ISRO Gears Up for PSLV-C62 Launch from Sriharikota, Chairman Seeks Divine Blessings at Tirumala and Srikalahasti

Sullurupeta, Andhra Pradesh: In a blend of cutting-edge science and age-old tradition, the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) is set for a major milestone tomorrow. The space agency will launch the PSLV-C62 rocket from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Sriharikota at 10:17 AM on Monday, January 12. Scientists have confirmed all preparations are complete, with the countdown commencing 24 hours earlier on Sunday at 10:17 AM. This mission marks the ninth full-stack commercial satellite for NewSpace India Limited (NSIL), ISRO's commercial arm. At its core is the EOS-N1 Earth observation satellite, critical for India's defense sector. Speaking to me-

dia after darshan at Tirumala Temple on Saturday morning, ISRO Chairman Dr. V. Narayanan highlighted its importance: "Through PSLV-C62, we're placing the EOS-N1 satellite into orbit. This is vital for national defense. It's ISRO's first launch of 2026 and the 64th in the PSLV series. The mission will also deploy eight foreign satellites, adding to the 442 foreign satellites ISRO has launched so far. "The pre-launch rituals underscored the cultural reverence that accompanies India's space endeavors. Dr. Narayanan, accompanied by key scientists, availed VIP break darshan at the Tirumala Sri Venkateswara Temple. They then visited the Mukkanti Temple in Srikalahasti and the Chengalamma Temple in Sullurupeta, performing special pujas. Rocket and satellite

models were placed at the feet of the deities for blessings, symbolizing the fusion of devotion and innovation that has defined ISRO's successes. The PSLV-C62, a reliable workhorse of India's space program, will carry the primary EOS-N1 payload alongside international satellites. EOS-N1, part of the Earth Observation Satellite series, promises advanced imaging capabilities for surveillance, disaster management, and strategic monitoring key for defense applications amid evolving geopolitical needs. The foreign payloads further boost India's stature in the global commercial launch market, where NSIL has emerged as a competitive player post-privatization reforms. This launch comes at a pivotal time for ISRO, following a stellar 2025 with successes like the

Gaganyaan test flights and Aditya-L1's solar insights. With 2026 underway, PSLV-C62 sets the tone for an ambitious calendar, including heavier GSLV missions and private sector collaborations. Local excitement is palpable in Sullurupeta, Tirumala, and Srikalahasti, where residents anticipate the thunderous roar echoing through the region. Security has been tightened around Sriharikota, with coastal alerts for fishing communities. Weather forecasts predict clear skies, ideal for the polar sun-synchronous orbit insertion. Dr. Narayanan expressed confidence: "Our teams are primed. This mission reinforces India's self-reliance in space. "As the countdown ticks, all eyes turn skyward, where tradition meets technology in pursuit of the stars.



27 AndhraTelangana Youths Rescued from Myanmar Trafficking Trap Through Union Minister Rammohan Naidu's Intervention

New Delhi/Srikakulam: In a swift display of governmental efficiency, Union Civil Aviation Minister Kinjarapu Rammohan Naidu orchestrated the safe return of 27 Indian youths from Andhra Pradesh and Telangana who were lured to Myanmar with false job promises and trapped in exploitative conditions.

The victims, who reached Myanmar a few months ago, endured forced cyber scams, physical abuse, and other hardships before their desperate video pleas prompted Naidu's decisive action. The ordeal began with deceptive offers of lucrative employment. Youths from districts including Vijayanagaram, Visakhapatnam, Anamayya, Hyderabad, and Jagtial fell for the bait, only to face a grim reality. In videos sent directly to Naidu, they described being coerced into illegal cyber fraud operations, subjected to physical mistreatment, and fearing human trafficking at the borders. "We were promised good jobs, but they've turned us into slaves,"

one victim recounted in the footage, highlighting their dire predicament. Moved by their plight, Minister Naidu wasted no time. He penned a letter to External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar, urging immediate steps to repatriate the 27 Indian nationals safely. The Ministry of External Affairs, in coordination with the Indian Embassy in Yangon, sprang into action. On Saturday, the group was rescued and flown back to India, landing in New Delhi that morning amid tears of relief and joy. Upon arrival, the victims expressed profound gratitude to Naidu for his personal intervention. "We are alive today because of the Minister's efforts," said one, as the group was provided arrangements to travel to their hometowns from Delhi. The full list of rescued individuals includes Ramu Gunnugukella, Sai Kumar Kanakavalli, Ajay Dubba, Jagadish Sahu, Brahmaji Alugolu, Bhuvaneswari Gandaboyina, Dinesh Gandaboyina, Dhanunjaya Rao Guvvala, Chinu Deepak Moradaboodi, Sriharsh Allu, Jayakrishna Chatala, G. Ramakrishna, S.A. Nazma Begum, Arunendra

Mathi, Mastan Gaggurturi, Jaswanth Kumar Reddy, Chaitanya Kumar Reddy, Joy Vignan Salaga, Vijay Kumar Isukapati, Sai Nikesh Devar, Ramesh Pallevonu, Rakesh Mantri, Tejashwi Tunga, Murali, B. Chinna Mallayya, M. Suma Lakshmi, and J. Shekhar Babu. Naidu emphasized the NDA government's unwavering commitment to every Indian's safety, dignity, and welfare abroad. "Our coalition stands firmly with those in distress, ensuring no citizen is left behind," he stated from his camp office in Srikakulam. This rescue underscores the perils of unregulated overseas job schemes and highlights the critical role of prompt diplomatic channels. Indian authorities have issued fresh advisories against unverified foreign job offers, particularly in Southeast Asia, where cyber scam syndicates have ensnared thousands. The Ministry of External Affairs continues to monitor similar cases, with Naidu's office vowing ongoing support for affected families. 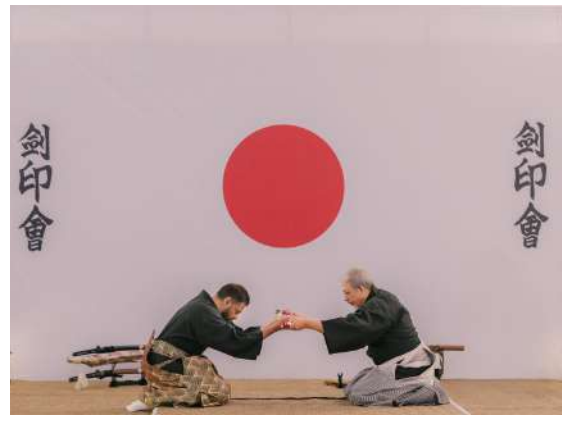

Guntur Police Innovate with ‘Walk of Shame’ Counseling for 100 Rowdy-Sheeters

Guntur: In a unconventional yet stern approach to tackling rowdism, Guntur district police on Saturday rounded up approximately 100 habitual offenders and subjected them to a specially designed counseling session followed by a public “walk of discipline.” The initiative, spearheaded by Superintendent of Police Vakul Jindal, underscores the force’s determination to reform repeat criminals through psychological deterrence rather than just legal action.

The operation targeted individuals frequently involved in crimes across the district, including petty thefts, public distur-

bances, and gang-related activities. Early Saturday morning, police teams from various stations swooped down on the rowdy-sheeters’ hideouts, bundling them into vehicles and transporting them to the Police Dormitory premises on the outskirts of Guntur city.

There, a team of specially trained officers conducted an intensive counseling program. The session focused on the consequences of their actions not just legal penalties, but the broader impact on families, communities, and their own futures. “We discussed real-life stories of reformed criminals who turned their lives around, the futility of a life in crime, and opportunities in legiti-

mate livelihoods,” revealed a senior police official involved in the exercise.

The counseling emphasized skill development programs, government welfare schemes, and the availability of counseling hotlines for addiction and anger management. Participants were made to introspect on their choices, with officers using multimedia presentations and group discussions to drive the message home.

But the real twist came post-counseling. The group was loaded into police vans and driven to the NTR Stadium Circle in the heart of Guntur city a bustling public hub teeming with shoppers, commuters, and families.

Stripped of their footwear, the rowdy-sheeters were made to walk barefoot for several kilometers along busy roads under strict police supervision.

The public spectacle was intended as a humbling experience, symbolizing the “long, arduous walk away from crime” toward redemption. Eyewitnesses described the scene as surreal: “Dozens of tough-looking men, usually strutting with bravado, were seen limping on the hot asphalt, heads bowed, as passersby watched in amusement and approval,” said a local shopkeeper near the stadium.

Social media buzzed with videos and photos, with many netizens



praising the police for this creative enforcement. After the walk, the offenders were escorted back to their respective police stations. There, they affixed signatures to undertakings promising to mend their ways, avoid criminal activities, and report regularly. “This is your last warning,” SP

Vakul Jindal told the media later.

“If they fail to reform, we will invoke the PD Act (Preventive Detention) without hesitation. Our goal is prevention through awareness, but law will take its course if needed. “This initiative draws inspiration from similar “reform walks” in other

states but marks a first for Guntur. Police data shows a 20% spike in petty crimes last quarter, prompting such proactive measures. Community leaders welcomed the move, calling it a “wake-up call” for youth veering toward rowdism.

Critics, however, questioned if public

shaming violates dignity, though SP Jindal defended it as consensual post-counseling and proportionate to offenses. As Guntur police monitor compliance, this “barefoot counseling” could set a new template for crime control in Andhra Pradesh, blending empathy with enforcement.

Kerala Charts Ambitious Path to Carbon Neutrality with EESL Partnership

Thiruvananthapuram/Vijayawada: Kerala has unveiled a bold, multi-pronged strategy to spearhead India’s climate action, committing to saturation-level energy efficiency measures and renewable energy adoption across government departments. The state aims to slash its financial electricity burden, deliver cost-effective services, and hit carbon neutrality by 2050 while targeting 100% renewable energy by 2040. At a high-level meeting in Thiruvananthapuram, K.R. Jyothi Lal, Addi-



tional Chief Secretary (Finance), led discussions with Energy Efficiency Services Limited (EESL) CEO Akhilesh Kumar Dixit and a Delhi

delegation.

Participants included KSEB CMD Minhaj Alam, Power Secretary Puneet Kumar, Finance Secretaries Patil Ajit

and Keshvendra Kumar, ANERT CEO Harshil R. Meena, EMC Director Hari Kumar, and EESL State Head K.N. Mathew. The talks focused on de-

ploying advanced technologies for sustainable growth.

Jyothi Lal emphasized collaboration with EESL a joint venture of PSUs under the Ministry of Power and the Bureau of Energy Efficiency (BEE). “Kerala will champion climate combat, ensuring economic sustainability and high-quality services for future generations,” he stated.

The state recently earned BEE’s National Energy Conservation Award for exemplary performance. EESL showcased Andhra Pradesh’s Araku model, using Air Source Heat Pump (ASHP) technol-

ogy for 50-70% energy savings, 300 tonnes annual CO2 cuts, low maintenance, and eco-friendly refrigerants mirroring successes in tourist hubs like Vizag.

Officials praised AP’s UJALA scheme, which distributed 2.2 crore LED bulbs, averted 2.3 million tonnes of CO2, and contributed to BEE’s national 321 million tonne reduction in 2023-24. Key Initiatives Outlined: Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS): Install in Thiruvananthapuram government buildings using 18 MW solar setup; explore at KSEB substations for peak-load man-

agement and revenue. LED Streetlights & EV Charging: Roll out statewide, including rural areas, with public EV infrastructure expansion. 25,000 Government Buildings as Prosumers: Solarize to end 300 crore annual bills, add BESS, and sell surplus power to KSEB. Building Code Amendments: EMC and LS GD to enforce conservation in new/existing structures. PMAY/Life Mission Efficiency: Supply BLDC fans, LED lights to beneficiaries for mass savings. EV Fleet & V2G: Electrify 12,000 government vehicles; integrate Vehicle-to-

Grid for peak supply.

KWA Upgrades: Assess energy use, deploy efficient pumps via National Motor Replacement Programme, consider BESS. Jyothi Lal directed departments to sign time-bound MoUs for rapid rollout. Puneet Kumar thanked the Ministry of Power and BEE for the award during National Energy Conservation Week.

Kerala and Andhra Pradesh have driven UJALA’s national success. This partnership positions Kerala as a clean energy leader, blending efficiency with innovation for a greener future.

