CM REVANTH REDDY INSPECTS GLOBAL SUMMIT ARRANGEMENTS AT BHARAT FUTURE CITY

Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy, alongside Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy and TGIIIC Chairperson Nirmala Jagga Reddy, meticulously inspected the large-scale, international-grade preparations for the “Telangana Rising Global Summit,” scheduled for December 8 and 9, 2025, at the expansive Bharat Future City near Meerkhanpet. The summit is a key strategic event aimed at positioning Telangana as a global investment magnet, culminating in the unveiling of the Telangana Vision Document, which outlines the state's path to a \$3 trillion economy by 2047. The CM spent over an hour reviewing the 70-acre main venue,

which features infrastructure inspired by the World Economic Forum in Davos, including a 3,200 sq meter main hall and VVIP lounges. He specifically instructed officials to install a Telangana Thalli statue at the venue entrance. The city itself is being decked out with high-tech visuals,

including 3D projection mapping at the Secretariat and a floating globe projection at Durgam Cheruvu. The CM stressed the absolute necessity of seamless logistics, including security, fire safety, vehicular flow, accommodation, and uninterrupted internet, given the expected attendance of international delegates, Union Ministers, and Chief Ministers.



TELANGANA'S FERTILITY RATE PROJECTED TO FALL TO 1.5 BY 2035, NECESSITATING AGEING POLICIES

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Telangana is projected to rapidly transition into one of India's most demographically mature states, with its Total Fertility Rate (TFR) expected to plummet to a critically low 1.5 by the period 2031-35. This data, highlighted in the Census of India's 'Population Projections for India and States 2011-35' report, places Telangana significantly below the replacement level of 2.1, signaling a nearing zero population growth. The state's Population Growth Rate, which was 7.1 per thousand in 2011-15, is projected to collapse to just 0.3 per thousand by 2031-35. This dramatic shift is

attributed to successes in socio-economic development, better health access, and improved education, leading to smaller family sizes and increased longevity. The report, supported by data from the UNFPA's 2025 'State of World Population' report, underscores that the real challenge is not overpopulation but managing the changing age structure. The decline will inevitably lead to a smaller young workforce and a rising elderly dependency ratio, making the urgent implementation of robust, ageing-focused social security, pension, and healthcare policies essential for the state's long-term economic stability.

TELANGANA TO NAME ROADS AFTER RATAN TATA, DONALD TRUMP, AND GLOBAL TECH GIANTS

Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy's unique proposal to name key Hyderabad roads after global innovators and corporations is moving forward, aiming to brand Telangana as a symbol of innovation-driven India. The prestigious 100-meter greenfield radial road connecting the Nehru Outer Ring Road (ORR) at Raviryla to the new Future City will be named after Padma Bhushan Ratan Tata, with the interchange already designated the ‘Tata Interchange’. In a highly unconventional move, and a potential global first, the key thoroughfare adjacent to the US Consulate General in Hyderabad's Financial Dis-

trict is set to be named ‘Donald Trump Avenue,’ in recognition of the 45th and 47th US President. The government will formally communicate this decision to the Union Ministry of External Affairs and the US Embassy. Furthermore, in line with the CM's earlier commitment at the USISPF conclave, a major stretch along Google's upcoming largest campus outside the US will be designated ‘Google Street’ to honor the tech giant's global impact. The proposal extends to other corporations, with plans to name facilities such as a ‘Wipro Junction’ and a ‘Microsoft Road’ to globally recognize these entities and inspire local innovation.

Harish Rao Challenges CM On Farmer Debt And Kaleshwaram Project

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Former Minister and MLA T. Harish Rao launched a severe verbal and practical challenge against Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy, centered on the government's alleged failure to support maize farmers and its continued criticism of the Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation Project (KLIP). Harish Rao visited a maize procurement center in Chinnakodur mandal headquarters, where he met with distressed farmers. He highlighted that 450 farmers in Chinnakodur alone have been waiting for payment for 59 days,

with outstanding dues amounting to 45 crores. He dismissed CM Revanth Reddy's claims of running a "farmer's government" as hollow, pointing out that despite Minister Uttam Kumar Reddy's promise to release funds within two days, the payments have still not been credited after 50 days. This financial delay is forcing farmers to sell their Yasangi (Rabi) produce at rates below the Minimum Support Price (MSP) to meet their investment needs.

Harish Rao demanded the immediate release of the total outstanding



amount of 450 crores owed to maize farmers across the state. He also criticized the Congress government's approach to welfare, noting that while the previous KCR government provided sarees consistently, the current government gave the benefit only once and is taking undue credit. He stated that for CM Revanth Reddy to ask for votes from women, he must first clear the pending 60,000 payments owed to them. Furthermore, he emphasized that for farmers to receive the promised bonus on their crops, the Congress-supported candidates must

be utterly defeated in upcoming elections, arguing that the bonus will only materialize if the Congress is removed from power. He also took aim at Minister Tummala Nageswara Rao's statement that Rythu Bandhu will only be given to farmers who cultivate their land in the upcoming year, suggesting a lack of commitment to comprehensive farmer welfare.

The most fiery part of Harish Rao's address was the direct challenge regarding the KLIP. Referring to CM Revanth Reddy's previous comments suggesting that

KCR and Harish Rao should be tied to a rock and drowned for claiming the project had collapsed, Harish Rao dared the CM: "Revanth Reddy, come to Siddipet..."

I will tie a rock to you and hoist you up in Ranganyaka Sagar. Let's see if you sink or float." He dramatically concluded: "If you sink (meaning there is water), Kaleshwaram exists. If you float, Kaleshwaram has collapsed." He dismissed all of Revanth Reddy's statements as lies and petty talk, demanding that the Chief Minister stop his "cheap remarks."

Jagadish Reddy Condemns CM Revanth Reddy's Remarks, Cites HILT Scandal And SLBC Failures

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Former Minister and MLA G. Jagadish Reddy, speaking at a press meet at Sundaraiiah Vignana Kendram, launched a fierce counter-attack against Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy, labeling his ascension to power as the "destiny of the people of Telangana." Jagadish Reddy addressed the CM's recent aggressive stance, noting that some critics believe

the CM had changed his attitude, but his language seems to have only worsened following the exposure of the alleged HILT scam (Hilt Ghotala).

Jagadish Reddy specifically challenged Revanth Reddy's statement that the people "punished" KCR by voting him out. He retorted that if winning and losing in politics is considered a "punishment" from the people, then the CM's

own leader, Rahul Gandhi, has been subjected to such punishments repeatedly by the public. This comparison was intended to undermine the CM's moral authority in claiming a definitive mandate based on electoral victory alone.

The MLA then brought the focus back to the CM's performance in the Nalgonda region. He demanded that Revanth Reddy detail what exactly he has accomplished

for Nalgonda in the two years of his administration. Jagadish Reddy made a deeply emotional and political point by citing the tragic incident at the SLBC (Srisailem Left Bank Canal) project, where eight people died in an unfortunate accident. He slammed the CM, calling him a "daddamma" (incompetent person) for failing to recover the bodies of the deceased even after such a long

time, suggesting a profound failure of leadership and governmental priority.

In contrast to the perceived lack of progress under the current government, Jagadish Reddy highlighted the achievements of the previous BRS government in generating employment. He specifically mentioned the Yadadri Thermal Power Station, asserting that the pro-

ject successfully created job opportunities for 10,000 people. This was framed as evidence that the previous administration prioritized tangible development and job creation, in stark contrast to the current government which, according to Jagadish Reddy, only engages in rhetorical attacks and fails to deliver on critical responsibilities, thereby degrading the state's governance standards.



