and promAgriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan visited flood-affected areas, the people of Punjab felt neglected. For many Sikhs, this deepens long-standing distrust toward New Delhi, rooted in the farmers protests and other historical grievances. Critics argue that the BJP's absence highlights political calculation, as Punjab remains a complex battleground for the party.

The BJP has historically aimed to expand into states where it lacked power, including Tamil Nadu, Kerala, and West Bengal. In Punjab, the party's strategy relies on a divided Sikh vote and consolidated Hindu support. Meanwhile, the growing influence of radical groups and separatist propaganda, in-

tives from abroad, further complicates the political landscape. ISIbacked channels exploit divisions, promoting a sense of alienation among Sikhs and Punjabis.

This moment presents both a challenge and an opportunity. India cannot repeat past mistakes, as seen during the Mizoram famine of the 1960s, when delayed central intervention fueled insurgency. evolutions often roar into history with chants, protests, and the fall of regimes. For a moment, it feels as though dawn has broken. Signed late Friday night, the new regulations significantly raise the cost of hiring foreign workers, forcing companies to reconsider their dependence on imported

Under the overhaul, companies must now pay \$100,000 per H-1B worker-a steep increase from previous fees. But the changes

resident Donald don't stop there. The complaints from critics in highly specialized Trump administration is also revising prevailing wage rules, requiring that foreign visaholders earn the same salary as their American counterparts. This combination of higher fees and wage parity is designed to discourage companies from relying on cheaper foreign labor and to tilt the labor market toward U.S.

The new rules preserve H-1B visas as a last resort, allowing them only in fields where domestic talent is genuinely scarce. The administration argues this approach answers longstanding H-1B visas to fill gaps

that companies have become addicted to low-cost foreign employees, undermining opportunities for American workers. Supporters of the reform say it is long overdue, aiming to ensure that U.S. talent is prioritized in key sectors such as technology, engineering, and research.

However, the plan is expected to face legal challenges, and not all stakeholders are pleased. Tech companies, in particular, may feel the pinch. For years, major corporations have relied on roles. Many leaders warn that restricting access to global talent could hurt innovation and economic growth. Deedy Das, a partner at Menlo Ventures, summed up industry concerns on X, saying, "If the U.S. ceases to attract the best talent, it drastically reduces its ability to innovate and

grow the economy. This is not the first time H-1B reforms have been proposed. Previous attempts stumbled after pushback from tech giants, including Elon Musk and Vivek Ramaswamy, who argued that stricter rules would hinder competi-

warnings, the Trump administration is pushing forward, betting that American companies can meet their talneeds

domestically. Whether this gamble succeeds depends on the willingness of U.S. businesses to hire and train local workers, and on the courts' response to challenges. For now, the message is clear: foreign workers will no longer be the default choice for U.S. tech companies, and domestic talent will be given priority. Thousands Mourn as Singer Zubeen Garg's Mortal Remains Begin Final Journey Home

opular Assamese singer Zubeen Garg's body began its final journey home in Kahilipara from Guwahati airport on Sunday morning, with thousands of fans lining the streets to catch a last glimpse of the beloved artiste. The emotionally charged convoy moved slowly through a sea of mourners from all walks of life,

showering flowers on the ambulance carrying Garg's casket as it covered the 25-kilometre route from Lokpriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport to his residence.

As the flight carrying his body landed from Delhi, the casket was first brought out from the luggage section and placed near the runway. Garg's wife, Garima Saikia Garg, broke down and offered floral tributes while placing an Ascoffin. The coffin was later placed in a flowerdecked ambulance, accompanied by Garima, senior state officials, and a team of musicians. Fans raised mobile phones to capture the moment, sang his songs, and chanted "Jai Zubeen as the convoy progressed.

Assam Director General of Police Harmeet Singh and Guwahati Police Commissioner Parthasarathi Mahanta walked ahead to clear vourite open jeep, adorned with his portrait, also formed part of the procession. Devoted fans held cut-outs and 'gamosas' bearing the words "Z G (Zubeen Garg) Forever," expressing grief over his sudden demise.

Garg's mortal remains will first be kept at his Kahilipara residence for about ninety minutes to allow family members, including his 85-year-old ailing father, to pay their respects. Later, the body will be moved to the Arjun Bhogeswar Baruah Sports Complex, where the public can pay homage from 9 am to 7 pm.