Amaravati Farmers Slam Ex-CM Jagan Over Capital Remarks, Warn of YSRCP’s Political Backlash

Amaravati, Andhra Pradesh: Farmers from the Amaravati region erupted in fury against former Chief Minister Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy, declaring him unfit to comment on the state’s capital development. Members of the Mandadam Rythu Shakti Sangham, a key farmers’ welfare group, staged a protest here today, accusing Jagan of poisoning public discourse on Amaravati at a time when the TDP-led government is pushing revival efforts.

The outburst stems from Jagan’s recent statements criticizing the Amaravati capital project, which he had scaled back during his 2019-2024 tenure in favor of a three-capitals formula (Visakhapatnam as executive capital, Amaravati as legislative, and Kurnool as judicial). Farmers, who donated over 30,000 acres of prime land for the greenfield capital under Chandrababu Naidu’s first term (2014-2019), view his remarks as a betrayal.

“Jagan holds no position as opposition leader—he has no right to speak on Amaravati,” fumed Sangham spokesperson K. Satyanarayana during the demonstration. “He poisoned the project before, and if he spits venom again, YSRCP will be confined to single digits in the next elections.

“The farmers didn’t hold back, vowing aggressive counter-campaigns. “We’ll take our fight to Pulivendula, Jagan’s stronghold, and expose his hypocrisy,” Satyanarayana declared.

They mocked Jagan’s security detail, alleging he hides behind “curtains and screens” while claiming insight into Amaravati’s progress. “How can someone shielded like that see the roads, infrastructure, and growth happening here?” they questioned.

The group urged the Chandrababu Naidu government to act swiftly against Jagan, filing complaints or restricting his provocative rhetoric. This isn’t the first clash. Amaravati farmers have been vocal since Naidu’s 2024 return to power, celebrating the High Court’s 2024 ruling upholding Amaravati as the sole capital and the government’s 50,000 crore master plan revival. Projects like the 1,600 crore outer ring road and Singapore-style master planning are underway, with land values surging 20-30% in the past year.

Yet, YSRCP’s lingering opposition keeps tensions high, especially as bypolls loom. Political analysts see this as a flashpoint in Andhra Pradesh’s polarized landscape. TDP and allies like Janasena frame Amara-

vati as a symbol of revival, while YSRCP pushes decentralization to appeal to Rayalaseema voters. “Jagan’s barbs risk alienating Krishna district’s powerful farmer bloc, which handed TDP a landslide in 2024,” noted local commentator V. Ramakrishna.

Recent surveys show YSRCP’s support dipping below 20% in coastal Andhra, fueling fears of an electoral rout. The protest, attended by over 200 farmers, ended with chants of “Jai Amaravati” and pledges to monitor Jagan’s tours. Officials confirmed no FIRs yet but said police are reviewing footage. As Naidu’s administration races against its 2029 deadline, Amaravati remains a battleground where land donors demand justice and politicians vie for legacy.

In a related development, TDP MLAs echoed the farmers, calling for Jagan’s “anti-development agenda” to be checked. The episode underscores Andhra’s enduring capital saga, blending agrarian pride with high-stakes politics.



Amaravati to Become World’s Top-5 Capital: Can’t Compare to Hyderabad Secretariat, Fires Back Minister Narayana

Amaravati, Andhra Pradesh: The contentious issue of Amaravati as Andhra Pradesh’s capital has reignited political tensions, with TDP-led coalition leaders sharply rebuking YSRCP criticisms. On Sunday, Minister for Municipal Administration and Urban Development, Narayana, launched a scathing attack on YSRCP leaders, particularly Information

Minister V. Rajendra Reddy (Sajjala), dismissing their remarks as baseless and accusing them of speaking whimsically. The flare-up stems from recent YSRCP statements questioning the feasibility and scale of Amaravati’s development. Sajjala had reportedly compared the proposed Amaravati capital complex unfavorably to the Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Telangana State Secretariat in Hyderabad, implying it was overly ambitious. Narayana categorically rejected this, declaring, “Amaravati cannot be compared to the Hyderabad secretariat. We are transforming it into one of the world’s top-5 capitals.

“Emphasizing the NDA government’s unwavering commitment, Narayana highlighted ongoing efforts to elevate Amaravati to global standards. “Amaravati’s development is unstoppable. We’re building it as a world-class city with sustainable infrastructure,

green spaces, and iconic architecture inspired by international best practices,” he asserted during a media interaction in Amaravati.

He pointed to the revival of land pooling agreements, resumed tenders for key projects like the High Court, Assembly, and secretariat buildings, and fresh investments following the 2024 elections. Narayana didn’t hold back on personal jabs, criticizing former Chief Minister Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy’s understanding of urban planning. “Jagan doesn’t know the difference between a river bed and a basin.

YSRCP leaders are just talking nonsense out of spite,” he thundered, referencing past controversies over Krishna River basin encroachments during the YSRCP regime. He accused the opposition of derailing Amaravati for political gain, recalling how the Jagan government shifted to a three-capitals formula in

2019, which the Andhra Pradesh High Court later struck down. This exchange underscores deepening divides ahead of key legislative sessions. TDP and allies view Amaravati as a symbol of state pride and economic revival, projecting a 50,000 crore investment over the next decade. YSRCP, however, insists on decentralized development across Visakhapatnam, Kurnool, and Amaravati. Farmers who pooled 33,000 acres remain divided, with some hailing the revival and others wary of delays. As construction ramps up, Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu’s vision—drawing from Singapore and Canberra models gains momentum. Narayana warned YSRCP against “obstructing progress,” urging focus on governance over rhetoric. Political analysts see this as TDP consolidating its base in coastal Andhra, where Amaravati enjoys strong support.

South Central Railway Introduces Jansadharan Special Trains to Ease Passenger Rush Between Visakhapatnam and Vijayawada

Visakhapatnam: In a move to address the growing demand for affordable travel options amid the post-festive and weekend rush, the South Central Railway (SCR) has announced the operation of Jansadharan Special Trains between Visakhapatnam and Vijayawada. These unserved special trains, numbered 08567 and 08568, will run on select dates starting January 12, promising convenient connectivity for commuters across key stations in Andhra Pradesh.

The outbound train, No. 08567 Visakhapatnam-Vijayawada Jansadharan Special, will depart from Vi-

sakhapatnam Railway Station at 10:00 hrs on January 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, and 18. It will cover the 320-kilometer distance, arriving at Vijayawada by 16:00 hrs on the same day. This six-hour journey provides a daytime option ideal for daily commuters, students, and budget travelers heading towards the Krishna-Godavari delta region. In the return direction, Train No. 08568 Vijayawada-Visakhapatnam Jansadharan Special will originate from Vijayawada at 18:30 hrs on the same dates January 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, and 18. The train will reach Visakhapatnam at 00:35 hrs (midnight) the following day, offering an evening departure that suits of-

fice-goers and those wrapping up daily errands. Both trains will halt at major intermediate stations, ensuring widespread accessibility. Key stops include Duvvada, Anakapalle, Elamanchili, Tuni, Annavaram, Samalkot, Rajahmundry, Nidadavolu, Tadepalligudem, Eluru, and Gangavaram. These stations serve bustling coastal and Godavari districts, facilitating easy access for passengers from North Andhra and East Godavari regions. Comprising all general class coaches, the trains emphasize affordability and inclusivity, aligning with the Jansadharan scheme’s focus on unreserved travel for the masses. No AC or sleeper



classes will be available, keeping fares low and encouraging walk-in bookings. Tickets can be purchased at station counters or via UTS mobile app, with provisions for general quotas. SCR officials highlighted the initiative as a response to surging passenger footfall, especially with Sankranti festivities approaching and ongoing regional events. “These specials will decongest regular trains and provide reliable

Amaravati: Members of the Farmers Welfare Association expressed fierce outrage against YSRCP leader Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy today, countering his recent comments on Amaravati as the state capital. At a meeting here, they accused Jagan of flip-flopping: supporting Amaravati development while in opposition but undermining it once in power. "The coalition government has kickstarted Amaravati projects right after coming to office," they emphasized, slamming Jagan for now trying to stall progress.

The gathering, attended by former Intelligence Chief A.B. Venkateswara Rao as chief guest, turned into a platform for sharp rebukes. Farmers questioned Jagan's logic: "If the Chief Minister stays anywhere, does that make it the capital? Is that sensible?" They

highlighted how YSRCP's defeat reduced to just 11 seats was a public rebuke for leaders like Botsa Satyanarayana calling Amaravati a "crematorium" or "desert."

"Jagan speaks against the state and Constitution," they charged, demanding the Andhra Pradesh government take immediate action against him for disrespecting constitutional norms. Association members credited the Amaravati agitation as the key factor behind the coalition's rise to power. "Jagan shouldn't provoke people like this," they warned, issuing a bold challenge:

"If he has the guts, come to the Assembly with his 11 MLAs." They urged him to highlight real government lapses instead of divisive rhetoric. Recalling Jagan's five-year tenure, they asked: "Where was he governing from? His own house is in Am-



aravati." They pointed out that as early as 2015, Jagan had pushed a case against Amaravati in the Green Tribunal, which later gave it a clean chit. The farmers clarified they have no objection to a second land pooling phase for the capital's expansion.

References to other YSRCP figures sharpened the attacks. "Former MP Nandigam Suresh still lives in Am-

aravati," they noted, warning that if Jagan continues this way, "Amaravati women are ready to bury his political career." They branded him "deceptive Reddy," mocking his governance as mere "button-pressing" and his inconsistent statements—often followed by clarifications from Sajjala Ramakrishna Reddy.

"Drop the 'so-called' jabs," they satirized, threatening to "teach

him a lesson" otherwise. Farmers fumed that Jagan even hesitates to utter "Amaravati's" name. The meeting underscored ongoing tensions over Andhra Pradesh's capital saga, with farmers rallying behind the coalition's revival of stalled projects. They affirmed support for Amaravati as the singular capital, rejecting three-capitals rhetoric.

CM Chandrababu Naidu Warns Against Tarnishing Visakhapatnam's Image, Praises Swift Police Action in Woman's Assault Case

Amaravati: Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu issued a stern warning on Sunday, stating he would not tolerate any attempts to damage Visakhapatnam's brand image. The remarks came in response to a brazen daylight assault on a young woman near Jagadamba Centre in the city, where police arrested the perpetrator within hours. Speaking in Amaravati, Naidu commended the Visakhapatnam city police for their prompt action. "Visakhapatnam's reputation is our pride. We won't allow anyone to tarnish it," he declared, handing over a citation to the officers despite the lack of concrete evidence initially linking the accused to the attack. The CM's praise highlighted the force's efficiency in using CCTV footage to nab the suspect. The incident unfolded on Sunday morning in a busy area near Jagadamba Centre's theatre zone.

The victim, a young woman heading to her office, paused to photo-

graph a poster for the film Raja Saab. A man loitering nearby suddenly approached her aggressively. She initially thought he was yelling at nearby auto-rickshaw drivers. Moments later, he turned on her, slapping her cheek hard, verbally abusing her with lewd remarks, and fleeing the scene. The assault left the woman traumatized, with her eyeglasses shattered.

Shaken and confused about the unprovoked attack, she recorded a video detailing the ordeal—crying as she noted how no bystanders intervened despite the crowded spot. She shared the clip on social media, expressing anguish over the lack of public response. She also called her office colleagues, who rushed to the scene, took her to safety, and accompanied her to file a complaint with local police.

Officers arrived promptly at Jagadamba Centre, reviewed nearby CCTV footage, and identified the assailant. Within a few hours, they arrested him and transported him to the



police station. Authorities revealed the accused was mentally unstable, adding a layer of complexity to the case. Naidu's intervention underscores the state government's zero-tolerance stance on crimes against women, especially in high-profile urban areas like Visakhapatnam, a key hub for Andhra

Pradesh's development ambitions. The city has been positioning itself as a major investment destination, and such incidents risk undermining public confidence. Police officials confirmed the accused would face charges under relevant sections for assault and public nuisance. The victim received medical atten-

tion, and investigations continue to ascertain if mental health issues played a role. This swift resolution serves as a reminder of the importance of surveillance infrastructure and responsive policing. Naidu's commendation boosts morale among ranks, signaling strong political backing for law enforcement.

CPI(M) Veteran B.V. Raghavulu Urges YSRCP Chief Jagan to End Amaravati Capital Row

Vijayawada: CPI(M) Politburo member and senior leader B.V. Raghavulu on Sunday sharply criticized YSRCP president Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy for reigniting the Amaravati capital controversy, calling his remarks and the ensuing debates unnecessary and counterproductive. With Andhra Pradesh marking 15 years since its formation from Telangana bifurcation, Raghavulu emphasized that prolonging disputes over the capital serves no purpose and urged all stakeholders to focus on development. Addressing a press conference here, Raghavulu recalled that Amaravati, located along the Krishna River basin, had once garnered unanimous support from all political parties and the public.