Harish Rao's Public Letter To Speaker: Alleged Violations of Assembly Rules And Democratic Norms

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Former Minister T. Harish Rao penned an open letter to Assembly Speaker Gaddam Prasad Kumar, congratulating him on completing two years in office but expressing deep distress over the alleged severe failures and violations of assembly rules and democratic spirit during his tenure. Harish Rao argued that the integrity and prestige of the Assembly have been significantly compromised.

A major concern raised was the drastic reduction in the number of Assembly working days, which he noted is a violation of Rule 12, requiring the Assembly to convene for the necessary duration to conduct business. He also cited violations of Rule 13 and Rule 16, criticizing the frequent and sudden adjournment of the house without proper cause, which disrespects the sanctity of Assembly time and procedures.

Harish Rao detailed critical violations concerning the rights of members to question the government. He lamented the sidelining of the crucial Question Hour and Zero Hour, stating that rules 52 and 53 to 62 are

being ignored. He alleged that Starred Questions, which require direct oral answers from Ministers, are being suppressed, thereby trampling on the members' right to question (Rule 38). Furthermore, the denial or curtailment of Supplementary Questions—a member's right to seek clarity and deeper discussion—violates the primary intent of Rule 50. He asserted that the constant reduction of the Zero Hour, meant for raising urgent public matters, severely damages the rights of the members.

Another serious lapse highlighted was the failure to provide written answers to Unstarred Questions. As per Rule 39, written answers must be tabled in the house, and Rule 41 requires them to be provided to members within a fixed deadline. Harish Rao contended that the failure to adhere to these rules results in a critical lack of government accountability and transparency. He stressed that these systematic deviations from established procedures are eroding the functional capacity of the Assembly and must be immediately rectified to restore public trust and constitutional decorum.

Centre's Fiscal Formula Leaves High-Performing Telangana Short-Changed Despite Surge in Tax Contribution

TPN Bureau, Hyderabad: Over the past five years, the tax contributions from Telangana to the Union's divisible pool have surged nearly fourfold — yet the returns from the Centre tell a starkly different story. Between 2020-21 and 2024-25, Telangana's contribution rose from around 35,243 crore to over 1.33 lakh crore. In total, the State contributed 4.32 lakh crore to the Union in direct taxes and domestic GST, accounting for nearly 3.87 per cent of the country's shareable pool.

Yet, during the same period, Telangana received only 1.84 lakh crore in return through central tax devolutions, Finance-Commission grants, and the Centre's share in centrally sponsored schemes — just 2.45 per cent of total national transfers. In other words, for every 100 contributed by Telangana, the Centre returned only around 42. Even after factoring in indirect benefits — such as Central projects (e.g., national highways) and loans — total funds flowing back to Telangana over five years amount to only around 3.27 lakh crore. That marks an increase of just 6,300 crore over the five-year span (from 60,590 crore in 2020-21 to approximately 66,295 crore in 2024-25), signaling a worrying stagnation

in net benefit to the State despite the skyrocketing contribution. In contrast, states like Uttar Pradesh — which contributed about 4.6 per cent to the national tax pool — secured a disproportionate 15.82 per cent of central transfers. Similarly, Bihar got 8.66 per cent of funds against just 0.68 per cent contribution, and Madhya Pradesh obtained 7.4 per cent with only 1.94 per cent contribution. Even neighboring Andhra Pradesh reportedly received nearly 97 back for every 100 contributed — a stark contrast with Telangana's fate.

Economists and policy analysts argue that a key factor behind this disparity is the growing reliance of the Union government on cesses and surcharges. These levies, unlike regular taxes, are not part of the constitutional "divisible pool" and therefore are not shared with States. This allows the Centre to generate significant revenue while bypassing the devolution mechanism. Over the past decade, the share of cesses and surcharges in the Centre's gross tax revenue has risen sharply — shrinking the divisible pool and thereby reducing what gets transferred to states.

Specifically, the share of cesses and surcharges grew from roughly 10-15 per cent during 2011-



2020, to an estimated 24 per cent of gross tax revenue by 2020-21 — a structural shift undermining state fiscal transfers. As a result, although the share of devolution to states (as recommended by the 15th Finance Commission) remains 41 per cent of the divisible pool, the shrinking pool itself means actual transfers to states have fallen far below their tax contributions.

For its part, the Government of Telangana has urged the 16th Finance Commission to raise the states' share in

Central taxes from 41 per cent to 50 per cent — a move many see as essential to restoring fiscal balance and ensuring that high-performing states are not penalized for effective tax collection.

Unless New Delhi revisits its growing dependence on cesses and restructures the tax-devolution formula, the current trends risk undermining the fiscal autonomy of states like Telangana, weakening cooperative federalism, and concentrating financial power in the hands of the Centre.

Chamala Kiran Kumar Reddy Fires At Kishan Reddy

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Bhongir MP Chamala Kiran Kumar Reddy launched a scathing attack on Union Minister G. Kishan Reddy, challenging his claims regarding central funds allocated to Telangana and accusing the previous BRS regime of mismanagement while the Union Minister remained silent. Kiran Kumar Reddy highlighted that the state government, led by CM Revanth Reddy, is focused on hosting the Telangana Rising Global Summit to project the state's potential to the world, aiming to attract investments worth 3 lakh crores and create employment opportunities for the youth. He praised CM Revanth Reddy for restoring the systems that were allegedly ruined during the BRS's decade-long "family rule."

The MP specifically questioned Kishan Reddy's claim that the Central Government had provided 13 lakh crores to Telangana. He challenged the Union Minister to provide accurate documentation and details for which departments received these funds, rather than making what he termed "false accounts" using a microphone in a public square. Kiran Kumar Reddy pointed out the contradiction in Kishan Reddy's claim, asking:

if 13 lakh crores came from the Centre, why did Telangana's debt surge to 8 lakh crores? He revealed that the current government is forced to pay 8,000 crores every month just to service the debts accumulated by the previous BRS government. The MP questioned why Kishan Reddy, a representative of Telangana, did not intervene using Central Government mechanisms to protect the state when it was allegedly being looted and sliding into debt under the BRS regime.

Kiran Kumar Reddy also raised a critical state issue, demanding an explanation from Kishan Reddy for the sudden, overnight shifting of the promised Semiconductor Project from Telangana to Andhra Pradesh. He rhetorically asked if this project was given to AP in the 18th Lok Sabha to appease Chandrababu Naidu, questioning the loyalty of the BJP leaders to Telangana's people who elected them. Furthermore, he challenged Kishan Reddy to name any BJP-ruled state that provides schemes equivalent to the Six Guarantees being implemented in Telangana, such as free fine rice (Sannabiyyam), free bus travel for women, or two lakh loan waivers for farmers. He accused the BJP leaders.