The singer, who mesmerised audiences for over three decades with more than 38,000 songs in 40 languages and dialects, passed away in Singapore while swimming in the sea without a life jacket. Details of his last rites are yet to be finalised, with the Assam Cabinet expected to decide on the cremation venue on Sunday

India secures rights to explore polymetallic sulphides in Indian Ocean

ndia has become the first country to secure exclusive rights for the exploration of polymetallic sulphides in the Indian Ocean, marking a historic milestone in the nation's deep-sea resource initiatives. The announcement came on Saturday from Union Minister of State for Earth Sciences, Dr. Jitendra Singh, who confirmed the signing of a new 15year contract between the Ministry of Earth Sciences and the International Seabed Authority (ISA). This contract grants India exclusive exploration rights over a 10,000 square kilometre area of the Carlsberg Ridge in the Indian Ocean.

Polymetallic sulphides are rich in valuable metals, including iron, copper, zinc, silver, gold, and platinum. Their strategic importance and commercial potential have drawn attention from nations across the globe, making India a pioneer in seabed



resource exploration. According to Dr. Singh, the new contract represents a crucial step in realising the vision of India's Deep Ocean Mission, which aims to advance seabed mineral exploration and develop advanced mining technologies.

"By formalising exclusive rights for polymetallic sulphide exploration in the Carlsberg Ridge, India has consolidated its leadership in deep-sea research. This initiative will not only enhance our maritime presence capacity for future resource utilisation," Dr. Singh added.

India's position in international seabed exploration is further strengthened by its prior designation as a "Pioneer Investor" for polymetallic nodule exploration. With this new contract, India now holds two polymetallic sulphide exploration agreements—one in the Central Indian Ridge and Southwest Indian Ridge, and the other in the Carlsberg Ridge. This makes India the country with the largest allocated area for polymetallic sulphide exploration globally.

Dr. M. Ravichandran, Secretary of the Ministry of Earth Sciences, expressed pride in India's achievement, emphasising that this leadership positions the country at the forefront of international deep-sea research and sets the stage for future technological and economic gains from seabed minerals.



\$100,000 H-1B Visa Fee For **New Applicants**

he US government has clarified that the recent hike in H-1B visa application fees will not affect current visa holders or those seeking renewals. White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt, on Saturday, explained on social media platform X that the new rule "applies only to new visas, not renewals, and not current visa holders.'

The H-1B visa allows foreign workers to be employed in specialty occupations in the United States. On Friday, President Donald Trump announced a steep increase in the H-1B application fee, raising it to \$100,000 (around Rs 86 lakh), as part of measures aimed at curbing abuses that "displace US workers and undermine national security," according to the White House fact sheet.

Leavitt clarified that this \$100,000 charge is a one-time fee for new ap-




plicants and not an annual requirement. She emphasized that existing H-1B holders, including those currently outside the US, will not be impacted. "H-1B visa holders can leave and re-enter the country to the same extent as they normally would. Whatever ability they have to do that is not impacted by yesterday's proclamation," she said.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) expressed concern over the fee hike, noting that the increase from \$1,000 to \$100,000 "is likely to have humanitarian consequences by way of disruption for families" and urged US authorities to address the potential

Meanwhile, the White House fact sheet highlighted that future H-1B visa petitions will require the \$100,000 payment for approval, unless a case is deemed in the national interest.

The Secretary of Homeland Security has been tasked with ensuring that petitions from applicants outside the US not accompanied by the fee are restricted, except in exceptional circum stances.

This clarification seeks to reassure current H-1B holders while signaling stricter rules for new applicants, aiming to prioritize American workers in the highly competitive tech and specialty job sectors



Shehbaz Sharif to Attend High-Level UN Meetings, Meet Trump in New York

akistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif will participate in a meeting of select Muslim leaders with US President Donald Trump in New York on the sidelines of the 80th United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), Pakistan's Foreign Office (FO) confirmed. The meeting aims to discuss regional and international peace and security.