"Everyone agreed on Amaravati as the capital. Jagan himself accepted it initially," he pointed out, referencing Reddy's earlier endorsements. He advised the former chief minister to change his stance now, arguing that dredging up old issues like whether Amaravati qualifies as a "Krishna riverbank area" is irrelevant today. Instead of stirring controversy, Raghavulu called for constructive

criticism.

"If there were flaws or corruption in the capital's construction works under the previous TDP government, question those specifics," he said. He exhorted the ruling TDP-Janasena-BJP alliance and the central government to expedite Amaravati's development, pressing Jagan and YSRCP to cooperate rather than obstruct. "The NDA government and Centre should face pressure to complete the capital swiftly. YSRCP must lend support," he added.

Raghavulu's intervention comes amid renewed sparring over Andhra Pradesh's long-pending capital. Post-2019 elections, Jagan's YSRCP shelved the Amaravati masterplan, proposing a three-capitals model (Amaravati as legislative, Visakhapatnam as executive, Kurnool as judicial). The TDP-led coalition, returning to power in 2024, has reaffirmed Amaravati as the sole greenfield capital, resuming land pooling and infrastructure works with central backing.

Jagan's recent barbs, accusing Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu of mismanagement, have fueled protests from farmers who surrendered land for the project. The CPI(M) leader didn't

spare Jagan on other fronts either. He slammed Reddy's attacks on Naidu over irrigation projects like Rayalaseema Lift Irrigation and Polavaram. "YSR Rajasekhara Reddy promised Veligonda, Handri-Neva, and Galeru none completed yet. Don't create unnecessary ruckus over non-existent projects and mislead the people," Raghavulu cautioned. Dismissing Jagan's highlighting of Polavaram "failures," he urged focusing on unfinished works from past regimes rather than politicizing delays. Raghavulu's remarks underscore growing frustration among non-TDP parties with the capital deadlock, which has stalled state progress for over a decade.

CPI(M), a consistent voice for farmers' rights, has long advocated resolving the issue through consensus. As Andhra Pradesh eyes 2029 centenary of statehood movements, his call for unity highlights the political tightrope: balancing regional aspirations with governance realities. Political analysts see this as a subtle shift, with even Left leaders pushing Jagan toward pragmatism. With assembly sessions looming, the Amaravati row could intensify

Minister Slams Jagan Over Amaravati Criticism, Accuses YSRCP of Capital's 'Destruction'

Amaravati, Andhra Pradesh: Andhra Pradesh Minister Mandipalli Ramprasad Reddy launched a scathing attack on former Chief Minister Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy, accusing him of suffering from "indigestion" over Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu's efforts to revive Amaravati as the state's capital. Speaking in response to Jagan's recent remarks criticizing the ongoing reconstruction, Reddy alleged that it was Jagan's YSR Congress Party (YSRCP) regime that had deliberately "destroyed" the capital project, leaving the state without a functional capital for five years. Reddy, a key TDP minister known for his outspoken defense of the government's development agenda, minced no words during a press interaction here today.

"While CM Chandrababu Babu is rebuilding Amaravati as the capital, Jagan is burning with jealousy," he declared. He accused the former CM of sidelining Amaravati for five years, reducing it to a state of ridicule and neglect. "Jagan is the one who wrecked the

state by leaving it without a capital. Under YSRCP rule, they staged a drama with the 'three capitals' idea and plunged Andhra Pradesh into chaos," Reddy fumed.

The minister's outburst comes amid renewed momentum in Amaravati's development under the TDP-led NDA government. Since returning to power in June 2024, Naidu has fast-tracked infrastructure projects, allocating 15,000 crore in the latest budget for the capital region's revival. This includes land acquisition, road networks, and greenfield developments envisioned in the original master plan by Singapore-based consultants.

Supporters hail it as a return to Naidu's 2014-2019 vision of a world-class green capital, but it has reignited political tensions. Jagan, now YSRCP president and Leader of Opposition, has repeatedly questioned the single-capital focus, arguing it burdens farmers whose lands were pooled earlier. In a recent public speech, he claimed the government's push ignores rural distress and revives a "failed dream." YSRCP leaders echo this, pointing to the 2021 Govern-



ment Reorganisation Bill that proposed Visakhapatnam as executive capital, Amaravati as legislative, and Kurnool as judicial. Reddy dismissed these claims as post-facto excuses. "They mocked Amaravati, stalled projects, and scared away investors. Now, with Naidu Babu restoring investor confidence, Jagan's frustration is evident," he added. The exchange underscores deepening divides ahead of local body elections, with TDP positioning Amaravati as a symbol of governance revival, while YSRCP rallies around decentralized development. Political analysts see this as classic TDP-YSRCP rivalry, with Amaravati remaining a flashpoint in Andhra's fractured polity. As construction ramps up, all eyes are on whether Naidu can deliver on promises amid legal and political hurdles.

YS Jagan's Flip-Flops on Amaravati Draw TDP Fire from Yanamala Ramakrishnudu

Amaravati: TDP senior leader and former minister Yanamala Ramakrishnudu sharply criticized YSRCP chief YS Jagan Mohan Reddy over his inconsistent statements on Amaravati as the state's capital. A striking example, he noted, is the Danube River, which flows through four national capitals: Austria's Vienna, Slovakia's Bratislava, Hungary's Budapest, and Serbia's Belgrade. Other iconic cases include Egypt's Cairo on the Nile, London's Thames, Paris on the Seine, and Washington DC on the Potomac. "These cities didn't just survive they prospered because of their riverfront locations," Ramakrishnudu emphasized.

Andhra Pradesh Witnesses Record-Breaking National Highway Construction Post-Coalition Government

The state is now achieving record levels of progress in national highway pro-jects, highlighted by the swift advancement of the Bengaluru-Ka-dapa-Vijayawada Eco-nomic Corridor.

This surge has pro-pelled the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) to se-cure Guinness World Records, underscoring the state’s commit-ment to rapid, high-quality road building. A stand-out achievement unfolded in Sri Sathya Sai and Puttaparthi districts, where non-stop con-struction occurred from 10:07 AM on Jan-uary 6 to the morning of January 11, 2026. Over these six days,

workers laid an aston-ishing 52 kilometers of road (equivalent to 156 lane kilometers), set-ting a new benchmark in highway develop-ment. The record was forged in the Vanavolu-Vankaragunta-Odu-lapalle section under Packages 2 and 3, where intensive con-crete pouring and pav-ing operations clinched two Guinness Records. Construction firm Rajpath Infracon supplied a staggering 57,500 metric tons of concrete, ensuring top-tier quality through-out. The operation mobi-lized an impressive fleet: 70 tippers, 5 mix-ing plants, and 17 roll-ers worked relentlessly around the clock. This seamless coordi-nation delivered flaw-less execution, with every phase adhering to stringent quality standards. The Bengal-uru-Kadapa-Vijayawa-da corridor, a vital eco-nomic artery connecting key re-gions, benefits im-mensely from this ac-

celeration, promising enhanced connectivity, trade, and growth for Andhra Pradesh.

Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu extended heartfelt con-gratulations to NHAI, state officials, and Raj-path Infracon for this feat. In a statement, he praised their dedica-tion, noting how such initiatives align with the government’s vi-sion for world-class in-frastructure. “This re-cord not only boosts our highways but ig-nites development across the state,” Naidu remarked, em-phasizing the coal-i-tion’s focus on timely project delivery.

This milestone comes amid broader highway expansions in Andhra Pradesh, where daily progress rivals national highs. Previously lagging projects have revived, signaling a new era of efficiency. Experts hail it as a game-changer for logistics, tourism, and employment in the region.

Amaravati Water Minister Briefs Team Ahead of Supreme Court Hearing on Polavaram-Nallamala Sagar Link Project

Vijayawada | Amara-vati: Andhra Pradesh Heavy Water Resources Minister Nimmala Rama-naidu emphasized that the Polavaram-Nal-lamala Sagar Link Pro-ject aims to redirect wa-ter wasted into the sea toward Rayalaseema, transforming the drought-prone region into a lush, green ex-pense. Speaking ahead of Monday’s Supreme Court arguments on the project, the minister held a video conference with senior officials in Amaravati on Sunday.

He instructed the legal team to present ro-bust arguments on be-half of the state government. Minister Ramanaidu directed wa-

ter resources depart-ment officials to furnish the legal team with all records related to the case. He explained that the project proposes uti-lizing just 200 TMC of the 3,000 TMC of water that flows wastefully into the sea annually. Citing the Godavari Wa-ter Disputes Tribunal (GWDT) award, he as-serted Andhra Pradesh’s right to use the surplus water.

“As the lower riparian state in the Godavari ba-sin, Andhra Pradesh can harness the remain-ing floodwater without infringing on other states’ rights,” he clar-ified to the officials. The minister noted that the state has already sub-mitted a feasibility re-port to the Centre and is



incorporating their sug-gestions. He stressed that tenders related to the Detailed Project Re-port (DPR) are merely preparatory steps. “We will proceed with con-struction only after ob-taining all legal clear-ances,” Ramanaidu declared.

The project seeks to link the Godavari River—flowing through Andhra Pradesh as its final state with Nalla-mala Sagar to pump sur-plus waters to Rayala-seema, preventing their merger into the sea at Antarvedi. This initia-tive aligns with efforts to maximize underuti-lized resources for agri-cultural prosperity. How-ever, Telangana has vehemently opposed the project, approaching the Supreme Court to block its construction. The court last adjourned the hearing to January 12. In this context, Sunday’s meeting included Irriga-tion Special Secretary Sai Prasad, Advisor Venkateswararao, ENC Narsimhamurthy, law-yers, and Inter-State Ir-rigation senior officials. The Polavaram-Nalla-mala Sagar Link under-scores Andhra Pradesh’s push for inter-basin water transfer amid ongoing disputes. With the Supreme Court set to deliberate, the state is gearing up for a strong defense, balanc-ing development needs with legal and federal protocols.

Vijayawada Brims with Sankranti Cockfight Fever Amid Festive Preparations

Vijayawada: The three-day Sankranti festival has ignited a unique wave of excitement across Vijayawada and its surrounding areas, blending tradition with vibrant celebrations. Even before the official festivities begin, the city outskirts are buzzing with preparations for massive cockfights, drawing crowds that rival those in the Godavari districts. Thousands of spec-tators are expected at these events, set up on a grand scale near major highways in orchards and open layouts.

While women and children revel in home-based festivities, men up-hold age-old customs by flocking to cockfight and bullfight arenas. Despite their illegality under the law, these generational traditions persist, turn-ing Sankranti into a high-stakes spectacle. Organi-zers are readying arenas for cockfights and potta



(bull) fights, complete with robust birds and bulls trained for the bouts. Massive venues accommodating 4,000 to 5,000 people at once are under construction, fea-turing elevated platforms and gallery-style seating arranged like sports sta-diums. Entry is strictly token-based only those with organizer-issued to-kens gain access, ensur-ing controlled crowds. Spectators will enjoy free chilled drinks and full meals, enhancing the fes-tive experience. The events go beyond fights, offering family-friendly attractions.

Exhibition matches

highlight top contenders, while women compete in rangoli (muggulu) con-tests. Children can thrill on giant wheels and play areas. Food courts serving traditional pindi vantu (steamed rice cakes) and other Sankranti deli-cacies add to the allure. Venues sparkle with colorful decorations, transforming empty fields into festive hubs that pulse with energy.

Local residents and or-ganizers emphasize safe-ty and community spirit, with ample seating, shaded areas, and sanitation facilities. “This is our way of celebrating herit-age,” said one organizer,

arranging chairs in neat rows. Roads leading to these sites are seeing ear-ly traffic as enthusiasts arrive with their prized cocks. Though animal welfare groups have raised concerns over the years, the events contin-ue drawing huge turn-outs, underscoring Sank-ranti’s deep cultural roots in the region.

Police presence is ex-pected to maintain order, focusing on traffic and public safety rather than enforcement against the fights. As Vijayawada gears up, the air fills with anticipation, promising an unforgettable Pongal season.