Amrabad Residents Boycott Panchayat Elections Over ST Reservation Anomaly

Residents across four Panchayats in Amrabad Mandal, Nagarkurnool district—specifically Laxmapuram (BK), Vanguronipalle, Kalmuni-palle, and Prashanth Nagar—have taken the drastic collective decision to boycott the third phase of local elections. This powerful act of protest is directly linked to a long-standing, critical issue concerning the reservation of Sarpanch seats for Scheduled Tribes (STs) under strict Agency rules, despite the geo-

graphical reality that no tribal populations reside in any of these villages. The four villages were officially constituted as Panchayats in 2018. In the 2019 Panchayat elections, the prescribed reservation structure dictated that the Sarpanch seats and four out of the eight ward member seats in each village be allocated to ST candidates. However; due to the complete absence of ST residents in these areas, both the Sarpanch posts and all the four reserved ward member seats have remained permanently

vacant since the elections. Consequently, only four non-tribal ward members were successfully elected. The people are unified in their deep dissatisfaction, arguing that this reservation anomaly causes severe injustice to their villages. They point out that a governing body composed of only four elected ward members cannot effectively administer any development or execute any form of robust governance, leaving the community vulnerable. The resi-

dents allege that development has severely suffered and stagnated under the protracted rule of Special Officers (Prathyekadhikarulu) due to the inability to form a full and legitimate governing council. The voter turnout across these villages is significant (Laxmapuram (BK): 618; Vanguronipalle: 923; Kalmuni-palle: 590; Pra shanth Nagar: 599). Nasaraiah, Convenor of the Uranium Anti-Agitation Committee IKAAS, confirmed to the press that the decision to boycott

was reached after widespread discussion and consensus among all the villagers. The effectiveness of the protest was underscored by the official record: even after the deadline for nominations had passed, not a single nomination was filed in any of these four Panchayats. This collective action is a powerful, non-violent demand for the government to urgently address the legal technicality that is obstructing basic democratic governance and necessary development in their communities.



Knowledge Sharing Session Boosts English Skills At Kondakal Government School

Garsakurthi: The Village That Gave 29 Soldiers To The Armed Forces

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The village of Garsakurthi, nestled in the Gangadhara Mandal of Karimnagar district, holds a distinctive and proud identity for its extraordinary contribution to national defense. The village is unique because 29 individuals from its population are currently actively serving in various highly demanding wings of the country's armed and border defense forces. This exceptional commitment to military service is driven by a deep-rooted, shared belief among the youth that there is no greater opportunity or service than protecting the motherland (Janma bhoomi).

The tradition of military service in Garsakurthi was pioneered by Chandrasekhar Rao, the first youth from the village to serve as a soldier in the country's armed forces. Following his path, an impressive total of 32 individuals from the village have joined various defense departments over time. Currently, the 29 active personnel are distributed across India's premier defense and paramilitary organizations, demonstrating the wide scope of their dedication:

Indian Army: 18 personnel
CISF (Central Industrial Security Force): 2 personnel
ITBP (Indo-Tibetan Border Police): 2

personnel
BSF (Border Security Force): 1 personnel
SSB (Sashastra Seema Bal): 1 personnel
Indian Navy: 2 personnel
Agniveer: 3 personnel

The village's service record also includes three individuals who have honorably retired from service, having completed their duty to the nation. Furthermore, the commitment to public safety and order extends beyond the borders; another 15 individuals from Garsakurthi are actively serving within the state as police constables. This impressive tally of individuals dedicated to service—totaling 47 across defense and state police—underscores the village's profound sense of civic duty and patriotism. The large number of youth serving across such a diverse range of forces is rare for a single, small village. On the occasion of Indian Armed Forces Flag Day (observed on Sunday),

Reclaiming Dignity: The Unfinished Human Rights Journey of Trafficked Women and Girls in Andhra Pradesh

International Human Rights Day is a reminder of humanity's collective promise that every individual—regardless of class, caste, gender, or circumstance—is entitled to dignity, equality, and freedom from violence. Yet in Andhra Pradesh, the lived experiences of thousands of women and girls who are trafficked into commercial sexual exploitation reveal how distant this promise remains. Their lives are shaped by economic distress, unsafe migration, entrenched gender inequality, and weak enforcement mechanisms that allow violence and exploitation to become daily realities instead of exceptional violations.

Survivors repeatedly describe a continuum of harm that spans physical, sexual, psychological, and economic abuse. Traffick-

ers, brothel operators, clients, intimate partners, and private moneylenders exert relentless control, and in some cases even law enforcement or custodial institutions become sources of further degradation. Rescue, far from guaranteeing safety, often introduces a new cycle of surveillance, moral policing, and humiliating treatment. Many women speak of unsafe shelter conditions, long periods of institutionalisation, and routines that strip them of autonomy, reinforcing trauma and violating their fundamental right to live free from cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment.

Long after exiting exploitation, stigma continues to shadow survivors. Once labeled, they face persistent exclusion from housing, employment, healthcare, and public services. The denial of these entitlements—guaranteed under the Constitution—cuts at the core of their right to equality and non-discrimination, pushing them back toward the very vulnerabilities that facilitated their trafficking in the first place.

Data obtained by VIMUKTHI, a collective of survivors of trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, illustrates the systemic gaps that compound this suffering. Between 2019 and June 2023, 2,737 survivors entered 21 Swadhar Homes and five Ujjawala Homes across the state. These shelters were meant to offer comprehensive rehabilitation, yet only 692—barely a quarter—applied for the entitlements they were eligible for, and just 592 ultimately received any form of support. In effect, less than 22 percent accessed legally mandated rehabilitation, leaving the majority without the financial, psychological, or social resources required to rebuild their lives. Behind these numbers lie structural failures: absence of individual care plans, poor coordination among departments, limited livelihood opportunities, inadequate mental health services, and prolonged institutional stays that serve as holding periods rather than genuine rehabilitation.

The history of anti-trafficking efforts in Andhra Pradesh shows that meaningful progress is possible when political will aligns with community needs. In 2003, under the leadership of then Chief Minister Sri Nara Chandrababu Naidu, the government introduced India's first state-level anti-trafficking policy through G.O. Ms. No. 1. This pioneering measure established a state mechanism chaired by the Chief Secretary to ensure coordinated responses to rescue, rehabilitation, and reintegration. Even after state bifurcation in 2014, the policy continued effectively until 2018. However, from 2019 onward, its implementation faded, leaving the order largely confined to paper. Government data reveals that of 2,460 survivors rescued between 2016 and 2022, barely five to ten percent received support under the order or related schemes—an alarming indicator of institutional neglect.

The consequences of such gaps are devastating. Survivors released from shelters without financial assistance or rehabilitation often return to unsafe

environments where traffickers retain influence. Without victim compensation or livelihood support, many borrow money at exorbitant rates from private lenders, entering debt bondage that deepens their vulnerability. In numerous cases, survivors are unable to testify in court due to intimidation, financial distress, or lack of support, resulting in low conviction rates—barely eight percent according to NCRB data. This cycle of failed prosecution empowers traffickers and undermines justice.

Compounding these challenges is a troubling legislative vacuum. Andhra Pradesh currently lacks any enforced law regulating private moneylenders after the repeal of the Debtors' Protection Act, 1934, and the non-enforcement of the A.P. Moneylenders Bill, 2017. The absence of legal safeguards has allowed predatory lending to flourish, particularly affecting sex workers and trafficking survivors. The recent floods in and around Vijayawada further wors-

ened their socio-economic distress, forcing many back into exploitative borrowing mechanisms that risk re-trafficking.

While Andhra Pradesh was once recognized as a frontrunner for progressive anti-trafficking policy, today it is identified as the state with the highest number of sex workers in India—1.33 lakh, according to a recent Ministry of Health and Family Welfare study. This alarming statistic underscores the urgency of re-establishing comprehensive, community-based rehabilitation models. Successful examples from West Bengal demonstrate that empowering local structures—such as Andhra Pradesh's village and ward-level Sachivalayam system—can transform access to services and reduce re-trafficking by ensuring support within the survivor's community.