Shehbaz will lead Pakistan's delegation to the high-level segment of the UNGA starting September 22, accom-

ister Ishaq Dar, other ministers, and senior officials. His address at the UNGA is expected to urge the international community to resolve situations of "prolonged occupation and denial of the right to self-determination," particularly in Palestine and India-occupied Kashmir. The prime minister will also highlight the crisis in Gaza, calling for decisive action to alleviate the suffering of the Palestinian people.

In addition to these engagements, Shehbaz will present Pakistan's stance on global issues, including climate

lamophobia, and sustainable development. His schedule in New York includes several high-level events, such as UN Security Council meetings, sessions of the Global Development Initiative (GDI), and a special Climate Action event. He is also expected to meet senior UN officials and world leaders to discuss matters of mutual

The FO emphasized that Shehbaz's participation underscores Pakistan's commitment to multilateralism and the UN, reflecting the country's longstanding contributions toward global peace and develmark his first direct engagement with Trump since taking office in January, following earlier meetings between US and Pakistani military officials without senior civilian representation.

Amid rising tensions in the Middle East, Shehbaz recently signed a Strategic Mutual Defence Agreement with Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, pledging mutual action against any attack on either nation, highlighting Pakistan's proactive diplomatic and security engagements on the global

U.K. PM set to announce decision on Palestinian state

ritain's Deputy Prime Minister David Lammy on Sunday, September 21. 2025, clarified that recognising a Palestinian state would not create one "overnight," emphasizing that any recognition must be part of a broader peace process. Speaking to Sky News, Lammy noted that Prime Minister Keir Starmer would make a decision on recognising Palestine later that day, with the move aimed at keeping alive the prospects of a two-state solution—a Palestinian state co-existing alongside Israel.

Starmer had earlier stated in July that Britain would recognise Palestine unless Israel agreed to a ceasefire with Hamas, allowed humanitarian aid into Gaza, renounced annexation of the West Bank, and committed to a via-

my said that recent developments, including the attack on Qatar and Israel's settlement expansion, had made the prospects for a ceasefire bleak.

The anticipated recognition comes ahead of the U.N. General Assembly, where other nations including Australia. Canada, and France are also preparing to recognise a Palestinian state. The move has drawn criticism from the U.S. and Israel, who argue it rewards Hamas and terrorism. Trump voiced disagreement with Starmer's plan during his recent UK visit, although he framed it as one of the few policy disagreements with the British Prime Minister.

Lammy, representing the UK at the U.N., highlighted that the country has a historic role in the region, having governed Palestine after World War I and issued the 1917 Balfour Declaration sup-

for the Jewish people," while pledging not to prejudice Palestinian civil and religious rights—a commitment largely neglected over the decades.

UK officials have long supported an independent Palestinian state alongside Israel, but insist that recognition must align with a comprehensive peace plan. Lammy noted that the ongoing destruction in Gaza, displacement of its population, and Israel's West Bank settlements have made achieving a two-state solution increasingly challenging, as much of the world considers Israel's occupation of the West Bank illegal.

krainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has called for intensified international sanctions and enhanced military support to counter Russia's escalating aggression. In a statement on X. Zelenskyv revealed that Ukraine faced more than 1,500 strike drones, over 1,280 guided aerial bombs, and 50 missiles of various types in the past week alone.

Zelenskyy emphasized the need for longrange strike capabilities and robust sanctions to compel Moscow to seek peace. "Russia must feel the consequences of what it is doing. Sufficient counteraction is needed to force them to seek peace. That can be achieved with adequate strength of our army,

pabilities, and strong sanctions and pressure against Russia," he

The Ukrainian leader highlighted that Russian military production relies heavily on foreign-made components, identifying over 132,000 foreign items from countries including Europe, the US, China, and Japan in Russian weaponry. Zelenskyy warned that if Moscow is not stopped. Russian aggression could spread bevond Ukraine to Europe and the Indo-Pacific region.

Zelenskyy called on world powers to close loopholes that allow Russia to bypass sanctions and pressure countries and companies supplying dual-use technologies. He specifically urged the upcoming 19th EU sanctions packand stressed the importance of alignment from the United States with European efforts.