Drunk YouTuber Hits Three in Vijayawada Exhibition Grounds Chaos; Child in Critical Condition

Vijayawada: A horrify-ing incident unfolded at the Bobburi Grounds ex-hibition area in Bhava-nipuram, Vijayawada, late Sunday evening when an inebriated You-Tuber from Rajarajesh-wari Pet rammed his car into three pedestrians, leaving one child in crit-ical condition. The ac-cident, which occurred amid the bustling grounds often used for public events, has sparked outrage over reckless driving and hit-and-run tendencies in the city.

Eyewitnesses de-scribed a scene of sheer panic around 9:30 PM as the driver, identified pre-liminarily as a local con-tent creator known for YouTube videos, sped through the crowded premises in a state of in-toxication. The vehicle struck three victims a young boy, a woman, and another adult causing severe injuries. Bystand-

ers rushed to aid the vic-tims, who were promptly shifted to a nearby gov-ernment hospital via a 108 ambulance service.

Medical sources con-firmed the child’s con-dition as critical, with head injuries and inter-nal bleeding requiring immediate intensive care. The other two vic-tims are stable but under observation for fractures and lacerations. Instead of stopping to assist, the driver fled the scene at high speed, abandoning the wreckage and spark-ing a frantic police pursuit.

Vijayawada Police Commissionerate teams arrived swiftly, securing the site and launching a manhunt. CCTV footage from the exhibition grounds and surround-ing areas is being re-viewed, with vehicle reg-istration details aiding the search. “We have formed special teams to apprehend the accused. Preliminary inquiries point to alcohol con-



sumption as the primary factor.

Strict action will fol-low under relevant IPC sections for rash driv-ing, drunk driving, and hit-and-run,” stated a senior police official at the scene. Local resi-dents expressed fury over the growing men-ace of drunk driving in Vijayawada’s busy out-skirts. Bhavanipuram, home to exhibition grounds that host fre-quent fairs and gather-ings, has seen multiple such incidents, prompt-ing calls for enhanced night patrols and sobri-ety checkpoints.

Activists from road

safety groups urged the Andhra Pradesh govern-ment to enforce stricter penalties under the Mo-tor Vehicles Act, includ-ing lifetime license sus-pensions for repeat offenders. The incident underscores persistent challenges in urban traf-fic management, espe-cially during evening hours when crowds swell at public venues.

As investigations con-tinue, authorities have appealed to the public for any leads on the ab-sconding driver. Updates on the victims’ con-ditions are awaited, with the boy’s family urging swift justice.

From its opening frames, the film declares its intent with striking clarity, anchoring itself in the anti-Hindi imposition agitations of the 1950s and 1960s. These protests were not marginal episodes in Tamil Nadu's past but seismic movements that reshaped the state's political landscape, ultimately catapulting the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) into power and redefining the relationship between language, identity, and governance in the region.

Subtlety is neither the ambition nor the strength of Parasakthi. It is an openly ideological work that seeks to provoke fear, pride, anger, and resistance—emotions deeply woven into Tamil collective memory whenever questions of language and cultural survival arise. The anxiety surrounding Hindi imposition, and the perceived threat it poses to Tamil and other regional languages, is not confined to history textbooks. It continues to act as a powerful undercurrent in contemporary politics, particularly in opposition to the Bharatiya Janata Party's larger Hindutva project. The film understands this emotional and political continuity and exploits it with calculated precision.

Though its narrative unfolds during the Nehru-Indira Gandhi era, complete with references to the uncompromising and often violent resistance to central language policies, Parasakthi is unmistakably a film of the present. It functions almost pedagogically, explaining the historical roots of the DMK's staunch opposi-



tion to the three-language formula and portraying the party as the principal, if not sole, defender of Tamil identity against what it frames as north Indian cultural dominance. The past is not merely recreated; it is selectively curated to serve a contemporary ideological purpose.

The film foregrounds Dravidian stalwarts such as C N Annadurai and M Karunanidhi, presenting them as towering champions of the Tamil cause. Yet its protagonist, Sezhan—played by Sivakarthikeyan—is not a direct biographical stand-in for any one leader. Instead, he is a symbolic construct, embodying the spirit of the student and youth movements that formed the emotional and organisational

backbone of the anti-Hindi agitations. Through Sezhan, the film collapses individual histories into a singular, heroic narrative of resistance.

Even the choice of the name "Sezhan" is politically loaded. Rooted in Tamil and meaning "prosperity," it reflects the Dravidian movement's long-standing rejection of caste- and religion-marked names derived from Hindu mythology. This tradition, exemplified by figures such as the late Era Sezhan—who abandoned his birth name R. Sreenivasan in favour of a secular Tamil identity—underscores how even personal naming becomes an act of ideological assertion. In this political culture, names are not neutral; they are dec-

larations of resistance.

The title Parasakthi itself is a deliberate provocation. It immediately evokes the iconic 1952 film scripted by Karunanidhi, widely regarded as a cinematic manifesto of Dravidian rationalism and social revolution. The borrowing of this title is no coincidence. It is designed to trigger memory, loyalty, and ideological nostalgia, functioning as political branding of the highest order. The film does not merely tell a story; it invokes a legacy.

That the film is produced by Red Giant Movies further sharpens its political edge. The company's CEO, Inbanidhi, is the son of Deputy Chief Minister Udhayanidhi Stalin, whose name is conspicuously

highlighted in the opening credits. To argue that Parasakthi is apolitical would be disingenuous. It is cinema as political communication—crafted, timed, and positioned with remarkable strategic awareness.

One of the film's most crucial interventions is its reiteration of a central DMK argument often misrepresented by opponents: the resistance is not against Hindi as a language, but against its imposition. A striking scene depicts the protagonist protesting in Delhi while holding Tamil placards that read "Hindi Vazhga" (Long Live Hindi). The message is unambiguous—this is a struggle for federalism, dignity, and choice, not linguistic hostility. The film repeatedly stresses

that unity does not require uniformity, a line that resonates strongly in India's current political climate.

This theme is reinforced through dialogues in which the protagonist confronts a central government minister—clearly a reference to Indira Gandhi during her tenure as Information and Broadcasting Minister after Nehru's death. He asserts his commitment to national unity while accusing the Centre of confusing unity with enforced sameness. In this framing, the conflict is not between patriotism and separatism, but between competing visions of the nation.

Intriguingly, the film's antagonist is a fiercely patriotic police officer determined to crush the

Tamil agitation through brute force. The narrative thus stages a confrontation between two forms of nationalism: one rigid, centralised, and coercive; the other rooted in regional dignity and democratic resistance. In this inversion, the defender of Tamil identity emerges as the truer patriot.

By extending solidarity to Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam, Marathi, and Bengali voices, Parasakthi broadens its canvas beyond Tamil Nadu. It reframes Hindi imposition as a pan-Indian issue of regional identity versus cultural centralisation, lending the film resonance far beyond state borders. The struggle is no longer portrayed as parochial but as a national debate

about the nature of India's federal structure.

None of this ideological weight would matter if the film failed as cinema. It does not. Parasakthi is gripping, emotionally charged, and accessible across generations. Its narrative momentum ensures that ideology never feels like a dry lecture but rather an immersive experience. The dramatization is heightened, sometimes exaggerated, but always effective.

Commercially, the film appears poised for an unchallenged box-office run. Politically, it feeds directly into the DMK-versus-BJP language narrative at a strategically crucial moment. Cinema alone may not swing elections, but as a tool of political mobilisation, it is undeniably potent. The film may even compel non-DMK supporters to reconsider fundamental questions of language, identity, and federalism in contemporary India.

Ultimately, Parasakthi strengthens the political standing of Udhayanidhi Stalin and his family, positioning them not merely as administrators but as custodians of the Dravidian ideological legacy. In Tamil Nadu, where politics has long found its loudest voice on the silver screen, this is cinema with intent, impact, and impeccable timing.

Directed by Sudha Kongara—already acclaimed for her cinematic craft—Parasakthi stands as both a powerful film and a calculated political statement. It is an exaggerated, fiercely dramatized version of history. But as the film itself seems to argue, in the charged atmosphere of an election season, facts often matter less than the narratives built upon them.

Rashtriya Khanij Chintan Shivir–2026: Telangana's Vision for a Future-Ready Mining Sector

PM Modi Slams ‘Colonial Mindset’, Says India’s Glorious Past Was Erased After Independence

Somnath, Gujarat — Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday strongly criticised what he described as a “colonial mindset” in post-Independence historical narratives, accusing certain historians and politicians of attempting to erase or distort India’s civilisational past. Addressing a massive gathering after the culmination of the Shaurya Yatra at Somnath, the Prime Minister said India’s history had been deliberately misrepresented in textbooks, particularly regarding religious invasions.

PM Modi alleged that the brutal invasions and destruction of sacred sites were downplayed or mislabelled as mere acts of looting. “Those who fought for the Somnath Temple were not given their due recognition and importance. Some historians and politicians even tried to whitewash the history of invaders. Religious invasion was labelled as loot. We were taught that Somnath was demolished only to loot treasures, while the cruel history of hate, atrocities, and terror was hidden from us,” he said.

Referring to the reconstruction of the Somnath Temple after Independence, the Prime Minister recalled how Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel’s resolve to rebuild the shrine faced opposition. “After Independence, when Sardar Patel pledged to renovate the Somnath Temple, he was stopped from doing so. Objections were raised even to President Rajendra Prasad’s visit to Somnath in 1951,” PM Modi said. He warned that the



same forces were still active today, though their methods had changed. “Those who opposed the redevelopment then are present even now. Swords have been replaced with hidden conspiracies against India,” he cautioned.

Calling for unity and vigilance, the Prime Minister urged people to remain alert to such forces. “We need to strengthen ourselves and stay united. We must defeat every power that tries to divide us. The journey of the last 1,000 years should inspire us to prepare for the next 1,000 years,” he added.

PM Modi also highlighted the significance of India’s ancient sacred sites, describing them as symbols of resilience and civilisational strength. “India has thousands of sacred sites like Somnath that are

thousands of years old. Unfortunately, after Independence, people with a slave mentality tried to distance themselves from this heritage. Despicable attempts were made to forget this history,” he said.

The Prime Minister participated in the Shaurya Yatra as part of the four-day Somnath Swabhiman Parv, commemorating 1,000 years of unbroken faith since Mahmud of Ghazni’s first attack on the Somnath Temple in 1026. The symbolic procession, marked by the participation of 108 horses from the Gujarat Police Mounted Unit, represented courage, sacrifice, and the indomitable spirit that preserved Somnath through centuries of destruction and revival.

Despite repeated attacks and demolitions over centuries, Somnath remained alive in the

collective consciousness of the people. Its repeated reconstruction stands as a unique example in world history, symbolising faith, identity, and civilisational pride.

The present Somnath Temple was rebuilt following Sardar Patel’s resolve expressed on Kartak Sud 1, Diwali day, November 12, 1947. The reconstruction, funded by public participation, culminated in the consecration ceremony on May 11, 1951, attended by then-President Rajendra Prasad. In 2026, India will mark 75 years of this historic moment, reaffirming its civilisational self-respect. Revered as the first among the 12 Aadi Jyotirlingas of Lord Shiva, the Somnath Temple stands majestically along the Arabian Sea as a lasting symbol of faith and national resolve.

Suvendu Adhikari Sits on Dharna Inside Chandrakona Police Station, Demands FIR Over Alleged Attack

West Bengal Leader of Opposition Suvendu Adhikari on Saturday night staged a protest inside the Chandrakona police station, demanding the immediate registration of an FIR after alleging that his convoy was attacked by workers of the ruling Trinamool Congress (TMC) in Paschim Medinipur district.

Adhikari accused the TMC of orchestrating the attack as part of an attempt to intimidate and eliminate the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) from the state ahead of upcoming elections. Speaking to TPN from inside the police station, the BJP leader said he would not leave until action was taken against those responsible.

“We are here for justice. The elections are not far, and they know they are about to lose. That is why they want to demolish the BJP,” Adhikari said. He alleged that senior leaders from the TMC’s youth wing and labour union were involved in the incident and claimed that he had provided the police with the names of those responsible. “I am urging that an FIR be registered



immediately and that these people be arrested,” he added.

Earlier, Adhikari had taken to social media platform X to describe the alleged attack. He claimed that the incident took place around 8:20 pm on Chandrakona Road while he was returning from Purulia. According to him, his convoy was “viciously attacked” by TMC workers in the presence of police personnel.

“These cowards, emboldened by the Mamata Banerjee regime’s culture of violence

and impunity, attacked me right in the presence of the Mamata Police,” Adhikari wrote. He further alleged that the police remained silent spectators during the incident. “This is not just an attack on me; it is an assault on every voice of opposition in West Bengal,” he said.