Livelihood security, financial inclusion, and protection from moneylenders remain critical pillars of human rights restoration. Sex workers frequently face intimidation in banks and government

offices, making financial services inaccessible without institutional support. Many attempt small businesses but fail due to lack of mentoring and technical guidance. Ensuring that SRLM and SULM actively include sex workers in livelihood planning is essential for long-term economic empowerment. Similarly, access to health services must extend beyond HIV care to include mental health support, as emotional trauma, depression, and stigma significantly impact the well-being of survivors and their children.

Children of sex workers continue to face high levels of stigma, exclusion, and violence in schools and communities, yet remain invisible within the state's child protection systems. Without targeted interventions, many are pushed toward substance abuse, exploitation, or early entry into the sex trade, perpetuating a cycle of vulnerability that spans generations.

Anti-Human Trafficking Units, though established as specialized mechanisms by the Ministry of

Home Affairs, operate in only half of Andhra Pradesh's districts and suffer from inadequate infrastructure, inconsistent training, and weak inter-departmental coordination. Poor investigation and lack of witness protection continue to produce low conviction rates, undermining the deterrent effect of the law.

As Sri Chandrababu Naidu resumes office as Chief Minister, survivors across the state voice a collective plea: to revive the spirit of the 2003 policy, restore accountability, ensure 100 percent compensation, rehabilitate every rescued victim, and rebuild systems that uphold their rights rather than prolong their suffering. On this International Human Rights Day, their struggle stands as a powerful reminder that human rights are not abstract ideals. They are lived realities measured in safety, dignity, justice, and opportunity—and the true test of governance lies in ensuring that these rights reach those who have been denied them the longest.

Telangana Rising... Global Summit - Local Efforts

Telangana Rising Global Summit on December 8-9, 2025 is more than a meeting - it is Telangana's clear pitch for a better future. Launched under Telangana Rising 2047, the summit shows how the state plans to become a global centre for business and innovation by India's 100th year of independence. Chief Minister Revanth Reddy has driven this effort, meeting leaders, shaping plans and inviting investment so that growth reaches every part of the state, not only its

big cities. The government's aim of becoming a three-trillion-dollar economy is about jobs, education, infrastructure and green growth across regions. At the heart of this plan is clean transport. Rising pollution and crowded cities make Zero Emission Vehicles urgent. Telangana is building policies, incentives, charging stations and battery-swapping networks, and planning to use EVs in public transport and logistics. The goal is to develop an entire EV ecosystem - manufacturing, recycling and startups - so the state attracts global investment instead of relying on imports.

Environment Minister Smt Konda Surekha has stressed that sustainability must be fair. Drivers, mechanics and small businesses that depend on conventional vehicles need training and support so the green shift creates jobs and not hardship. Green mobility can cut pollution and create new industries, but its benefits

must reach towns and rural areas as well. Telangana backs these promises with facts. The state covers 1,12,077 sq. km. Forests cover 21,179 sq. km, which is 18.89% of the land, and trees outside forests add roughly 3%, making total green cover about 22%. The target is 33% green cover - this needs about 12,303 sq. km more and a plan to plant around 2.5 billion trees between 2026 and 2047.

Plantation drives are already large under the

leadership of Telangana's Forest Minister Smt Konda Surekha. In Vana Mahotsavam 2024-25, Telangana planted 19.03 crore saplings against a target of 20.02 crore (95% achievement). In 2025-26 so far, 15.71 crore saplings have been planted against an 18.02 crore target. Urban greening is moving fast: 109 Urban Forest Parks have been developed and 73 are open to the public. The Nagar Van programme has 45 approvals and 44 parks completed. These green spaces

are cool cities, clean air and support biodiversity. Eco-tourism projects - safari routes, nature trails, birdwatching and PPP ventures - are creating green jobs and helping local communities. For wildlife protection, the state relocated 142 families from the Kawal Tiger Reserve core and set up a 5 crore fund for human-wildlife conflict relief. The "Uchchunu Pattukondi" drive seized 1,429 illegal snares, reducing poaching. Today, Telangana's forests absorb

about 658 million tonnes of CO each year. If green cover reaches 33%, absorption could rise to nearly 986 million tonnes, a major help to India's climate goals. Citizens also contribute: Haritha Nidhi has raised 41.30 crore and projects worth 79.73 crore have been sanctioned. Telangana Rising Global Summit must turn plans into real investment and fair action. If leaders, industry and citizens work together with clarity and purpose, Telangana can become a national model

of green, inclusive and prosperous development by 2047 as aspired to by our Hon'ble Chief Minister.

IndiGo Operations Stabilise as Government Steps In to Protect Passengers

New Delhi: India's largest airline, IndiGo, is steadily returning to normal operations after days of widespread disruptions, operating over 1,650 flights today, up from 1,500 the previous day. In a late-evening update, the airline confirmed that 137 out of its 138 destinations are now functioning, with on-time performance improving sharply to 75 per cent from just 30 per cent a day earlier.

IndiGo reiterated that it will continue to provide a full waiver on cancellations and free rescheduling for all bookings made until December 15. The airline said the process of issuing refunds and sorting delayed baggage is progressing rapidly. "We are working round the clock to resume normal service. Please bear with us," the airline said in its latest statement.

The Ministry of Civil Aviation (MoCA) has taken swift and decisive steps to handle the disruption caused by IndiGo's operational crisis and to ensure that passengers are not subjected to further inconvenience. According to officials, multiple emergency measures were introduced to stabilise the situation and protect consumer interests.

Airfare Caps to Prevent Overcharging

Following a spike in airfares due to cancellations and a sudden shift in demand, the ministry im-



posed an immediate cap on ticket prices across affected routes. This intervention was aimed at preventing overcharging and ensuring air travel remained fair and affordable. Officials said fare levels have already moderated and all airlines have been directed to strictly comply with the revised fare structure.

Refunds and Rescheduling Relief

To safeguard passengers financially, MoCA directed IndiGo to complete all refunds for cancelled or heavily delayed flights by 8 pm today. So far, the airline has processed refunds amounting to ₹610 crore. The ministry also prohibited the levy of any additional fees for rescheduling tickets impacted by the disruption.

To further streamline passenger support, IndiGo has set up dedicated help cells to proactively assist travellers and resolve refund and rebooking issues without unnecessary delays.

Baggage Delivery Accelerated

The ministry instructed IndiGo to trace and deliver all baggage that had been separated from passengers within 48 hours. Continuous communication with affected travellers has been made mandatory. IndiGo has already delivered more than 3,000 pieces of stranded baggage across the country as of yesterday, reflecting visible progress in clearing the backlog.

Normalcy Returns at Airports

Airport directors from major hubs, including Delhi, Mumbai, Bengaluru, Chennai, Hyderabad, Ahmedabad and Goa, confirmed that terminal operations have largely returned to normal. Passenger movement has remained smooth, with no overcrowding reported at check-in counters, security points or boarding gates.

On-ground assistance has been strengthened with enhanced monitoring and timely deployment of support staff by airport operators and the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF).

24x7 Monitoring and Passenger Assurance

MoCA's 24x7 control room continues to function as an integrated co-ordination centre, closely

monitoring flight operations, airport conditions and passenger grievances. Calls are being handled in real time, while teams remain on the ground to supervise operational planning, crew rostering and customer handling.

The ministry reassured passengers that safety, comfort and dignity remain the government's top priorities. It said India's aviation network is moving quickly towards complete normalcy and that corrective measures will remain in force until operations stabilise fully. Continuous monitoring will ensure passenger rights are protected, with further updates to be shared as required.