Earlier, the European Union proposed its 19th sanctions package targeting key sectors sustaining Russia's "war effort" in Ukraine. The proposal includes a full transaction ban on Russian banks, prohibitions on investments in Russian Special Economic Zones, and restrictions on energy exports, including a full LNG import ban by January 2027. Sanctions also target Moscow's shadow fleet, expanding to 118 new vessels.

Zelenskyy thanked nations already providing support, reiterating that strong sanctions and coordinated international pressure are essential tools to stop Russian attacks and protect Ukrainian lives.



Elon Musk's Flip-Flop on H-1B Visas Resurfaces Amid Trump Fee Hike

mid President Donald Trump's recent announcement to hike H-1B visa fees to \$100,000, Elon Musk's contradictory posts on the program have resurfaced, drawing renewed attention to his shifting stance. The fee increase, aimed at high-skilled foreign workers, is expected to significantly impact Indian professionals, who make up a substantial portion of the U.S. tech workforce.

Musk, the billionaire entrepreneur behind SpaceX and Tesla, had previously defended the H-1B system, highlighting its role in enabling him and other critical talent to build compa-

The largest component of the reserves, India's foreign currency assets (FCA), increased by USD 2.537 billion to USD 587.014 billion. Gold reserves also contributed to the rise, climbing USD 2.12 billion to reach USD 92.419 billion.

RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra, following the latest monetary policy review, emphasized that India's foreign exchange reserves are sufficient to cover approximately 11 months of the country's imports. This provides a strong buffer to manage external shocks and support the stability of the Indian rupee.

uyers are in for a bonanza as leading automakers Maruti Suzuki, Tata Motors, Hyundai Motor India, and luxury carmakers like Mercedes-Benz and BMW announce significant price cuts effective from September 22, coinciding with the start of the auspicious Navaratri period. Two-wheeler makers are also joining the trend, passing on GST benefits to customers.

Maruti Suzuki India the country's largest carmaker, has reduced vehicle prices by up to ₹1.29 lakh. The company aims to attract twowheeler users to fourwheelers by offering ad-

small cars beyond the GST cut of 8.5%. Popular models such as S-Presso, Alto K10, Celerio, Wagon-R, and Ignis have seen price reductions ranging from ₹71.300 to ₹1.29.600. Premium models including Swift, Baleno, Dzire, Fronx, Brezza, Grand Vitara, Jimny, Ertiga, and XL6 also received substantial cuts, with savings of up to ₹1.12

Tata Motors has cut prices across its passenger vehicles by ₹75,000 to ₹1.45 lakh, including Rs 85,000 off the compact SUV Punch and Rs 1.55 lakh on Nexon. Premium SUVs Harrier and Safari

₹1.45 lakh less, respectively. Mahindra & Mahindra has already reduced prices by up to ₹1.56 lakh on models like Bolero, XUV3OO, Thar, and Scorpio Classic. Hvundai, Honda, Kia, and Toyota are also implementing reductions, with Hyundai Tucson seeing the highest cut of ₹2.4 lakh.

Luxury automakers have followed suit. Mercedes-Benz announced reductions ranging from ₹2 lakh (A-Class) to ₹10 lakh (S-Class), while BMW Motor India is cutting prices by up to ₹13.6 lakh across its portfolio. Audi and Jaguar Land Rover have also reduced

prices, with cuts ranging from ₹2.6 lakh to ₹30.4

In the two-wheeler segment, Hero MotoCorp and Honda Motorcycle & Scooter India are lowering prices by up to ₹15.743 and ₹18.800. respectively.

According to Maruti Suzuki India Senior Executive Officer Partho Banerjee, "With car penetration in India at just 34 per 1,000 people, there is no better time to put India on wheels." Wholesale Price Inflation at Two-Year Low, Core **Inflation Rises**

ndia's factory gate inflation, measured by the Wholesale Price Index (WPI), stood at a two-year low of -0.58% in July, continuing the deflationary trend observed in June. Analysts attribute the recent change in the wholesale price trajectory to an upswing in food prices after months of decline.

Paras Jasrai, Associate Director at India Ratings and Research, noted that food prices played a significant role in reversing the deflationary trend. In August 2025, food prices rose 0.2% compared with the same month last year, while the decline in vegetable prices slowed to 14.2% year-on-year—the slowest pace in six months. Edible oils recorded a sharp increase of 22.9%in August, marking the highest surge in three

Jewellery prices also climbed significantly, rising 32.6% year-onyear in August, contributing to a rise in core inflation, which reached a five-month high of 1.6%.