Accusing the ruling party of political desperation, Adhikari claimed that the TMC was resorting to violence because it could not counter growing public an-

ger. He reiterated that he was sitting on a dharna inside the police station demanding immediate action and arrests. “I will not budge until accountability is enforced. The people of Bengal deserve better than this lawless dictatorship,” he stated.

Reacting to the incident earlier in the day, West Bengal BJP president Samik Bhattacharya alleged a complete collapse of law and order in the state. Speaking to ANI, Bhattacharya said the situation amounted to a “total breakdown of constitutional machinery” and called for immediate intervention by constitutional authorities.

“What is happening in West Bengal is not merely the absence of law and order. It amounts to a total breakdown of constitutional machinery. The custodians of the Constitution must intervene immediately,” he said.

As of late Saturday night, there was no official response from the state police or the Trinamool Congress regarding the allegations.

Alleged Audio of Masood Azhar Surfaces, Claims Thousands of Suicide Bombers Ready to Strike

An audio recording allegedly featuring Masood Azhar, the chief of the banned terror outfit Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM), has surfaced, in which he claims that a large number of suicide attackers are ready to strike at any moment. Masood Azhar is a UN-designated terrorist who has long been accused of orchestrating attacks against India while operating from Pakistan.

In the purported audio, Azhar is heard boasting about the strength and preparedness of his cadre, claiming that thousands of suicide bombers are awaiting his approval to infiltrate India. He suggests that the actual number of fighters at his disposal is far greater than what is publicly known and that revealing the full figure would shock the international community.

In the recording, Azhar says in Urdu, “These suicide bombers are not one, not two, not 100, not even 1,000. If I reveal the complete number, there will be an uproar in the world’s media.” He further



claims that these individuals are highly motivated and eager to carry out attacks, describing their intent as achieving what he calls martyrdom for their cause.

However, the date, location, and authenticity of the audio clip could not be independently verified. There has been no official confirmation from security agencies so far regarding when the recording was made or whether it genuinely features Azhar.

Masood Azhar has a long

history of issuing inflammatory statements against India. He is accused of being the mastermind behind several high-profile terror attacks, including the 2001 attack on the Indian Parliament and the 2008 Mumbai terror attacks. JeM has been responsible for multiple suicide bombings and militant strikes in Jammu and Kashmir and other parts of the country over the years.

The emergence of this audio comes months after Indi-

an armed forces carried out targeted strikes on Jaish-e-Mohammed infrastructure inside Pakistan. Among the locations hit was the group’s headquarters in Bahawalpur. Those strikes were part of India’s response to the April 22 terror attack in Pahalgam, in which 26 people lost their lives. Reports indicated that several of Azhar’s close relatives were killed in the strikes.

Separately, Delhi Police sources have linked Umar Mohammad, a suspect in a recent blast in the national capital that killed at least 15 people and injured around 20 others, to the Pakistan-based terror group.

Masood Azhar has not made a public appearance since 2019. That year, his hideout in Bahawalpur was reportedly targeted in a powerful blast by unknown assailants, which he survived. Since then, he has largely remained out of public view, though intelligence agencies continue to monitor his activities closely.

Trust India, Not Speculation: Piyush Goyal Responds to Claims on India–US Trade Talks



Union Minister Piyush Goyal on Sunday urged citizens to place their trust in India rather than “foreign statements,” responding to speculation around the status of the India–US trade agreement. His remarks came a day after the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) firmly rejected claims that the proposed trade deal failed to materialise because Prime Minister Narendra Modi did not make a phone call to former US President Donald Trump.

Speaking at the NDTV Power Play conclave, Goyal addressed comments made by United States Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick, who had suggested that negotiations with India did not progress while Washington moved ahead with trade agreements with other countries. Lutnick had compared trade negotiations to a staircase, claiming that countries that acted first secured better terms. “The first stair gets the best deal,” Lutnick had said, implying that late movers faced less favourable outcomes.

Responding to this, Goyal said trade negotiations are complex and cannot be

judged through public remarks. “Trust your country, your motherland, not foreign statements,” he said, adding that the intricacies of trade agreements are discussed behind closed doors and not in the media. He emphasised that sensitive negotiations require patience and discretion.

The MEA also countered the narrative, calling the characterisation of the negotiations “not accurate.” Ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said India and the US have been engaged in sustained and detailed discussions on a bilateral trade pact for more than a year. He further clarified that Prime Minister Modi and President Trump had spoken over the phone on eight occasions during 2025, covering a wide range of issues related to the India–US partnership.

Speaking at the Mumbai conclave ahead of the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation elections scheduled for January 15, Goyal also addressed local political and civic issues. He dismissed opposition claims centred on the “Marathi Maanoos” narrative, asserting that Mumbai belongs to eve-

ryone. “Nobody is an outsider in Mumbai,” he said.

In a conversation with NDTV’s CEO and Editor-in-Chief Rahul Kanwal, Managing Editor Padmaja Joshi, and Associate Editor Puja Bhardwaj, Goyal spoke about ongoing infrastructure projects aimed at easing Mumbai’s chronic traffic problems. He said residents were prepared to endure short-term inconvenience for long-term benefits. “The people of Mumbai are willing to suffer short-term pain for long-term gain,” he said, describing the infrastructure push as part of the futuristic vision of Prime Minister Modi and Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis.

Goyal also made political remarks, claiming that Nationalist Congress Party chief Sharad Pawar and his daughter, Lok Sabha MP Supriya Sule, regret aligning with the opposition against the BJP. He alleged they are now attempting a political course correction by aligning with Ajit Pawar ahead of the Pimpri Chinchwad municipal corporation elections.

Fadnavis Says Shinde Is Easy to Work With, Calls Uddhav Thackeray Unpredictable



Maharashtra Chief Minister and senior BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis has drawn a sharp contrast between his experiences of working with Shiv Sena leaders Uddhav Thackeray and Eknath Shinde, describing the former as difficult to handle and the latter as relatively easy to work with.

Speaking at NDTV’s Power Play programme on the upcoming elections to the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC), Fadnavis shared insights from his political journey alongside both leaders. The interaction was moderated by NDTV CEO and Editor-in-Chief Rahul Kanwal, Managing Editor Padmaja Joshi, and Executive Editor Jiten-dra Dixit.

Fadnavis, who has been part of alliances with both Thackeray and Shinde at different stages, was asked how his working relationships with the two leaders differed. He responded candidly, saying that Eknath Shinde’s emotional nature makes him easier to understand

and manage. “Shinde ji is an emotional person, and I am emotional too, though perhaps more practical. If you understand his emotional side, working with him becomes easy,” Fadnavis said.

In contrast, he described former Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray as unpredictable. “Uddhav ji is unpredictable. To understand him, I would probably need to appoint a researcher. That is why handling him is difficult,” he remarked, underlining the challenges he faced while working with the Shiv Sena leader.

Fadnavis’ political association with both leaders spans several years. His first term as Chief Minister was in alliance with the undivided Shiv Sena led by Uddhav Thackeray. However, following the 2019 Maharashtra Assembly elections, Thackeray exited the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and formed a government with the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) and the Congress. In 2022, a rebellion led by Eknath Shinde

split the Shiv Sena, resulting in the collapse of the Thackeray-led government. Shinde then aligned with the NDA and assumed office as Chief Minister. After the NDA returned to power in the state elections last year, Fadnavis took over as Chief Minister, with Shinde serving as his deputy.

Addressing speculation about possible tensions within the NDA, Fadnavis dismissed such claims, asserting that the alliance remains stable. “We are in a strong alliance and will continue together for the next five years as well,” he said.

He also brushed aside interpretations of Shinde’s frequent visits to Delhi as signs of discord. Fadnavis clarified that Shinde often travels to the national capital to meet his grandson and party leaders. “He is meeting BJP leaders in Delhi. I would be concerned only if he were meeting leaders from another party,” he added, reaffirming confidence in the unity of the NDA government.

Iranian Hospitals Overwhelmed Amid Deadly Nationwide Protests



Hospitals across Iran are struggling to cope with a surge of casualties as anti-government protests continue to spread nationwide, medical workers have reported. Emergency wards in multiple cities, including Tehran, are overwhelmed, with some hospitals describing “bodies piled on top of one another” following a violent crackdown by security forces.

At Poursina Hospital in Rasht, northern Iran, 70 bodies arrived on Friday night alone. A hospital source said the morgue quickly reached full capacity, forcing staff to temporarily store bodies in the hospital’s prayer room. “The bodies were placed on top of one another,” she said, underscoring the severity of the situation.

In Tehran, medics reported that many of the injured were young protesters arriving with fatal gunshot wounds. One emergency worker told the BBC that approximately 38 people died immediately upon reaching hospital beds, often before CPR could be administered. “There were direct shots to the heads of young people, to their hearts as well. Many didn’t even make it to the hospital,” she said. Most victims were reportedly aged between 20 and 25.

In other cities, injuries were similarly severe. A physician in Kashan noted that some protesters were shot in the eyes, while a Tehran doctor recounted seeing a patient with a bullet passing through the head.

US Conducts Retaliatory Strikes Against ISIS in Syria Following Deadly Attack on American Personnel



The United States launched another series of retaliatory airstrikes against the Islamic State (ISIS) in Syria on Saturday, responding to last month’s deadly ambush that killed two US soldiers and an American civilian interpreter. The large-scale strikes, conducted alongside partner forces, targeted multiple ISIS positions across Syria around 12:30 p.m. ET, according to US Central Command.

The operation, dubbed Operation Hawkeye Strike by the Trump administration, is part of Washington’s broader response to the December attack in Palmyra that claimed the lives of Sgt. Edgar Brian Torres-Tovar and Sgt. William Nathaniel Howard, both members of the Iowa National Guard, as well as civilian interpreter Ayad Mansoor Sakat.

“Our message remains strong: if you harm our warfighters, we will find you and kill you anywhere in the world, no matter how hard you try to evade justice,” US Central Command said in a statement on Saturday, underscoring the administration’s commitment to retaliating against threats to American personnel.

The strikes follow a similar operation launched on December 19, which targeted 70 locations in central Syria, hitting ISIS infrastructure and weapons depots. While the US military did not disclose the identities of the partner forces involved in Saturday’s op-

erations, the attacks reflect ongoing coordination with local allies.

For years, the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) have served as Washington’s primary partner in the fight against ISIS within Syria. However, since the ouster of former Syrian President Bashar Assad in December 2024, the US has increasingly coordinated with the central government in Damascus, which recently joined the global coalition against ISIS.

Adding to pressure on ISIS, Syrian security forces announced on Friday that they had arrested the military leader responsible for IS operations in the Levant. Analysts say this development, combined with US-led strikes, could weaken the group’s operational capabilities in the region.

Operation Hawkeye Strike is the latest demonstration of the US commitment to pursuing ISIS militants following attacks on American forces abroad. The coordinated response signals that the US intends to hold ISIS accountable for attacks on its personnel and maintain pressure on the terror group in Syria.

As the US continues its counter-ISIS operations, the strikes also reflect a broader shift in strategy, combining support for local partners such as the SDF with coordination with the Syrian central government to target terrorist networks effectively across the region.

Trump Revives Pledge to Cap Credit Card Interest Rates at 10%, Drawing Industry Opposition

Former President Donald Trump has renewed his campaign promise to cap credit card interest rates at 10% for one year, a move that could save Americans tens of billions of dollars but has drawn immediate opposition from the banking and credit card industries.

Trump announced the plan in a social media post on Friday night, though he did not specify whether the cap would be implemented through executive action or legislation. A Republican senator, Sen. Roger Marshall (R-Kan.), said he spoke with Trump and intends to work on a bill “with his full support,” aiming for it to take effect on January 20, marking one year since Trump took office.

In his post, Trump wrote, “We will no longer let the American public be ripped off by credit card companies that are charging interest rates of 20 to 30%.” Analysts estimate that a 10% cap could save Americans roughly \$100 billion annually, while still leaving credit card companies profitable, though some rewards and perks might be reduced.

Currently, around 195 million Americans hold credit cards, accruing \$160 billion in interest charges in 2024, according to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB). Average interest rates on credit cards range between 19.65% and 21.5%, down slightly from recent highs



but still significantly higher than the roughly 12% average a decade ago.

Banks argue that such a cap would harm low-income and high-risk borrowers, potentially forcing them toward high-cost alternatives like payday loans or pawnshops. The American Bankers Association and allied groups issued a joint statement opposing Trump’s proposal, warning that it could drive consumers toward “less regulated, more costly alternatives.”