Goa Nightclub Fire During Bollywood Event Kills 25, Triggers Probe

Goa: A devastating fire broke out at the popular nightclub Birch By Romeo Lane in north Goa's Arpora late last night, claiming at least 25 lives and injuring six others, during a crowded "Bollywood Banger Night" event that had drawn around 100 tourists.

According to eyewitness accounts and circulating videos, the incident unfolded while a dancer was performing to the iconic song "Mehbooba O Mehbooba" from the classic Hindi film Sholay. The video shows the performer on stage, surrounded by musicians and cheering guests, when flames

suddenly erupted behind the console area. Initially, the seriousness of the situation was not realised, with some spectators even making light-hearted remarks, but panic set in as the flames spread rapidly.

Within moments, fire engulfed the ceiling and upper portions of the club. Musicians abandoned their instruments, and both staff and guests rushed towards the exit. However, the club's narrow entry and exit points caused severe bottlenecks, trapping many people inside. Several tourists reportedly ran towards the kitchen located

on the lower floor in search of an escape route, only to become trapped due to poor ventilation and thick smoke.

Rescue operations were also severely hampered by infrastructure challenges. Firefighters said the narrow lanes leading to the club were inaccessible to large fire engines, forcing them to park nearly 400 metres away from the site. This delay complicated efforts to control the blaze and evacuate stranded victims. Officials confirmed that most victims died of suffocation, while others sustained critical burn injuries.

Goa Chief Minister Pramod Sawant termed the tragedy unprecedented in the state. In his statement, he said preliminary findings suggest the fire began on the upper floor and that congested exits prevented many people from escaping in time. He also pointed out serious ventilation failures in the underground areas, which proved fatal for those who fled there.

The state government has ordered a magisterial inquiry into the incident. An FIR has been registered against the hotel's general managers and the owner, and arrest war-

rants have been issued. The investigation will focus on whether the establishment complied with mandatory fire safety and building regulations.

Expressing condolences, the Chief Minister assured that financial assistance would be provided to the families of the victims. He added that the government is committed to taking strict measures to prevent such tragedies in the future.

The incident has sent shockwaves across the country, once again highlighting the critical need for strict enforcement of fire safety norms in public venues.

India Plans Possible Zelenskyy Visit After Putin Talks, Walks Diplomatic Tightrope

New Delhi: Even as Russian President Vladimir Putin wrapped up his two-day visit to India on December 5, New Delhi has begun preparations for a possible visit by Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, highlighting India's careful diplomatic balancing act amid the ongoing Russia-Ukraine war. According to officials, the Ukrainian leader's visit could take place as early as January 2026.

The proposed visit is part of India's long-standing effort to remain engaged with both Moscow and Kyiv. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has consistently maintained that India is "not neutral" but firmly "on the side of peace". This stance was reiterated during Putin's visit and reflects the same approach Modi conveyed to Zelenskyy during his Ukraine trip last year.

Diplomatic sources said talks between Indian and Ukrainian officials have been underway for several weeks, with New Delhi co-ordinating with Zelenskyy's office even before Putin arrived in India. However, the final timing and scope of the visit will



depend on multiple factors, including developments on the battlefield and evolving international peace initiatives.

One significant variable is the proposed peace plan by former US President Donald Trump, which is being closely monitored in New Delhi. Domestic political developments in Ukraine are also likely to influence the situation, as President Zelenskyy's government faces pressure amid a major corruption controversy.

Ukraine's presiden-

tial visits to India have been rare, having taken place only three times in the past — in 1992, 2002 and 2012 — making any proposed visit by Zelenskyy diplomatically significant.

Putin's India visit has drawn close attention from European countries, with several envoys urging India to leverage its influence to persuade Moscow to end the conflict. India, however, has remained consistent in its messaging, arguing that dialogue and diplomacy are the only

sustainable solutions. Modi's remark during talks with Putin — "India is not neutral, India is on the side of peace" — echoed similar language he used during his Ukraine visit in August 2024.

Since the war began in February 2022, Modi has remained in contact with both Putin and Zelenskyy, speaking to the Ukrainian leader by phone at least eight times and meeting him on four occasions. Their most recent conversation took place on August 30, when Modi was in

China for a summit and was preparing to meet Putin.

The conflict has also started affecting India's economic interests directly. Secondary sanctions and tariff pressures, including penalty tariffs imposed by the United States over Russian oil purchases, have forced India to reduce its imports of Russian crude since September.

Notably, recent official statements from both leaders avoided using the words "war" or "conflict", instead referring to the situation as a "crisis". This marked a shift from Modi's earlier blunt messaging in 2022, when he famously told Putin that "this is not the era of war".

While no reference to the Ukraine situation appeared in the latest joint statement, India remains quietly active behind the scenes, positioning itself as a potential bridge for dialogue. A Zelenskyy visit, if finalised, would further underline India's evolving role as a global diplomatic mediator seeking peace rather than taking sides.

Pakistani Woman Appeals to PM Modi, Alleges Husband Abandoned Her and Planned Second Marriage



New Delhi: A Pakistani woman from Karachi has made an emotional public appeal seeking justice, alleging that her husband abandoned her and began preparations for a second marriage in India while still legally married to her. The woman, identified as Nikita Nagdev, released a video message that has drawn widespread attention on social media and sparked strong reactions from social and legal groups in both India and Pakistan.

According to Nikita, she married Vikram Nagdev, a Pakistani-origin man living in Indore on a long-term visa, on January 26, 2020, in Karachi as per Hindu customs. She stated that she travelled to India with her husband on February 26, 2020, hoping to begin a new life. However, she claims that within months, her situation changed dramatically.

Nikita alleged that on July 9, 2020, she was taken to the Attari border and sent back to Pakistan under the pretext of a "visa technicality." She said she was forcibly separated from her husband and has since been repeatedly denied the opportunity to re-

turn to India. "I kept requesting him to call me to India, but he refused every time," she said in her video statement.

In her appeal, Nikita directly addressed Prime Minister Narendra Modi, stating that women risk losing faith in the justice system if such cases are ignored. She urged people to stand with her and highlighted the physical and emotional abuse that women often face after marriage.

She also made serious allegations about her treatment at her in-laws' home, claiming that her husband was involved in an affair. When she raised the issue, she alleged that her father-in-law dismissed the matter, telling her that such behaviour by men was normal.

During the COVID-19 lockdown, Nikita claimed she was again pressured to remain in Pakistan permanently and was stripped of any chance to reunite with her husband. She further alleged that she later discovered Vikram was planning a second marriage with a woman from Delhi while still married to her.

Distressed by these developments, Nikita filed a written com-

plaint on January 27, 2025. Her case was taken up by the Sindhi Panch Mediation and Legal Counsel Centre, which is authorised by the Madhya Pradesh High Court to facilitate mediation in such disputes. Notices were sent to Vikram and the alleged prospective bride, and a hearing was conducted, but mediation failed.

In its report dated April 30, 2025, the Centre stated that since neither spouse holds Indian citizenship, the case falls under Pakistan's legal jurisdiction. It also recommended that Vikram be deported to Pakistan for further legal proceedings.

Earlier, in May 2025, Nikita approached the Indore Social Panchayat, which also recommended Vikram's deportation. Indore Collector Ashish Singh confirmed that an official inquiry had been initiated and that appropriate action would be taken based on the findings.

The case continues to draw public attention as legal and administrative authorities in India and Pakistan consider the next steps, while Nikita continues to seek justice and reunification or legal closure.