Experts expect core inflation to remain around 1.8% through the end of 2025 due to a low base effect, keeping overall price pressures in check.

Food items accounted for 73 basis points of the 110 basis points uptick in the headline WPI between July and August, highlighting the dominant role of essential commodities in inflation trends. Non-food manufactured items, which make up the core WPI, added 27 basis points to the headline print, according to Rahul Agrawal, Senior Economist at While deflationary

pressures have eased, the rise in essential commodity prices indicates that inflation dynamics remain sensitive to changes in food and commodity markets. Policymakers and analysts will continue to monitor WPI and core inflation trends closely as India navigates supply-side pressures and prepares for the upcoming festive season, where consumer demand is expected to rise.



India Emerges as Leading Flexible Office Market Globally

riven by strong global demand, India has become one of the world's most mature flexible office ecosystems, with international firms accounting for 72 per cent of flex space absorption in 2024, according to Cushman & Wakefield's Global Trends in Flexible Office 2025 report. The remaining 28 per cent of demand came from startups, leveraging flexible offices to manage costs, attract talent, and scale efficiently in a competitive landscape.

India scored a perfect 100 on Cushman & Wakefield's maturity index, surpassing global peers including the UK at 98, France at 97, the US at 81, and Japan and Singapore at 77. The score reflects multiple metrics, including flexible inventory as a share of total

operators, leasing activity, emerging agreement structures, and overall market depth.

Ramita Arora, Managing Director Bengaluru & Head - Flex, India, Cushman & Wakefield, highlighted India's market maturity, diversity of operators, and ability to pivot with demand, noting that many Western markets are still evolving. Flexible office de-

mand in India has risen nearly sixfold since 2020, with 2024 alone seeing flex space account for 15 per cent of new office leasing. Operator expansion has surged, with 33.5 million square feet leased between 2022 and 2024—equivalent to over 500,000 seats. Annual take-up has tripled over five years, confirming flexible workspace as a mainstream solution

option.

India is now the largest flexible office market in APAC, with 79.7 million square feet of stock across the top eight cities, expected to reach 85 million square feet by year-end and surpass 100 million by 2026. Managed office and enterprise models now dominate, accounting for 70-80 per cent of demand. Bengaluru leads with 30 per cent of national flex inventory, followed by Delhi NCR, Pune, and Hyderabad.

Institutional interest is growing, with four operators already public and more IPOs anticipated. The next 3-5 years are expected to see consolidation, with leading players strengthening market share while niche operators continue to meet specialised

Scientists Confirm Silverpit Crater Was Caused by Asteroid Strike

Botswana delivered a sensational performance to win the men's world 4x400 metres relay in challenging, rainy conditions on Sunday, edging out the United States and South Africa in a dramatic blanket finish to become the first African nation to claim the title.

As torrential rain lashed the stadium, the United States, who had narrowly qualified for the final after a run-off against Kenya earlier that morning, held the lead at the final changeover. Known for their dominance in the event, having won nine of the last ten world titles, the Americans made four athlete changes for the

final in a bid to secure

However, Botswana's 21-year-old Collen Kebinatshipi, fresh off his individual 400m triumph, ran a remarkable anchor leg to surge past the competition and clinch gold in a time of 2:57.76. The Americans finished just behind, clocking 2:57.83 to secure silver, with South Africa narrowly missing out on silver by two thousandths of a

Kebinatshipi's effort marked a historic moment for African athletics, as Botswana became the first African country to top the podium in the men's 4x400m relay at World t h e Championships.

In the women's relay

that followed on the drenched track, the United States resumed their dominance. Anchored by individual 400m champion Sydney McLaughlin-Levrone, the Americans stormed to victory in 3:16.61. Jamaica held on for second place in 3:19.25, despite a valiant effort by the Netherlands' 400m hurdles gold medallist Femke Bol on the final leg, as the Dutch team finished third in 3:20.18.

Botswana's historic win and the Americans' continued strength in the women's event highlighted the drama and excitement of the relay races, demonstrating incredible skill, resilience, and determination under difficult conditions.