Researchers, however, contend that a 10% cap could be implemented without widespread account closures. Brian Shearer, director of competition and regulatory policy at the Vanderbilt Policy Accelerator, noted that the dominant credit card issuers earn massive profits across income levels and could absorb the change while remaining profitable.

Historically, interest rate caps have existed in some sectors. The Military

Lending Act limits rates for active-duty service members to 36%, and some credit unions cap their credit card rates at 18%. Critics cite states like Arkansas, where strict caps have limited credit access for lower-credit borrowers, highlighting the potential trade-offs of nationwide limits.

Trump’s proposal has received support from a bipartisan group of lawmakers. Senators Bernie Sanders (D-Vt.) and Josh Hawley (R-Mo.) previously

introduced a plan to cap rates at 10% for five years. Representatives Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (D-N.Y.) and Anna Paulina Luna (R-Fla.) have also proposed similar legislation.

While the credit card industry has been a consistent supporter of Trump’s administration and campaign, the new proposal underscores growing public scrutiny over high interest rates amid rising consumer debt, which now totals approximately \$1.23 trillion.

Protests in Iran Enter Third Week Amid Rising Violence and US Warnings

Nationwide protests challenging Iran’s theocracy continued into Sunday, with demonstrators flooding the streets of Tehran and Mashhad, the country’s capital and second-largest city. Activists report that the ongoing unrest has resulted in at least 116 deaths, with more than 2,600 arrests, though Iran’s internet blackout and cut phone lines have made independent verification difficult.

The demonstrations, which began on December 28 over the collapse of the Iranian rial, have grown into broader anti-regime protests, challenging the foundations of the Islamic Republic amid economic hardship and international sanctions targeting Iran’s nuclear program. The rial has plummeted to over 1.4 million to the US dollar, fueling widespread frustration.

Iranian officials re-

sponded with threats. Parliament speaker Mohammad Bagher Qalibaf warned that the US military and Israel would be “legitimate targets” if Washington carried out strikes against Iran, citing President Donald Trump’s statements offering potential military action. Qalibaf, a hardline figure, praised the police, the Revolutionary Guard, and the volunteer Basij forces for “standing firm” during the unrest and promised harsh punishment for those arrested or involved in the protests.

Meanwhile, Trump publicly supported the protesters, tweeting that “Iran is looking at FREEDOM, perhaps like never before. The USA stands ready to help!!!” US officials told media outlets that Trump has been presented with military options to protect American interests but has not made a final decision.

The State Department emphasized that Trump’s warnings should be taken seriously.

Videos circulating online, likely transmitted via satellite connections such as Starlink, showed demonstrators gathering in northern Tehran, holding lit mobile phones and marching peacefully. In Mashhad, protesters reportedly confronted security forces, with streets blocked by flaming debris and overturned dumpsters near the holy Imam Reza shrine, giving the protests added symbolic weight. Protests were also reported in Kerman and other cities.

Iranian state media attempted to downplay the unrest, broadcasting pro-government demonstrations in cities such as Qom and Qazvin, and highlighting areas of calm elsewhere, while excluding Tehran and Mashhad.

Exiled Crown Prince



Reza Pahlavi, who has called for protests and encouraged demonstrators to display Iran’s old lion-and-sun flag, has voiced support from abroad, though it remains unclear whether protesters are rallying for him personally or for a return to pre-1979 conditions.

The escalating unrest comes amid fears of a severe crackdown. Iran’s attorney general, Mohammad Movahedi Azad,

warned that anyone participating in the protests could be deemed an “enemy of God,” a charge carrying the death penalty, and threatened punishment for those assisting rioters. The combination of an information blackout, economic crisis, and violent repression has created a tense environment, leaving both citizens and foreign observers anxious about the future trajectory of the unrest.

Reza Pahlavi Urges Iranian Protesters to Stay on Streets Amid US Support, Khamenei Defiant



Reza Pahlavi, the US-based son of Iran’s former Shah, has urged protesters across Iran to remain on the streets, promising that he will soon join them. Addressing demonstrators as “my compatriots,” Pahlavi praised their resilience over three consecutive nights, saying their actions have “severely weakened Khamenei’s repressive apparatus and

his regime.”

Pahlavi claimed he received reliable reports indicating a shortage of security personnel willing to confront the massive crowds. “Many armed and security forces have left their workplaces or disobeyed orders to suppress the people,” he said, adding that only a minority of violent mercenaries, whom he described as

non-Iranian and anti-Iranian, remain loyal to the regime. He warned that these forces would face consequences for their actions.

He also advised protesters to avoid venturing alone or taking side streets that could endanger their lives. “Know that you are not alone. Your compatriots around the world are proudly shouting your voice, and the world admires your courage. President Trump, as leader of the free world, is closely observing your bravery and has declared he is ready to help,” Pahlavi said on X (formerly Twitter).

Protests Intensify Amid Crackdown

Despite a severe crackdown, including a nationwide Internet blackout, protests against Iran’s Khamenei-led regime have intensified over the

past several days. Human rights groups report dozens of deaths, while Net-Blocks, a global Internet monitoring organization, said the country has had virtually no connectivity since Thursday.

The demonstrations, initially sparked about two weeks ago by economic hardship worsened by international sanctions and last year’s conflict with Israel, have evolved into a broader nationwide movement demanding the removal of the Supreme Leader.

US Signals Support

US President Donald Trump expressed support for the protesters, posting on Truth Social that “Iran is looking at FREEDOM, perhaps like never before. The USA stands ready to help!!!” Reports indicate Trump has been briefed on potential military options,

though officials stressed that no final decision has been made.

Khamenei Responds

In response, Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Hosseini Khamenei dismissed Trump’s statements, criticizing the US and portraying protesters as being misled. “The US President has said that if the Iranian government does such-and-such, I’ll take the side of the rioters. The rioters have put their hopes in him. If he’s so capable, he should manage his own country,” Khamenei said on X.

He reaffirmed the regime’s defiance, asserting that “the Islamic Republic of Iran, established with the sacrifice of several hundred thousand honorable people, won’t back down in the face of those causing destruction.”

Aditya Birla Sun Life Mutual Fund Reopens Subscriptions to Three International Equity Schemes

Aditya Birla Sun Life Mutual Fund has resumed accepting fresh investments in its three international equity schemes after a suspension of over three months. The fund house issued a notice-cum-addendum on January 9, 2026, reversing the suspension that had been in place since October 7, 2025.

The reopening applies to the following schemes: Aditya Birla Sun Life International Equity Fund, Aditya Birla Sun Life Global Emerging Opportunities Fund, and Aditya Birla Sun Life Global Excellence Equity Fund of Fund. Investors can now make fresh purchases, switch-in investments, and systematic contributions such as SIPs (Systematic Investment Plans) and STPs (Systematic Transfer Plans) under these schemes, subject to certain limits.

As per the circular, the AMC will accept investments up to Rs 1 crore per PAN per day across all subscription transactions. The limit applies to fresh investments, additional purchases, and systematic transactions wherever available. The resumption of inflows will be effective from Monday, January 12, 2026. However, the fund house has clarified that it retains the right to revise the maximum subscription limit at any time in the future.

While subscriptions have reopened, all other features, terms, and conditions outlined in the Scheme Information Document



(SID) and Key Information Memorandum (KIM) remain unchanged. The notice-cum-addendum issued will form an integral part of the existing scheme documents.

The three international equity schemes focus on providing investors exposure to global markets. The International Equity Fund primarily invests in large-cap and mid-cap companies listed overseas, while the Global Emerging Opportunities Fund targets high-growth companies in emerging markets. The Global

Excellence Equity Fund of Fund invests in other international mutual funds to achieve diversified global exposure.

The suspension of fresh inflows in October 2025 was implemented due to operational considerations. During the suspension period, the AMC had halted new SIP and STP registrations, although existing systematic investments registered before October 7, 2025, were allowed to continue uninterrupted. This move was aimed at managing the operational and liquid-

ity challenges arising from overseas investments in international markets.

With the reopening, investors can once again tap into international diversification through these schemes, which provide a vehicle to gain exposure to global equities and emerging market opportunities. The AMC's move to resume subscriptions is likely to attract investors looking to diversify their portfolios amid ongoing volatility in domestic markets and strong growth potential overseas.

Gold's Bullish Momentum Set to Continue in 2026 Despite Record Rally in 2025

After one of the most dramatic rallies in modern market history, few investors are expecting gold to replicate its astonishing performance in 2026. Yet, despite the improbability of a repeat surge, many top money managers remain bullish on the precious metal, arguing that the underlying forces that propelled bullion to historic highs last year remain intact.

Gold surged an extraordinary 65% in 2025, marking its strongest annual performance in nearly 50 years. Retail and institutional investors alike piled into bullion alongside central banks, fueling unprecedented momentum. A convergence of almost every tailwind imaginable—falling interest rates, geopolitical tension, and inflation fears—propelled gold to surpass even its inflation-adjusted high, a level that had held since 1980. In an environment where most asset classes struggled to gain traction, gold became the standout performer, drawing attention from seasoned market participants and casual investors alike.

Despite the dramatic run, many money managers who oversee trillions in assets say they are not rushing to take profits, maintaining conviction in the metal's long-term appeal. "We continue to expect gold to rally in 2026, as the drivers of its strong run remain intact," said Ian Samson, a portfolio manager at Fidelity International. Samson, who trimmed his position during a particularly frenzied stretch in October, has since added back, citing central bank purchases, declining interest rates, and high fiscal deficits as ongoing supportive factors for gold.

A key underpinning of gold's appeal lies in waning confidence in major developed-market currencies. Attacks on central bank independence, ballooning sovereign debt, and mounting political discord have undermined trust in fiat currencies, driving investors toward bullion. The past year was particularly illustrative: a congressional standoff in the United States, governmental paralysis in France, and scrutiny of Japan's record budget under its new leadership all contributed to the narrative that fiat currencies are increasingly vulnerable.

"Gold is basically an anti-fiat currency play now more than anything else," said Mike Wilson, chief investment officer and strategist at Morgan Stanley. The view gained traction in late 2025 as the so-called debasement trade—buying gold as a hedge against currency dilution—took hold. Prominent investors such as Ken Griffin and Ray Dalio highlighted gold's meteoric rise as a warning signal, reinforcing its status as a hedge



against systemic risks.

Wilson suggests that investors should allocate roughly 20% of their portfolios into real assets, including gold, as a hedge against inflation, replacing the traditional 60/40 split between stocks and bonds with a 60/20/20 structure. He emphasizes that the debasement thesis has gone mainstream, yet he believes the market has not fully priced in the implications of global fiscal indiscipline. "When everybody understands the story, you have to ask yourself: Well, is it priced now?" Wilson said. "I don't think it's fully priced, only because I don't see the change in behavior yet. I don't see fiscal discipline anywhere in the world. In fact, I see the opposite."

Darwei Kung, head of commodities and portfolio manager at DWS Group, echoed similar sentiments. His firm maintains a slightly larger-than-usual allocation to gold-related investments, expecting to sustain that stance through 2026. Kung forecasts modest price gains over the year, while also anticipating trading volatility driven by broader market forces. "Gold's performance will be influenced not just by the metal itself but also by currency movements, bond yields, and investor sentiment globally," he said.

Institutional demand, particularly from pension and insurance funds, continued to grow in 2025. Some funds that had previously avoided the asset took positions of around 5% of their strategic allocations. Massimiliano Castelli, head of global sovereign markets strategy at UBS Asset Management, explained that investors were drawn to gold's dual appeal: strong returns and protection against

downside risks elsewhere in their portfolios. "Of course, we don't see the same upside potential as last year, when gold was basically the best asset class of all," Castelli noted. "But we are still bullish on gold."

Historical precedent suggests a note of caution. Oversized rallies have often been followed by long periods of underperformance. After bullion hit \$1,921 an ounce in 2011, propelled by the aftermath of the global financial crisis, it took nine years to revisit that level. Similarly, gold's 127% surge in 1979 was followed by a prolonged bear market. These examples illustrate that even after monumental gains, periods of consolidation and moderate price appreciation are common.

Despite its record rally, gold remains lightly held in the United States. Exchange-traded funds backed by gold account for just 0.17% of private US financial portfolios, according to a December analysis by Goldman Sachs. This figure remains six basis points below the 2012 peak. Goldman analysts estimate that each 0.01% increase in gold's share of US portfolios could lift prices by roughly 1.4%, highlighting the metal's potential for further upside if investor allocation grows.