Mandhana Calls Off Wedding, Refocuses on Cricket Career

Indian women's cricket star Smriti Mandhana has officially called off her wedding with music composer Palash Muchhal, ending weeks of speculation around her personal life. The cricketer confirmed the decision through a heartfelt statement on Instagram, saying it was "important for me to speak out" after continuous rumours following the postponement of the ceremony.

Mandhana, who is known to maintain a private personal life, said she felt compelled to clarify the situation due to growing public interest. In her post, she wrote that while she prefers to stay away from personal publicity, she wanted to make it clear that the wedding has been called off. Her statement has brought closure to weeks of uncertainty surrounding the high-profile relationship.

The wedding had originally been scheduled for November 23, 2025, and was preceded by months of pre-wedding celebrations that had gained widespread attention across social media. The ceremony was abruptly postponed last month after Mandhana's father, Srinivas Mandhana, suffered a sudden medical emergency. Around the same time, reports emerged that Palash Muchhal was also hospitalised due to stress-related health issues.



Initially, members of both families maintained that the wedding was only delayed and would be rescheduled soon. However, speculation intensified after Mandhana removed several wedding-related posts from her social media accounts and was seen in public without her engagement ring. Her latest public statement has now put an end to the rumours.

In her message, Mandhana firmly shifted the focus back to her professional career, emphasising that cricket remains her top priority. She stated that representing India at the highest level is her true purpose and that her commitment to the sport remains unwavering.

"I believe there is a higher purpose driving us all and for me that has always been representing my country at the highest level," she wrote, adding that she hopes to continue winning trophies

for India for as long as possible.

Mandhana also appealed to fans and the media to respect the privacy of both families during this difficult period. She requested space for everyone involved to process the situation and move forward with dignity.

The development comes at a crucial stage in Mandhana's career. She is expected to play a key role for India in upcoming international matches and is set to lead Royal Challengers Bengaluru in the Women's Premier League. Her teammate and close friend Jemimah Rodrigues had earlier withdrawn from the Women's Big Bash League to support her, highlighting the strong backing she has within the cricketing community.

As she turns the page on her personal life, Mandhana appears fully focused on her cricketing journey ahead.

FIFA Peace Prize to Trump Sparks Controversy



FIFA President Gianni Infantino has sparked global debate after awarding the newly established FIFA Peace Prize to former U.S. President Donald J. Trump during the 2026 World Cup draw in Washington, D.C. The decision has raised questions about the organization's commitment to political neutrality and its credibility as an international sports governing body.

During the high-profile ceremony, Infantino praised Trump for his international diplomatic efforts, including his support for agreements such as the Abraham Accords, which normalized relations between Israel and several Arab nations. "This is your prize, this is your peace prize," Infantino declared, lauding Trump as a leader who promoted peace and unity. Trump accepted the award, calling it "one of the great honors of my life," and claimed his tenure as president had "saved millions of lives worldwide."

However, the decision has drawn sharp criticism from human rights organizations, sports commentators, and political observers. Critics argue that Trump's controversial domestic and foreign policies, including military interventions and restrictions on civil liberties, are inconsistent with the ideals of peace and humanitarian leadership that such an award is meant to recognize.

Human Rights Watch (HRW) has questioned the legitimacy of the prize, demanding transparency regarding the nomination and selection process. The organization called for clarity on whether nominees were evaluated for their adherence to international human rights standards, pointing out that Trump's record on conflict resolution and humanitarian issues is mixed at best. Some analysts have suggested that awarding the prize to Trump reflects a politicization of FIFA itself, challenging the long-standing principle that football should remain separate from political disputes.

Gaza Ceasefire at Risk as Israeli Raids Resume

Israeli air raids targeted the Maghazi camp in central Gaza on Sunday, December 7, 2025, raising alarms that the fragile ceasefire could collapse. The strikes came just days after a truce aimed at ending years of violent conflict, underscoring how tenuous the current calm remains. Japan's Defence Minister Shinjiro Koizumi described similar tensions in East Asia, though in Gaza the focus is on civilian safety amid renewed Israeli military activity.

Reports indicate that Israeli forces killed seven Palestinians in northern Gaza during the day, including a 70 year-old woman and her adult son. These casualties have intensified fears that the ceasefire, which was mediated with international oversight, may be short-lived. The incidents occurred despite ongoing negotiations and limited truce arrangements designed to stabilize the region temporarily.

Qatari Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani emphasized the fragile nature of the ceasefire, calling it a temporary pause rather than a durable peace. Speaking at the Doha Forum, he stressed that a stable truce requires a full withdrawal of Israeli forces, the restoration of mobility for Palestinian civilians, and comprehensive guarantees for sustained peace. "The current calm is not permanent," Al Thani warned, highlighting the critical need for immediate international engagement to prevent escalation.

Regional powers have echoed these concerns. Türkiye's foreign minister cautioned that without urgent intervention, particularly from the United States, progress toward a stable ceasefire could quickly falter. The renewed airstrikes illustrate the high risk of resuming full-scale conflict, particu-

larly given the densely populated nature of Gaza and the widespread destruction from previous operations. Humanitarian conditions remain dire. Millions of civilians continue to face displacement, restricted access to essential services, and the psychological toll of living under constant threat. Aid and reconstruction efforts are moving slowly, and any new surge in violence could exacerbate the already severe humanitarian crisis. International organizations have warned that renewed hostilities could undo months of relief work and prolong suffering for Gaza's population.

The ceasefire plan, negotiated with international mediators, included phased steps such as limited withdrawal of forces and hostage exchanges. While initial phases were largely observed, the resumption of air raids has underscored the fragility of these arrangements. Observers note that the situation remains highly volatile, with both sides needing to uphold commitments to avoid a return to large-scale hostilities.

Analysts warn that the current truce's stability hinges on continuous monitoring, adherence to agreed terms, and meaningful dialogue between Israeli and Palestinian representatives. Without these measures, the risk of escalation remains high, potentially drawing in regional actors and complicating international efforts to maintain peace in the Middle East. As the situation develops, the people of Gaza remain caught between fragile diplomacy and the harsh realities of renewed military action. While mediators continue to push for progress, the fragile calm is a reminder that achieving lasting peace will require sustained international commitment and genuine political will on all sides.

Further controversy surrounds the committee responsible for selecting the recipient. Reports indicate that the FIFA Social Responsibility Committee, tasked with choosing peace-prize honorees, is chaired by a figure with links to a regime sanctioned for human rights violations. Observers have raised concerns that the committee lacks impartiality, undermining the credibility of the award. This unprecedented move has reignited debates about FIFA's role on the global stage. Traditionally, FIFA has sought to position football as a neutral platform that promotes unity, cultural exchange, and fair competition. Critics argue that aligning the organization with a divisive political figure threatens to erode public trust and tarnish FIFA's reputation.

The timing of the award, coinciding with the World Cup draw for the 2026 tournament in the U.S., Canada, and Mexico, has amplified scrutiny. Some media outlets have described the decision as symbolic and politically motivated, rather than a genuine recognition of efforts to advance peace. Comparisons have been drawn to "participation trophies," suggesting that the award may serve more as a gesture of approval than a meaningful honor.

Despite the backlash, Infantino defended the choice, emphasizing FIFA's desire to highlight leadership that contributes to global stability. Yet, many observers maintain that the controversy highlights broader challenges facing international organizations attempting to balance sports promotion with social and political engagement. As the world prepares for the 2026 World Cup, the awarding of the FIFA Peace Prize to Trump continues to spark debate. For many, the decision underscores the delicate intersection of politics and sports, raising difficult questions about FIFA's role, responsibilities, and the limits of its neutrality on the international stage.