Central bank purchases remain a major driver of gold prices. Goldman Sachs expects monthly acquisitions of around 80 tons in 2026. Central bank demand accelerated in 2022 after the immobilization of Russia's foreign exchange reserves underscored the appeal of bullion, a liquid asset that cannot be frozen. Thomas Roderick, portfolio manager at hedge fund Trium Capital LLP, emphasized that gold is one of the few assets al-

lowing investors to build wealth outside US influence. Roderick has slightly trimmed his position since October but maintains significant exposure.

A central component of Roderick's bullish thesis is China's continued accumulation of gold. The country's strategy involves using vast trade surpluses to acquire assets insulated from US geopolitical pressure. "China won't say 'gold is too expensive, let's accumulate more Treasuries,'" he explained. "That just doesn't work for them from a geopolitical perspective."

Looking ahead, gold's trajectory in 2026 will likely be shaped by a combination of structural and short-term factors. Low real interest rates, rising fiscal deficits, continued central bank buying, and geopolitical uncertainties provide long-term support. At the same time, market volatility, investor sentiment shifts, and global economic developments could drive short-term fluctuations. Even if gold does not replicate its 65% gain, its role as a hedge against currency debasement, inflation, and geopolitical risk remains compelling for investors worldwide.

In conclusion, while 2026 may not see a repeat of last year's historic rally, gold is expected to remain a key component of diversified portfolios. From central bank purchases to institutional adoption, from concerns over fiat currencies to China's strategic accumulation, the forces supporting bullion remain robust. For investors seeking protection against uncertainty and long-term wealth preservation, gold continues to offer a unique combination of safety, liquidity, and potential upside in a volatile global environment.

Asia's Technology Stocks Surge on AI Optimism and Strong Fundamentals



Asia's technology stocks have started 2026 with strong momentum, as investors bet that the region's tech sector will continue to outperform its US peers. Analysts point to rising demand for artificial intelligence (AI)-related products, solid earnings potential, and attractive valuations as key drivers behind the bullish sentiment.

Strategists at Goldman Sachs are overweight on Asian tech, citing further gains driven by AI adoption and reasonable valuations. Citigroup noted that global long-term investors are accumulating positions in Asia's technology firms, highlighting the region's central role in the semiconductor supply chain and its earnings potential.

The MSCI Asia Pacific Information Technology Index has climbed about 6% this year, outperforming the Nasdaq 100's 2% gain, reflecting a rotation toward Asia amid growing doubts over the sustainability of US tech's AI-driven rally. Strong corporate results are bolstering confidence: Samsung Electronics reported preliminary operating profit more than triple last year's, while Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co. (TSMC) surpassed revenue expectations. Chinese AI firms also delivered impressive stock market debuts, further fueling optimism.

"This comes down to a shift in where investors see the best risk-reward," said Dilin Wu, research strategist at Pepperstone Group. "US tech is like a mature gold mine — already rich in value. Asian tech, on the other hand, is undervalued but fundamentally strong, rewarding those who recognize it."

Asian tech stocks trade at a forward

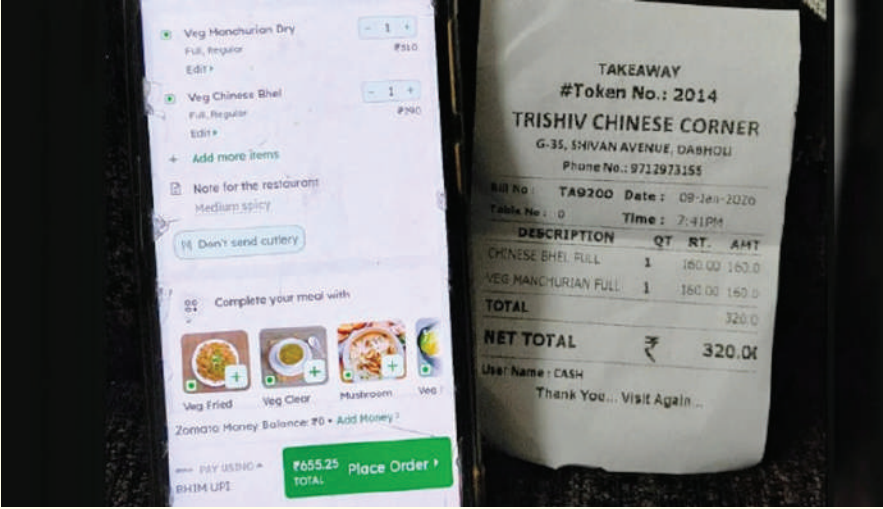
price-to-earnings ratio of 16.3 times, compared with roughly 25 times for the Nasdaq 100, even after outperforming the US index by 33 percentage points since the end of 2024. South Korea and Taiwan, Asia's two tech-heavy markets, are expected to see earnings-per-share growth of 79% and 36%, respectively, over the next year, compared with a forecast 28% for Nasdaq firms.

Key companies, including Samsung, TSMC, and SK Hynix, have gained between 8% and 16% this year, while Hong Kong-based Hua Hong Semiconductor surged more than 20%. Investors are also keeping an eye on upcoming TSMC full-year results, with several brokerages raising price targets amid expectations of improving profitability.

China remains a central focus, with enthusiasm driven by innovations such as DeepSeek's AI development paper, Kuaishou Technology's AI video editing model, and Beijing's self-sufficiency push. Earnings growth for China's tech megacaps is poised to surpass the US "Magnificent 7" for the first time since 2022. A growing pipeline of AI-related IPOs in Hong Kong and mainland China adds further upside potential.

"AI is a multi-year global growth driver, and North Asia's tech ecosystem — spanning hardware, software, and infrastructure — positions the region at the forefront of this trend," said Gary Tan, portfolio manager at Allspring Global Investments in Singapore. Analysts note, however, that geopolitical tensions, particularly in Taiwan, and any slowdown in global AI spending could pose risks to the sector.

Former YouTuber Flags Price Discrepancy on Zomato, Sparks Debate on Food Delivery Transparency



Former YouTuber Nalini Unagar has sparked an online debate after sharing her experience of what she described as excessive pricing on the food delivery platform Zomato. Taking to social media, Unagar highlighted a sharp difference between the actual cost of her food and the amount charged on the app, raising questions about transparency in third-party food delivery services.

According to Unagar, she ordered Veg Manchurian Dry and Chinese Bhel, items that should have cost ₹320 based on the restaurant's regular pricing. However, the bill generated on Zomato showed a total of ₹655. Even after applying available discounts, she said she was still required to pay ₹550. Expressing her frustration, Unagar termed the final amount "absolutely insane" and accused the platform of blatantly overcharging customers.

In her post, she directly tagged Zomato and demanded an explanation for the significant discrepancy.

"Customers are being overcharged openly," she wrote, urging the company to take responsibility and provide clarity on how such pricing differences occur.

Zomato responded to her post, stating that prices listed on the app are "solely determined by restaurant partners." The company clarified that it functions only as an intermediary between customers and restaurants and claimed it has no control over menu pricing. Zomato also said it would forward Unagar's feedback to the concerned restaurant.

However, the company's response did not end the discussion. Instead, it triggered further criticism from social media users who questioned Zomato's role in influencing prices. One user replied to Zomato's comment, arguing that if restaurants set the prices, the platform should be transparent about the commissions, advertising fees, and payment processing charges it collects from them.

The user pointed out that many restaurants increase menu prices on delivery apps not to make extra profit, but to offset the high fees charged by aggregators. "If Zomato calls itself just an intermediary, it still carries responsibility," the comment read, adding that the platform's business model directly affects pricing decisions.

Unagar's post has since resonated with many users, reigniting broader concerns about rising food delivery costs, inflated online menus, and a lack of clear pricing breakdowns. Several users shared similar experiences, questioning why food ordered online often costs significantly more than dine-in or direct takeaway prices.

The incident has once again brought attention to the growing demand for transparency in the food delivery ecosystem, as customers increasingly question who bears responsibility for higher prices—the restaurants, the platforms, or the system as a whole.

From Tragedy to Triumph: How Wang Xinyi Turned Disability into Opportunity for Others

Five years after a devastating car accident altered her life forever, a young Chinese woman has transformed personal tragedy into a mission of hope and empowerment, creating jobs for people with disabilities and inspiring thousands with her resilience. Wang Xinyi's remarkable journey has drawn widespread attention across China, with her story recently highlighted by the South China Morning Post.

Wang, now a well-known social media influencer, was just in her early twenties when a car crash in 2020 left her critically injured. The Porsche sports car, driven by a friend, crashed violently, resulting in Wang losing her left arm and left leg. Her injuries were severe—she suffered three cardiac arrests and underwent 14 surgeries to survive. As she fought for her life, she also faced emotional devastation. Her boyfriend left her during her recovery, and the friend who survived the crash stopped covering her medical expenses.

The physical and emotional recovery was long and painful. It took Wang nearly a year to fully accept her new reality. Rather than allowing despair to define her future, she chose to see the accident as a turning point. She renamed herself "Yuu," meaning "right right," symbolising a fresh beginning and a conscious decision to move forward with strength and positivity.

Determined to prove that her disability did not diminish her abilities, Wang began rebuilding her life. In 2022, she launched a yoga wear brand and confidently modelled the clothing herself, challenging conventional beauty and fitness standards. Her bold presence resonated with audiences and helped her regain confidence and independence.

In 2023, Wang took her mission further by opening a shoe-cleaning factory in Guangdong province, close to her hometown in the Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region. The factory employs 10 people, half of whom are specially abled. Wang assigns tasks based on each employee's strengths rather than their limitations. The factory now



cleans between 700 and 800 pairs of shoes each day and generates nearly 300,000 yuan in monthly revenue. Wang hopes to expand the business by opening a branch in her hometown so she can be closer to her parents, who stood by her throughout her recovery. Her efforts have received strong support from the Nanning Association of Professional Services for People with Disabilities.

Beyond entrepreneurship, Wang actively gives back to society. She volunteers as a public representative for the Federation of People with Disabilities and uses her growing influence—nearly 500,000 social media followers—to promote businesses run by disabled individuals and raise funds for medical causes. Recently, she helped raise 800,000 yuan for a 12-year-old girl battling leukemia, enabling the child to undergo a life-saving bone marrow transplant.

Today, Wang Xinyi's story stands as a powerful reminder that resilience, purpose, and compassion can turn even the deepest pain into a source of hope for others.

Bengaluru Resident Flags Worsening Traffic and Road Safety Concerns on Outer Ring Road

A long-time Bengaluru resident has raised serious concerns over deteriorating traffic conditions, poor road quality, and the lack of lane discipline on the city's busy Outer Ring Road (ORR), urging the government to take immediate and strict corrective measures. The resident, who has lived in the city all his life, said Bengaluru's infrastructure has seen a sharp decline in recent years, making daily commuting increasingly stressful and unsafe.

Expressing deep attachment to the city, he said he continues to love Bengaluru despite its growing challenges. However, he noted that issues such as worsening traffic congestion, declining air and water quality, and badly maintained roads have significantly affected the quality of life for residents. Among these, he stressed that road conditions and traffic management have become the most serious concerns.



The condition of the ORR itself, he noted, is equally alarming. Several stretches are uneven, damaged, or poorly maintained, posing serious risks—especially to those riding motorcycles. The resident explained that when riding his bike, he must remain constantly alert, not just to other vehicles but also to the road surface. Potholes, uneven patches, and loose gravel increase the risk of skidding, which could easily result in fatal accidents.

Calling for urgent action, the resident appealed to civic authorities and traffic officials to prioritise road repairs, enforce strict lane discipline, and improve overall traffic management on the ORR. He stressed that without immediate intervention, commuting on one of Bengaluru's most important arterial roads will continue to endanger lives and strain the city's already overburdened infrastructure.

Young Student in Inner Mongolia Wins Praise for Helping Classmates with Traditional Chinese Medicine



A young student in northern China has drawn widespread admiration for using his growing knowledge of traditional Chinese medicine (TCM) to help his classmates. Zhao Tianyu, a Grade Three pupil at Kai-lu No. 1 Middle School in Tongliao, Inner Mongolia, has become known among students as a "little TCM doctor" for offering voluntary health advice during school breaks, according to a report by the South China Morning Post.

Zhao's interest in traditional Chinese medicine began three years ago when he accompanied his grandfather for medical treatment. Fascinated by the diagnostic methods and healing processes he observed, Zhao developed a strong curiosity about TCM. He soon began studying the subject independently, reading old TCM books at home and watching online courses to deepen his understanding.