Benin Foils Coup Attempt, Heavy Security Deployed in Cotonou

The government of Benin said it has successfully foiled a coup attempt after a group of soldiers tried to overthrow the country's leadership early Sunday, triggering gunfire, military deployments and heightened security across the capital.

Interior Minister Alasane Seidou announced in a televised address that loyal forces remained committed to the republic and neutralised the uprising. "The Beninese armed forces and their leadership, true to their oath, remained committed to the republic," he said, confirming that the situation was under control.

Earlier in the day, a faction of soldiers made a broadcast claiming they had ousted President Patrice Talon. Eyewitnesses reported hearing gunshots in parts of the city, while journalists working for the state broadcaster were briefly held hostage. A presidential adviser later confirmed that President Talon was moved to a secure location. French officials denied reports that he had taken shelter at France's embassy.

According to Seidou, the mutiny began on the morning of December 7, when a small group of soldiers attempted to destabilise state institutions. Loyalist troops quickly moved



in, regaining control and foiling the attempt. Helicopters were seen flying over Cotonou, while key roads were blocked and a strong military presence was deployed around strategic locations.

Benin, a former French colony, has long been regarded as one of West Africa's more stable democracies, despite being one of the world's poorer nations and heavily dependent on cotton production.

The rebel soldiers were reportedly led by Lt-Col Pascal Tigri, who justified the action by accusing the government of mishan-

dling national security, particularly in the country's northern regions bordering Niger and Burkina Faso. In recent years, Benin's forces have suffered casualties in clashes with jihadist militants linked to Islamic State and al-Qaeda.

The mutineers also accused President Talon of neglecting fallen soldiers' families, cutting health-care funding, raising taxes and restricting political freedoms.

President Talon, 67, is nearing the end of his second term and is due to step down next year, with elec-

tions scheduled for April. First elected in 2016, he has promised not to seek a third term and has backed Finance Minister Romuald Wadagni as his preferred successor. His government has been praised for economic reforms but criticised for limiting dissent and opposition activities.

The attempted coup comes amid growing regional instability. It follows the recent overthrow of Guinea-Bissau's president and a wave of military takeovers in Burkina Faso, Mali, Guinea and Niger. Russia has increased its influence in many Sa-

hel nations in recent years, while Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger have exited ECOWAS to form the Alliance of Sahel States.

The African Union and ECOWAS strongly condemned the attempted coup. AU Commission Chair Mahmoud Ali Yousof reiterated the organisation's zero-tolerance policy toward unconstitutional changes of government.

Authorities in Benin have urged calm while maintaining heightened security as investigations into the incident continue.

China Targets Japanese Jets with Radar Near Okinawa

Japan has raised concerns after Chinese fighter jets directed fire-control radar at Japanese aircraft over international waters near the Okinawan islands on Saturday, December 6, 2025. The incidents, which occurred in two separate encounters, prompted strong condemnation from Japan's Defence Minister Shinjiro Koizumi, who described the actions as "dangerous."

"These radar illumination went beyond what is necessary for the safe flight of aircraft," Koizumi said in a post on X, emphasizing that Japan had lodged a formal protest with China over the "regrettable" events. The encounters took place in a sensitive region near disputed territories claimed by both Japan and China, heightening existing tensions between the neighboring countries.

Relations have been strained following comments from Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takachi, who warned that Japan could respond militarily if Chinese actions against Taiwan threatened Japan's security. Taiwan, a democratically governed island, is claimed by Beijing and lies just 110 kilometers (68.4 miles) from Japan's westernmost Yonaguni Island.

China's military did not respond to calls made to its defence ministry outside office hours on Sunday, December 7. Analysts suggest the incident could further escalate tensions in the East Asian region, where both Japan and China maintain significant military presence and influence.

Japan hosts the largest concentration of U.S. military forces outside the United States, including warships, aircraft, and thousands of Marines stationed in Okinawa. The proximity of U.S. forces adds another layer of stra-

tegic complexity, with potential implications for regional security. The U.S. State Department was not immediately available for comment.

The Chinese aircraft involved were J-15 fighter jets, launched from the Liaoning aircraft carrier. Japan reported that the carrier was operating south of the Okinawan islands alongside three missile destroyers during the incidents. These movements coincide with a broader Chinese naval build-up in East Asian waters, which, according to Reuters citing intelligence sources, included more than 100 naval and coast guard vessels earlier in the week.

Taiwan's government has expressed concern over the Chinese military build-up, describing it as a potential threat to security across the Indo-Pacific region. Japan confirmed it is closely monitoring Chinese activities in its surrounding waters to ensure the safety of its airspace and maritime routes.

These incidents mark another chapter in a growing pattern of regional military posturing. Japan and China have long-standing disputes over territory and security influence in the East China Sea, particularly regarding islands claimed by both nations. Observers warn that repeated close encounters between military aircraft carry the risk of accidental escalation, underscoring the fragile nature of regional security dynamics.

With tensions continuing to simmer near Taiwan and Okinawa, the international community is closely watching the situation. Both Japan and its allies, including the United States, are expected to maintain vigilance to prevent any miscalculations that could destabilize the broader Indo-Pacific region.

US Strike on Venezuela Could Trigger Regional Chaos



Rising tensions between the United States and Venezuela have sparked fears that any U.S. military action could destabilize the country and trigger far-reaching consequences across Latin America. Experts warn that even a limited strike could set off a chain reaction of violence, political upheaval, and humanitarian crises.

Since early September 2025, the U.S. has conducted targeted strikes on at least 21 Venezuelan boats, reportedly linked to drug trafficking, resulting in at least 87 deaths. Washington justifies the operations as necessary to curb drug flows threatening U.S. national security, although critics contend that evidence connecting Venezuela directly to major narcotics exports is limited.

While some U.S. officials have not ruled out a full-scale invasion, analysts believe any intervention would likely be limited to air and naval strikes rather than ground operations. Logistical challenges, legal hurdles, domestic opposition, and the risk of protracted occupation make a full invasion improbable. Nonetheless, even short-term strikes carry significant risks for both Venezuelans and the broader region.

One of the most pressing concerns is the potential for armed groups to exploit the chaos. Analysts warn that any disruption of Venezuela's military or paramilitary structures could empower factions to seize control in parts of the country. Such fragmentation would likely exacerbate violence and make governance nearly impossible, threatening civilians already enduring severe hardship.

The political opposition in Venezuela may also lose ground. Experts note that external aggression often triggers a "rally-around-the-flag" effect, consolidating support for incumbent governments and providing justification for crackdowns on dissent. This dynamic could make meaningful political change more difficult, undermining U.S. objectives of promoting democracy or stability.

Humanitarian consequences would likely be severe. Venezuela's population is already grappling with hyperinflation, food shortages, and mass displacement. The United Nations estimates that nearly eight million people need humanitarian assistance. Even limited strikes could further disrupt electricity, water, medical services, and food distribution, intensifying suffering and displacement.

International ramifications are also a concern. Countries such as China and Russia, key allies of Caracas, could increase diplomatic or logistical support to Venezuela, complicating the situation. While direct military intervention by these powers seems unlikely, their backing could prolong conflict and heighten regional tensions.

Beyond immediate regional risks, analysts warn that a U.S. attack could set a dangerous precedent. By framing a domestic crisis as a threat warranting extraterritorial force, it could weaken international norms against unilateral military interventions and embolden similar actions elsewhere in Latin America.

Experts caution that what might be intended as a short, targeted operation could instead become a long, destabilizing conflict. The combination of political uncertainty, armed group activity, and humanitarian vulnerabilities could turn Venezuela into a protracted crisis zone, with ripple effects across neighboring countries.

As Washington weighs its options, the international community is watching closely. Diplomats, human rights advocates, and regional governments are urging restraint, emphasizing the need for dialogue and multilateral solutions to avoid triggering a "Pandora's box" of instability. For the Venezuelan people, the coming weeks may determine whether the nation remains on the brink of chaos or manages to navigate through rising tensions without a catastrophic conflict.

Fed Rate Decision, FII Flows to Shape Indian Markets

As the new week begins, Indian financial markets are set for a critical period, with investor attention focused on the U.S. Federal Reserve's upcoming policy decision and foreign institutional investor (FII) trading activity. Analysts say these two factors are likely to steer market momentum, while domestic economic indicators add an additional layer of uncertainty.

Last week, Indian indices closed largely flat after a week of mixed trading. The BSE Sensex and NSE Nifty 50 showed limited movement as investors adopted a cautious approach amid global and domestic uncertainties. Currency volatility further contributed to market caution, with the Indian rupee weakening past ₹90 against the U.S. dollar, raising concerns about capital flows and import costs.

The Federal Reserve's Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) meeting, scheduled for December 9-10, is expected to be the week's defining event. Investors will closely monitor both the Fed's interest rate decision and its forward guidance on monetary policy, which could significantly influence global risk sen-

timent and emerging-market equities, including India. Any indication of a rate cut or pause could boost risk appetite, while hints of further tightening may prompt investors to reduce exposure to emerging markets.

Foreign institutional investor activity will also play a crucial role in shaping market trends. Analysts note that FIIs remain cautious, with inflows and outflows heavily influenced by global monetary policy, the strength of the U.S. dollar, and domestic market fundamentals. Ajit Mishra, Senior Vice President at Religare Broking, observed that FIIs are likely to closely track India's inflation data scheduled for December 12, which will provide clues about the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) future policy stance.

Global cues remain equally important. Markets worldwide are reacting to economic data from the United States, fluctuations in bond yields, and the overall performance of major global indices. A surge in the dollar or a spike in U.S. yields could trigger capital outflows from emerging markets, while positive



global sentiment could attract fresh investment into Indian equities.

Domestic fundamentals also continue to influence investor sentiment. Corporate earnings announcements, inflation data, and macroeconomic trends are all under scrutiny. Analysts suggest that until clear signals emerge from both the Fed and FIIs, market participants are likely to maintain a cautious approach, balancing risk and opportunity carefully.

Ponmudi R, CEO of wealth-tech firm Enrich Money, noted that "If global fund flows rotate back into emerging markets, India could benefit, but it largely depends on clear and supportive cues from the U.S. Fed." Currency stability will also be critical, as a weakening rupee could deter foreign investors and increase volatility in equity markets.

Overall, the market mood can be described as "watchful wait." Investors are closely monitoring external and domestic developments, seeking indications on interest rates, foreign flows, and macroeconomic stability before making major investment decisions.

As the week progresses, the interplay between global monetary policy, FII activity, domestic inflation data, and currency movements will determine the trajectory of Indian stock markets. Analysts caution that while opportunities exist for gains, heightened volatility is likely, emphasizing the need for prudent trading and investment strategies in the coming days.

TCS, Infosys Lead ₹72,285 Crore Market-Cap Surge Among Top Firms

New Delhi — The combined market capitalization of five of India's top ten most-valued firms surged by ₹72,284.74 crore last week, led by TCS and Infosys, according to market data. The gains underscore selective investor interest in IT and financial sector blue-chips, even as some heavyweight firms witnessed declines.

Among the top performers, Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) posted the biggest gain, adding ₹35,909.52 crore to reach a market valuation of ₹11,71,862.37 crore. Infosys followed with an increase of ₹23,404.55 crore, taking its market cap to ₹6,71,366.53 crore. Other contributors included Bajaj Finance, which rose ₹6,720.28 crore to ₹6,52,396.39 crore; Bharti Airtel, gaining ₹3,791.90 crore to ₹12,01,832.74 crore; and ICICI Bank, up ₹2,458.49 crore to ₹9,95,184.46 crore. Collectively, these five firms drove a significant portion of market momentum among India's large-cap stocks.

However, not all top firms participated in the rally. Reliance Industries led the declines, falling ₹35,116.76 crore to ₹20,85,218.71 crore. Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) dropped ₹15,559.49 crore to ₹5,50,021.80 crore, while State Bank of India slipped ₹7,522.96 crore to ₹8,96,662.19 crore. HDFC Bank and Larsen & Toubro also recorded losses of ₹5,724.03 crore and ₹4,185.39 crore, respectively. These contrasting movements highlight the selective nature of recent investor interest, focused on firms with strong earnings growth prospects or perceived resilience.

Market analysts noted that the surge in TCS and Infosys valuations reflects continued optimism in India's IT sector, which has benefited from strong global demand, digital transformation trends, and consistent earnings growth. Meanwhile, financial services companies like ICICI Bank and Bajaj Finance gained as investor sentiment around credit growth and retail finance remained positive.

Despite the sharp gains in individual firms' market caps, broad-



er indices showed muted performance. The BSE Sensex rose marginally by 5.7 points, while the NSE Nifty 50 fell 16.5 points over the same period. This divergence indicates that gains were concentrated in select high-performing stocks rather than a broad market rally. Analysts suggest that stock-specific factors — including recent quarterly results, earnings guidance, and sectoral developments — drove the momentum rather than overall market trends.

The market-cap surge also illustrates the growing dominance of certain firms in shaping overall investor sentiment. TCS and Infosys, in particular, continue to attract foreign and domestic portfolio inflows due to their strong fundamentals and global business presence. Similarly, companies in the financial sector remain attractive to investors seeking growth combined with relative stability.

For investors, these developments underline the importance of selective stock picking. While broader indices may show muted gains or volatility, targeted investments in high-quality large-cap firms with strong earnings visibility and sectoral tailwinds can deliver substantial returns. The performance of TCS, Infosys, and other top gainers is expected to continue to influence market sentiment in the near term, highlighting the evolving dynamics of India's equity market.

In summary, last week's ₹72,285 crore surge in market capitalization among five top firms demonstrates concentrated investor optimism, with IT and financial services stocks leading the gains, while several heavyweight firms faced declines. The selective nature of these movements emphasizes the need for strategic stock selection amid mixed market performance.

Midcaps Likely to Lead Market Gains in 2026, Says Kotak AMC

New Delhi — Mid-cap stocks are expected to outperform both large-cap and small-cap equities in 2026, according to Nilesh Shah, Managing Director of Kotak Mahindra Asset Management Company (AMC). In its recently released market outlook for the calendar year, Kotak AMC highlighted improving domestic consumption, strong earnings growth, and renewed foreign investor interest as key drivers for mid-cap outperformance.

Shah noted that corporate earnings are projected to remain robust in FY2026, with many companies expected to report double-digit growth in FY2027. This growth, coupled with a more stable macroeconomic environment, is anticipated to attract foreign portfolio investments, providing liquidity and supporting mid-cap valuations. "While mid-caps are likely to outperform, investors should adopt a balanced approach, moderating return expectations and diversifying across sectors," Shah advised.



Apple, Google, Samsung Push Back Against India’s “Always-On” Location Tracking Proposal



India is facing a growing debate over digital privacy as the government considers a proposal that would require all smartphones sold in the country to keep GPS-based location tracking permanently enabled. This “always-on” tracking rule would allow authorities to access a user’s precise location in real time, even when the device owner believes location services are switched off. 