His unusual skills first

attracted attention when he checked the pulse of a classmate sitting next to him in class. After a brief examination, Zhao correctly identified that the student frequently stayed up late and was experiencing weakness in the spleen and stomach. Impressed by the accuracy of his observations, the classmate shared the experience with others, and word quickly spread.

Soon, students from Zhao's own class and neighbouring classes began approaching him during breaks for advice. According to his teacher, Liu, many of these students were simply curious to see whether the young boy's assessments were reliable. "They had heard that there was a 'little TCM doctor' in our class and wanted to see for themselves," Liu said.

The feedback from both teachers and students has been overwhelmingly positive. Liu noted that Zhao Tianyu's preliminary diagnoses are often surprisingly accurate, in

some cases comparable to assessments made by doctors at hospitals. However, Zhao remains cautious and responsible in his approach. He consistently reminds his classmates that his observations are only preliminary and advises them to seek professional medical attention if they feel unwell.

Liu praised Zhao's maturity, saying that he displays a level of caution and responsibility that is rare for someone his age. Rather than presenting himself as an expert, Zhao understands his limitations and emphasises the importance of proper medical care.

Zhao's dedication to traditional Chinese medicine has earned him the respect and trust of both classmates and teachers. His willingness to help others, combined with his passion for learning, has made him a standout student at his school and an inspiring example of how curiosity and kindness can positively impact a community.

Sixteen Years Late: Nokia Phones Ordered in 2010 Finally Delivered in War-Torn Libya

In a bizarre yet deeply symbolic episode reflecting Libya's prolonged instability, a mobile phone dealer in Tripoli has finally received a shipment of Nokia mobile phones that were originally ordered in 2010—more than a decade and a half ago. The extraordinary delay was the result of the civil war that erupted in 2011 and the subsequent collapse of the country's logistics, customs systems, and basic infrastructure.

According to local accounts, the shipment remained stranded in storage facilities for nearly 16 years as armed conflict, political fragmentation, and widespread insecurity disrupted trade and transportation networks across the country. The forgotten consignment consisted entirely of button-based Nokia phones—models that once dominated the global market but have since been rendered technologically obsolete.

When the long-delayed package finally arrived



transactions into extraordinary stories. Some social media users also saw unexpected value in the long-forgotten devices. With a growing global interest in vintage technology, several suggested that the phones could fetch higher prices among collectors. "Looking at the current geopolitical situation, these phones are valuable—there's no tracking," one user wrote. at the dealer's shop, the moment was met with disbelief and laughter. A video capturing the unboxing quickly circulated on social media, showing the shopkeeper laughing uncontrollably as he examined the devices. "Are these phones or historical artifacts?" he joked, highlighting the absurdity of receiving technology that belonged to a bygone era.

The shipment reportedly included premium models of the time, such

as music-edition phones and Nokia Communicators, which were once considered status symbols and cutting-edge devices. Today, however, they serve as reminders of how dramatically the mobile phone industry—and Libya itself—has changed over the past decade and a half.

Adding another layer of irony to the story, both the sender and the recipient of the shipment were based in Tripoli, just a few kilometres apart.

Despite the short distance, the package took 16 years to reach its destination, underscoring the scale of institutional collapse caused by years of conflict.

The viral video amused thousands online, with users reacting to both the humour and the underlying tragedy of the situation. Many commented on how prolonged conflict can severely disrupt everyday life and business operations, turning routine

Dewald Brevis and Keshav Maharaj Focus on SA20 Amid T20 World Cup 2026 Build-Up

South African young gun Dewald Brevis has said he remains unfazed by outside noise and is focused on enjoying his game ahead of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2026. Currently featuring for Pretoria Capitals in the SA20 league, Brevis emphasized that whether he plays in domestic tournaments or on the global stage, the external chatter does not impact him.

"It's always outside noise, whether you play SA20 or the World Cup. At the end of the day, it stays a cricket game, it stays a white ball, and I'm just going to enjoy it and play the way I always play. It doesn't affect me," Brevis said. The 22-year-old expressed excitement about the upcoming T20 World Cup, set to begin on February 7, saying, "Everyone's form is building, but we focus on the now, which is the SA20. We're having fun here, and it's super excit-



ing for the World Cup around the corner."

Brevis made his T20I debut against Australia in Durban in August 2023. Since then, he has featured in 19 T20 internationals, scoring 469 runs at an impressive strike rate of 173.70, including one century and one half-century. His aggressive batting style and consistency have

made him a key prospect for South Africa heading into next year's global tournament in India and Sri Lanka.

Meanwhile, Pretoria Capitals captain and South African veteran Keshav Maharaj is also balancing domestic and international commitments ahead of the World Cup. Maharaj, a left-arm spinner with 40

T20I appearances, has taken 38 wickets at an average of 26.50 since debuting against Sri Lanka in Colombo in 2021. The 35-year-old, who leads South Africa's spin attack, said the SA20 is an excellent platform for match practice while preparing for the marquee event.

"Not to think too far ahead, but it's a wonderful

opportunity for us to get match practice under our belt. We've only played one series in India so far, so this is great preparation," Maharaj said. Discussing the nature of T20 cricket, he stressed the importance of trusting the process, adding, "Sometimes you go for runs, sometimes you pick up wickets, sometimes you're economical. You have to keep trusting your processes, keep working hard, and maintain a positive frame of mind."

With Brevis focusing on maintaining his form and Maharaj emphasizing preparation over pressure, South Africa aims to head into the T20 World Cup 2026 well-prepared. Both players reflect the team's strategy of blending youthful exuberance with experienced leadership, creating a balance that could prove decisive in the global tournament.

Sanju Samson Takes Batting Tips from Yuvraj Singh Ahead of T20 World Cup 2026



A video featuring India's wicket-keeper-batter Sanju Samson seeking batting advice from legendary all-rounder Yuvraj Singh is currently making waves on social media. Mark Boucher Confident Virat Kohli Will Feature in 2027 ODI World Cup

Former South Africa cricketer Mark Boucher has expressed full confidence that India's batting stalwart Virat Kohli will play in the 2027 ODI World Cup, which will be co-hosted by South Africa, Zimbabwe, and Namibia next year. Speaking to ANI in Paarl, Boucher highlighted that Kohli's fitness is not a concern and that the decision to participate will rest entirely on the player's own desire.

"Virat is going to be there. There's no doubt in my mind," Boucher said. "He has stepped away from a couple of formats at the moment, but fitness is not an issue. It's simply about whether he wants to play. From what I see, I'm sure his mind is set on coming here and playing in another World Cup."

Boucher emphasized that India continues to rely on Kohli's vast experience, noting the void



left when senior players like Kohli and Rohit Sharma are absent. "We've seen in India, especially in Tests, that when Rohit and Virat are not there, it leaves a significant gap. For South Africa, the World Cup would be a better tournament if Virat is involved, and for India, it would be fantastic to

have him there."

Kohli, who retired from Test cricket and T20Is, has shown exceptional form in the 50-over format following a rough patch earlier this year. In October 2025, he registered two consecutive ducks in Australia, which sparked speculation over his cricketing future. However, he has since silenced critics with consist-

ent performances in both international and domestic 50-over cricket.

In his last six 50-over innings, comprising four ODIs and two Vijay Hazare Trophy (VHT) matches, Kohli has maintained an extraordinary record, scoring three centuries and three fifties without registering a single score below 50. His impressive

form was particularly evident during the three-match ODI series against South Africa in November-December, where he scored 135, 102, and an unbeaten 65*.

Boucher believes that Kohli's participation would not only strengthen India's World Cup prospects but also elevate the competition overall. "India needs him, and the tournament itself gains excitement when a player of his calibre participates," he added.

With the 2027 ODI World Cup set to be held in familiar South African conditions, fans and cricketing pundits alike will be watching closely to see Kohli in action once again. If the former captain continues his current 50-over form, his presence could prove crucial for India's title challenge, adding both experience and firepower to the squad.

Cricket Legend Rahul Dravid Turns 53: A Tribute to 'The Wall'



Former India captain and head coach Rahul Dravid celebrated his 53rd birthday on Sunday, earning tributes from fans and cricketing bodies worldwide. The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) took to X to honour the batting great, who became a symbol of discipline, resilience, and technical mastery throughout his career.

Fondly nicknamed "The Wall," Dravid was renowned for his rock-solid defence, mental toughness, and ability to anchor innings under pressure. Beyond statistics, his impact on Indian cricket has been immense, both on the field and as a mentor to the next generation.

Dravid played 164 Test matches for India, amassing 13,388 runs at an average of 52.31, including 36 centuries and 63 half-centuries. His highest score of 270 highlights his ability to bat for extended periods in challenging conditions. He remains India's second-highest run-scorer in Tests and

ranks fourth overall globally.

In One Day Internationals (ODIs), Dravid featured in 344 games, scoring 10,889 runs at an average of 39.16, with 12 centuries and 83 fifties. His highest ODI score of 153 underscores his consistency across formats, making him India's fifth-highest run-getter in ODIs and tenth overall. He also represented India in a single T20 International, scoring 31 runs.

Dravid's presence extended to the Indian Premier League (IPL), where he played for Royal Challengers Bangalore (2008-2010) and Rajasthan Royals (2011-2013). In 89 IPL matches, he scored 2,174 runs at an average of 28.23, including 11 fifties, with a strike rate of 115.52.

After retiring, Dravid transitioned seamlessly into coaching, achieving remarkable success. As India's U19 head coach, he guided the team to the 2018 ICC U19 World Cup title and played a pivotal role in shaping emerging

stars such as Rishabh Pant, Shubman Gill, Ishan Kishan, Sarfaraz Khan, Arshdeep Singh, Abhishek Sharma, and Washington Sundar. As India's senior team coach, he led the side to the finals of the ICC World Test Championship (WTC) 2023 and the ICC Cricket World Cup 2023. Although India narrowly lost the World Cup final to Australia after a dominant 10-match winning streak, Dravid's mentorship was widely praised. Months later, India clinched the 2024 T20 World Cup in Barbados, marking a fitting celebration of his coaching acumen.

Beyond records and trophies, Dravid's legacy lies in his integrity, calm temperament, and commitment to nurturing talent. From his stellar performances as a batsman to his achievements as a coach, Rahul Dravid remains one of the most respected figures in world cricket, inspiring players and fans alike.

Liam Rosenior Praises Chelsea's "Outstanding" Start After 5-1 FA Cup Win



Chelsea manager Liam Rosenior described his team's 5-1 demolition of Charlton in the FA Cup third round as "outstanding," highlighting a strong start to his tenure at Stamford Bridge. Rosenior, who arrived from Strasbourg to replace Enzo Maresca last week, oversaw goals from Jorrel Hato, Tosin Adarabioyo, Marc Guiu, Pedro Neto, and Enzo Fernandez in a dominant display at The Valley on Saturday. The victory marked a perfect introduction for the 41-year-old boss, who is the latest in a line of high-profile managers at Chelsea following a turbulent period at the club.

Chelsea's former manager, Maresca, left after a challenging campaign reportedly affected by rifts with the club hierarchy. Rosenior now faces scrutiny from critics questioning whether he will be influenced by the club's power-brokers, given Chelsea and Strasbourg share the same ownership group. The former Hull manager, who was sacked by the Championship side in 2024, has already demonstrated his authority with a resounding win over Charlton, who sit 19th in the Championship, avoiding any risk of an up-

set in his first match.

"A good start, professional. I thought our first goal came at an important time, a brilliant strike from Jorrel. The quality of my players was outstanding. Strong start, something to build on," Rosenior said. He praised individual performances, singling out Marc Guiu for a "magnificent" display that earned him a goal. Rosenior emphasized that while the victory was encouraging, there was no reason to become complacent.

Chelsea have experienced frequent managerial changes since Todd Boehly's consortium took over, with Thomas Tuchel, Mauricio Pochettino, Graham Potter, and Maresca all unable to last long in charge. Rosenior, however, became the first Chelsea manager since Antonio Conte in 2016 to win his debut match, a milestone after nine previous permanent and caretaker bosses failed to do so.

Looking ahead, Rosenior and Chelsea face a sterner test in the League Cup semi-final first leg against Premier League leaders Arsenal on Wednesday. "The lads have been really receptive, and I thank them for that. If we keep working in this way, I'm excited for the future," Rosenior said. "Just a small game next on Wednesday!"

The emphatic victory, coupled with Rosenior's positive start, provides a sense of optimism at Chelsea as the club looks to stabilize and regain consistency under a new managerial era.
